Dwight Considers Changes to Complete Downtown Project

Board Also Approves EMS Restructuring

The Dwight Village Board of Trustees met April 22 when several recommendations from the Administration Committee were reviewed and approved.

Changes to the scope of work currently planned for the summer's East Main Street reconstruction project were recommended and considered. At a previous meeting April 8, the board approved awarding the East Main project to Tobey's Construction & Cartage, Inc., with the low base bid of \$1,025,736.

The project scope included new curb, gutter, sidewalks, and concrete pavement beginning on Franklin Street at Park Street and continuing to the end of East Main Street.

On April 22, it was recommended that improvements previously done at the corner of East Main and Franklin remain as is and be pulled from the awarded contract. Cost savings would be approximately \$182,000.

It was also recommended to extend the street repair beginning at Park Street down Franklin Street to Chippewa, and down Delaware Street to the bridge using asphalt instead of concrete. Sidewalks and curbs will be repaired or replaced in these areas as needed. The board authorized Village Engineer Ryan Hansen to discuss the proposed changes to the scope of the project with Tobey's Construction.

New East Main Street lighting was also discussed. At its April 8 meeting, the board agreed to postpone new street lighting due to cost. However, Village Administrator Kevin McNamara suggested that if the storm sewer portion of the street project is paid from the sewer reserve fund it could possibly free up over \$130,000 allowing completion of East Main lighting.

Hansen recommended that the village purchase the conduit and lights for East Main Street, creating a cost savings, and then hire a company to install. This way the East Main Street project would be complete this summer. The board approved the recommendations and authorized Hansen to discuss completing the street light project with Kelly Electric. The project includes installation of 20 street lights. In other street related matters, the board reviewed two proposals submitted by Hansen for reconstruction of west Northbrook Drive. The board approved putting both proposals out to bid. The first proposal is an asphalt reconstruction and the other uses concrete.

Gardner Grade School All-Star Day Hits a Home Run

Retiring Teacher Sharon Sovey's 'Sax'-tastic Day

Celebrating the hard work of students on state achievement tests, Gardner Grade School's Student Council hosted a "Break Up the Test" theme week.

On Thursday April 25, the "All-Star Day" theme ushered in quite a big surprise for both staff and students, particularly retiring fourth grade teacher Sharon Sovey.



In other business, with the retirement of EMS Director Al Metzke effective May 1, the board approved a proposal for restructuring of the EMS department. The new alignment enhances the current services of Dwight EMS and shifts the duties of the former EMS Director. With this structure, Andres Medical will handle all the billing at a cost of four percent of what is collected. The second ambulance, currently unstaffed, will be staffed from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. seven days a week. The position of billing clerk will be eliminated with that person returning to the EMS rotation. Three medics will need to be hired at the cost of \$165,000. Also, a stipend was suggested to be given to an EMS staff member picking up additional administrative work. McNamara indicated these changes are possible through eliminating the EMS Director's salary and with more income from ambulance calls.

Rodney Leroy has been appointed to serve as assistant ESDA Director. Leroy will be replacing the retiring Al Metzke. Leroy has been a member of Dwight ESDA since 1979 and is currently retired. Currently there are six active members and Leroy would like to bring that number up to ten or twelve. Trustees Jennifer Johnson and Justin Eggenberger opposed the appointment with Trustee Marla Kinkade abstaining from the vote. Administrator McNamara is the ESDA Director by contract.

In new business, Max Sulzberger, President of the Dwight Economic Alliance, was present and provided the board an update on all that the DEA offers the Village of Dwight. Sulzberger requested that the board reconsider their annual donation amount to the DEA. In 2013, the village made a five-year commitment of \$40,000 per year for a total of \$200,000 to the then newly formed DEA.

Crash Takes Life of Gardner Woman

Grundy County Coroner John W. Callahan is investigating a traffic crash early on the morning of April 27 that claimed the life of a Gardner woman.

The crash occurred around 10:00 a.m. at the intersection of Gorman and Stonewall.

Preliminary investigation indicates the driver, Carol M. Jones, 50, of rural Gardner, was traveling on Stonewall Road - when a vehicle traveling northbound on Gorman Road struck Mrs. Jones's vehicle.

Jones was pronounced dead at the scene by Coroner Callahan at 11:10 a.m. A passenger in the Jones vehicle was taken to Morris Hospital and later transferred to Peoria St. Francis Hospital.

There is no information regarding the driver of the northbound vehicle.

Coroner Callahan states it was raining at the time of the crash and there were no traffic signs on Stonewall Rd., which runs east and west.

The crash remains under investigation by Coroner Callahan's office and the Grundy County Sheriff's Department. An examination took place later that evening.

Dwight School Districts Reorganize and Seat New Board Members

2019-20 School Calendar Approved / BOE Joint Actions

The Boards of Education for Dwight Public Schools met in a special session on April 24 where new board members and officers were seated and several topics of concern to both districts were addressed.

For Dwight Common School District #232, new BOE members Eric Scheuer and Mark Christenson were seated along with re-elected BOE member Cathy Ferguson. Scheuer and Christenson will serve four-year terms while Ferguson holds a two-year seat. A two-year seat remains open with an appointment to be made at the board's May 8 session. Bo Partney was elected DGS Board President with Nick Stipanovich to serve as Vice President. Deb Conroy will continue to serve as Board Secretary with Angela Hilt as District Treasurer. Leaving the board and thanked for their service were Marc Ellis, Joel Funk, and Gene Mortensen.

Dwight High School District #230 seated re-elected BOE members Paul Warner, Kevin Berta and Betty Gantzert. Warner and Berta will serve four-year terms while Gantzert holds a twoyear seat. A two-year seat remains open with an appointment to be made at the board's May 15 session. Brian Perschnick was re-elected Board President with Tim Henson elected Vice President. Deb Conroy will continue to serve as Board Secretary with Angela Hilt as District Treasurer. Leaving the BOE after 16 years of service was Kim Rodosky, who was thanked for her many years of service.

Board meeting dates, times wish to minimize using remote and locations for 2019-2020 were also approved by both boards with no changes. The Dwight Grade School Board will continue to meet on the second Wednesday of each month in the school's library. Meeting times will remain at 6 p.m.

The Dwight High School Board will meet on the third Wednesday of each month at the High School in the District Office board room. Meeting times remain at 6 p.m.

Meeting dates are subject to change if the date conflicts with a holiday or District Office closure.

In other joint action items, the boards approved the 2019 -2020 school calendar. Next year's calendar calls for the first day of student attendance to be Thursday, August 15, 2019. Highlights from the calendar include no school November 27 - 29 for the Thanksgiving holiday. Winter Break will begin on December 23, 2019 with students returning to school on January 7, 2020. Spring Break has been designated as March 23 -March 27, 2020. No school will be held April 10 and April 13, 2020 due to the Easter holiday. May 22, 2020 is the planned last day of student attendance; however, five emergency days designated as May 26, 27, 28, 29, and June 1, 2020 could impact the final day of school.

In another item, the concept of creating a late start school day plan was discussed. A late school start could be utilized on learning days and the boards gave direction to move forward with developing a late start plan.

In a lengthy discussion, the boards were presented with information regarding the impacts of the new Illinois minimum wage law which mandates a minimum wage of \$15.00 per hour effective January 1, 2025. Last month, Superintendent Dr. Richard Jancek recommended that they begin reviewing support staff and work classifications and start looking at ways to create respectful salary gaps as part of a five to eight year plan that is consistent and sustainable. Several different scenarios were presented in a complex situation where the districts work to be compliant to the new minimum wage requirements while being respectful to the salaries of long term employees in addition to being careful to avoid being assessed additional IMRF contributions. The discussion will resume at another special joint session scheduled for 7 p.m. on Monday, May 13 at the high school.

Restructuring of the Technology Department was discussed with the concept approved as presented. One Technical Director, Logan Murray, will oversee both school districts with an Assistant Tech Specialist, yet to be named.

The 2019 – 20 Food Service contracts were approved with Arbor Management, Inc., continuing as the food service vendor. A 2.8 percent increase was approved for the food service contract.



During the recent March 25 budget hearing, Trustees expressed concerns around a lack of communication from the DEA to the board and indicated there was also an understanding that the DEA would be selfsustaining after the initial five-year startup period.

Sulzberger informed the board that the village's annual contribution goes toward salaries of the individuals employed by the Dwight Economic Alliance. Sulzberger indicated that the DEA would not be able to operate without the full donation from the village. Sulzberger invited the trustees to attend DEA board meetings and welcomed any ideas they may have to offer. He requested the board reconsider reinstating the full \$40,000 annual contribution.

The trustees agreed to revisit the topic at a future Administration Committee Meeting.

matter. On another Sulzberger also addressed the board as a downtown property owner and questioned the per square foot charge of 40 cents assessed by the village for a commercial building remodel. Sulzberger expressed concern that the fees discourage building renovations. Currently the village assesses commercial buildings a flat fee of \$250 plus 40 cents per square foot of the entire floor being upgraded/remodeled. The fees are assessed, in part, to help the village recoup inspection costs.

Mr. Sulzberger currently owns buildings that house Edward Jones and the Yoga Studio/Barber Shop on West Main Street and four store fronts on East Main street housing Studio 134, Bill's Barber Shop and Vigna Real Estate. Sulzberger also owns 146 E. Main which is currently vacant and being remodeled. Sulzberger has paid \$1,500 in village permits and fees for this remodel project outside of the required \$.40 per square foot fee.

Sulzberger is asking the board to look into two different topics when it comes to downtown buildings. He would like the board to look at establishing a different building code, one that has fewer restrictions, making it cost effective for building owners to renovate. He also would like the board to reconsider the 40 cent per square foot renovation charge stating the additional costs do not promote building renovations. The concerns are being sent the Village Administration Committee for further review.

In reports to the board, Mayor Jared Anderson reported that letters will be sent to property owners of dilapidated properties in the coming weeks in an effort to get lots cleaned up around town.

Trustee Jerry Curtis inquired on the village's chipper rules and regulations and how these will be enforced to help keep the Public Works Department on task with their regular daily obligations. It was suggested that the board look into establishing an ordinance with strict directives for residences with regard to branch pickup.

Chief of Police Tim Henson reported that Detective Gary Beier and officers from Dwight and Livingston County have conducted active shooter training at Dwight Township High School. School staff had previously undergone ALICE training and this was the first drill where students were also present. Henson also reported that Dwight's new police officer, Alex Butts, will be graduating from the police academy on May 10th.

President Anderson presented the Gold Wing Road Riders Association Motorist Awareness Program Proclamation. The proclamation continually promotes motorcycle safety, education and awareness programs to the general public, and to the motorist community of Illinois. May 2019 is Motorcycle Awareness Month encouraging motorcycle awareness and safety monitoring for all.

Should You Borrow from Your 401(k)?

If you work for a business that offers a 401(k) plan, consider yourself fortunate, because a 401(k), with its tax advantages and variety of investment options, is a great way to save for retirement. But what if you need to tap in to your plan before you retire? Is it a good idea to borrow from your 401(k)?

You can only borrow from your 401(k) if you're still working for the company that offers the plan, but even so, you'll have to check with your human resources area to determine if loans are allowed. If they are, you'll want to weigh the pros and cons before taking action.

On the "pro" side, it's pretty easy to get a 401(k) loan - there's no formal loan application and no minimum credit score required. Plus, you're only borrowing from yourself, and you can generally repay the loan with automatic paycheck deductions, typically over a five-year period.

However, you'll also encounter some "cons" when taking out a 401(k) loan, particularly concerning taxes. If you had not borrowed from your 401(k), the money you took out could have been growing on a tax-deferred basis, assuming you used pre-tax dollars to fund your plan, and your withdrawals will only be taxed once. But when you borrow from your plan, you will have to repay it, along with interest, with money you've earned - and been taxed on - and then, when you withdraw it later, you'll pay taxes on it again.

Taking money from your 401(k), will almost certainly slow the growth potential of your account. Of course, if you encounter an emergency, and you have nowhere else to turn, you may need to borrow from your 401(k). Some plans allow hardship withdrawals, although you'll still be taxed on the amount you withdraw.

You'd probably be better off if you can prepare for situations in which you need immediate access to a sizable sum. Build an emergency fund containing six months' to a year's worth of living expenses, with the money kept in a liquid, low-risk account. You might find some resources in the part of your investment portfolio held outside your 401(k). For example, you can always withdraw contributions to a Roth IRA without incurring taxes.

In any case, you work hard to build your 401(k) - so, no matter where you are in life, think carefully about how you will use the money.





I'm a big fan of the NBA. I will be watching most of, if not all of, the remaining playoff games from here until the finish line in the NBA Finals. What I noticed, as did many others in the Rockets and Warriors game on Sunday, is the most complaining and whining about calls I think I've ever seen in the NBA, and maybe in any basketball game ever.

As an interesting sub plot to this, I also played in a rec league basketball game in Chicago the morning before the Warriors and Rockets game, where a player on the opposing team received a technical foul for arguing with the referees. Keep in mind this is a rec league, and in this game specifically where there are normally two referees, there was only one officiating this game.

So, I played and observed just copious amounts of complaining in basketball games from the time I woke up in the morning to the time I stopped watching basketball around 6 that night.

I guess my first big question is why did this start, and where did it come from? I mean there's been differences with the referees since the beginning of basketball time, but it seems to be at an all-time worst. The amount of demonstrative reactions to bad officiating calls in the NBA is out of control.

I've played basketball with referees for more or less 15 years and I've never once received a technical foul, never even really been that close actually. Now I'm fairly mild mannered for the most part, even in pretty heavy competition, but I can almost 1000% guess that most interactions go better with officials when you actually have a conversation with them instead of belittling or berating them with insults about how bad they are at their job.

This is not to say that there aren't times and place to more demonstratively express your frustration, but for the most part in my experience it goes much better to have a cordial conversation when discussing your disagreements with an official, in any sport really.

I don't know where this dark turn in this aspect of basketball has come from, but I think it needs to start trending the other way or it may be headed to the place where it becomes unbearable to watch.

Think of your referees and officials before you yell at them and tell them they stink! Politely tell them instead.
