# With Grilling Competition Comes Bragging Rights

If you live in the vicinity of Renfrew Park, you may have licking been your chops this past weekend as

the smell of barbecue drifted downwind. More than 50 teams came out to win cash prizes and bragging rights during two grilling competitions that were part of Dwight's annual Springfest.

Rodney Connor, the organizer of Saturday's Route 66 Smoke Out and Friday's backyard wing contest, said this year's teams turned out some exceptionally good barbecue, including some finger-licking ribs that tickled the tastebuds.

The Route 66 Smoke Out had 33 teams competing in the Kansas City Barbeque Societysanctioned state championship.

Springfest has held a backyard barbecue contest for about 11 years now, but it's grown tremendously since they were able to get the distinction of having it KCBS backed. Barbecue masters have come from around the Midwest -as far as Michigan this year -- to claim a trophy.

That's because KCBS is the world's largest organization of barbecue and grilling enthusiasts, with more than 19,000 members worldwide. The Route 66 Smoke Out competition is one of only 450 contests sanctioned by KCBS around the world. Teams compete for the grand prize of \$1,000, with other prizes given out in chicken, ribs, pork and brisket.

And this is one heckuva contest. Only KCBS team has what they need. Stopping by to check sanctioned judges are able to pick the winners. There were 42 in all who came from around Illinois and Indiana, Connor said.

> Why so many judges? Well, with 33 teams competing, there's only so much room in one's

Each judge gets six plates in four categories. But "plate" may be an exaggeration. They actually judge on only one bite. The goal of the teams is to create that perfect, delectable bite; and judges must savor every last morsel.

The blind competition is based first on taste, then texture and appearance, on a weighted scale. After 24 bites -- that's a lot of food -- the judges rotate.

The judges included men and women, including Rosie Miller, of Dwight. She has been a judge ever since the first backyard contest a decade ago, and when KCBS sanctioned the event, she so badly wanted to continue judging she actually became a KCBS Certified Barbeque Judge (CBJ). It requires half a day's training, er tasting.

The backyard wings contest on Friday brought out 19 local judges for 15 local teams who grilled up more than 300 local wings that Connor purchased from Berkot's. Each team was given 15 wings, and required to turn in six.

While the general public did not get to taste the creations from the contests because of Livingston County Health Department rules, volunteers got their fill with all the leftovers. Connor, too, left both contests with a full stomach.

As organizer, his job is to make sure every

The toddler program meets each Wednesday morning from 10:30-11:00 a.m. Toddlers and their parent or grandparent begin arriving at 10:00 a.m. and stay until about 11:30 a.m. During that time they socialize, select books and DVDs, and read stories to each other. During the directed activity we read books about the topic of the day, play games, sing songs, do activities, and make crafts. Most days there is an educational precept or theme that is highlighted.

We also enjoy when special guests arrive to expand our program. We have had many visitors such as Mrs. Claus, Cat in the Hat, and the Easter Bunny. Local volunteers and important people from the community that have enriched our program include the police, firefighters, ambulance personnel, the dentist, craft providers, and farmers. We love our guests and volunteers. In addition, we

Part of the growth of our program can be attributed to joining and highlighting the national 1,000 Books Before Kindergarten Program. The focus of the program is to encourage reading for children to help them with pre-reading skills such as understanding the sounds letters make, developing a larger vocabulary, building background knowledge, learning colors, letters, and numbers, as well as learning small and large group social skills. While many of the toddlers do attend preschool at Dwight Common School District, they still enjoy and in many cases insist that they want to go to the library. The instruction provided helps a child be prepared for and transition to kindergarten in a friendly, child centered environment.

For each 100 book milestone level they reach they will receive a reward from the library. Each child receives a book upon registration, and a certificate with a book, gift Prairie Creek became in- card from Dairy Queen or Mc-

book, or game for each 100 book level they reach. At 1,000 Books they receive a book, special prize, and a Barnes and Noble gift card. At each level their name is placed on our wall of fame. They enjoy looking for their name and the names of their friends.

Since the beginning of the program the following goals have been met: 100 books - 29; 200 books - 23; 300 books -15; 400 books – 12; 500 – 12; 600 - 12; 700 - 8; 800 - 6;900 - 4; 1,000 - 4.

We are proud of our toddlers and the investment their parents and grandparents have made in their child's future. We hope that this early exposure to books and the library will make lifetime readers out of them and assist them with their edu-



### Howard Rub Named AD of the Year in Astoria, OR





# Grass Carp Come to Dwight


On May 2, Grass Carp came

These fish are famous for their ability to keep down aquatic vegetation in ponds and lakes. With the permission of the Dwight Lions Club, the Dwight Rotary Club purchased 15 triploid, sterile, Grass Carp from Keystone Hatcheries out of Richmond. The fish were delivered to Lions Lake on May 2, and Rotarian Victor "Randy" Randle, along with volunteers Bob Dornbier, Cathy McClarey, and Royce McBeath, placed the fish in the lake.

The fish are small now, but can grow up to 39 inches in length and a weight of 99 pounds. Their lifespan is usually between five to 11 years. Considered an invasive species, only sterile Grass Carp are legal to purchase in Illinois. It normally takes one to three years to see the impact of the Grass Carp on keeping down the aquatic vegetation in a pond or lake. As they grow larger, the Grass Carp normally assume a shape resembling a torpedo from a distance.

The fish have a reputation of presenting a feisty challenge to anglers. Since these are sterile fish, the Dwight Rotary Club requests fisherman practice a policy of catch and release (Grass Carp are tasty, but the spines of their backbone make cooking and eating them challenging).

Taking a picture of the catch prior to release would be appreciated, with a copy of the photograph submitted to the Dwight Rotary Club, P.O. Box 9, Dwight, IL 60420 – as such pictures will be an easy way for the Club to keep tabs on the growth of the Carp.

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
