Chicago Police Recover Vehicle Stolen From Dwight in 2018

On June 11, the Dwight Police Department was contacted by the Chicago Police Department in reference to a recovered stolen vehicle from Dwight.

The CPD reported they had recovered a red 2011 Dodge Charger, reported stolen to the Dwight Police Department on

July 27, 2018. The vehicle was abandoned at the time of recovery and identification was confirmed through the use of the vehicle’s Vehicle Identification (VIN) number.

The car was towed to a Chicago Police Impound area and the owner was notified.

Track Work Causing Rt. 47, Old Rt. 66 Closings in Dwight

Beginning Monday, June 24, at 7:00 a.m., track work on the freight line on Route 47, near LSC Communications, will begin.

The work will proceed for ten days and Rt. 47 will be closed through Friday, July 5.

The railroad will be raising their track slightly, replacing some railroad ties, replacing the rails, and rebuilding the existing at-grade crossing.

IL Rt. 47 traffic will proceed as follows:

IL 47 northbound traffic will proceed west on IL 17 to Old US 66; thence north on Old US 66 back to IL 47.

IL 47 southbound traffic will proceed southwest on Old US 66 to IL 17; thence east on IL 17 back to IL 47.

The next railroad closure in Dwight will be on Old Rt. 66, and is scheduled for a start date of July 8.

This crossing is located 1.14 miles west of the aforementioned crossing and the work will also be similar.

The detour will use IL Rt. 17 and IL Rt. 47.

All rail work is associated with the Norfolk Southern railroad.

Motorists are urged to use caution and expect some delays while traveling on the detour route. Slow down and use extreme caution while driving through all work zones.

Lane Closures and Shifts on I-55 South of Arsenal Road

The Illinois Department of Transportation began replacement of the bridge decks and other improvements to Interstate 55 over the BNSF Railroad and Grant Creek, south of Arsenal Road in Will County, as of June 17.

In order to complete the project, northbound I-55 initially will be reduced to a single lane to accommodate the widening of the shoulders.

After the shoulders are widened, the southbound bridge will be closed and I-55 reduced to one lane in each direction on the northbound

lanes. The revised configuration is expected to be in place from August until late November, when I-55 returns to two lanes in each direction.

Work will resume next spring with the closure of the northbound bridge and traffic crossing over to the southbound lanes to again accommodate one lane in each direction.

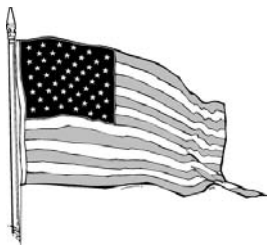
There will not be a detour, but Interstate 80 and Illinois 47 is the recommended alternative route. Digital message boards will be in place to display real-time traffic information.

The entire project is ex-

pected to be complete by the fall of 2020.

Motorists can expect delays and should allow extra time for trips through this area. Drivers are urged to pay close attention to flaggers and signs in the work zones, obey the posted speed limits, and be on the alert for workers and equipment. Illinois State Police will be patrolling this work zone to enforce posted speed limits.

Dwight Village Committees Assigned

June 10 Board Actions

The Dwight Village Board of Trustees met on June 10 following a meeting of the Village's Administration Committee.

Village Committees and Chairpersons were appointed and approved as follows:

Public Health & Safety Committee – Justin Eggenberger, Chair; Chuck Butterbrodt, Jerry Curtis.

Public Properties/Utilities Committee – Marla Kinkade, Chair; Chuck Butterbrodt, Randy Irvin.

Liquor Commission – Jared Anderson, Liquor Commissioner; Justin Eggenberger, Chuck Butterbrodt, Jerry Curtis.

Ordinance, Judicial & Licensing Committee – Jerry Curtis, Chair; Randy Irvin, Jennifer Johnson.

Administration Committee – Mayor Jared Anderson, Chair; All Trustees.

Justin Eggenberger serves as **Mayor Pro-Tem**.

In another action, the board approved the Administration Committee's recommendation

to award the West Northbrook Drive project bid to Opperman Construction of Pontiac with a bid of \$222,610. The project will include reconstruction of West Northbrook Drive using 14 inches of reinforced concrete.

Members of the Dwight Economic Alliance were present at the Administration Committee meeting to request reestablishment of DEA funding. During the March budget proceedings, the Board of Trustees elected to reduce DEA funding from \$40,000 to \$15,000. In 2013, the village made a five-year annual commitment of \$40,000 for a total of \$200,000 to the then newly formed DEA. During the March 25 budget hearing, Village trustees expressed concerns around a lack of communication from the DEA to the board and indicated there was also an understanding that the DEA would be self-sustaining after the initial five-year startup period. The DEA has expressed concerns about the funding reduction and loss of needed financial support.

In addition to sponsoring many village events such as the

Spring BBQ Fest, Christmas parade, Buzz the Gut, July 4 fireworks and several others, the DEA also works to enhance economic growth and development within the village. After discussion it was agreed that there were communication issues and, to be successful, the DEA and Village need to move forward in more of a partnership.

However, budget concerns were raised including the village having just one month of reserve funds available opposed to three months of fund reserves as recommended. No action was taken. On June 24, the Administration Committee will review the request, along with the budget, before making any recommendations.

In reports to the board, Mayor Anderson reported that the State will be mowing and trimming along the front of the former Dwight Correctional Center property. Also to help clean up the overgrowth in the prison, the Dwight Fire Department will be performing controlled burns.

Chief of Police Tim Henson reminded drivers that school is out for the summer and to be

cautious and aware of children playing, walking and riding bikes. Henson indicated that, with the warmer weather, bike patrols have resumed. Chief Henson also reminded everyone to keep vehicles locked and valuables out of sight.

In Public Forum, a question was raised regarding any planned street work for St Louis Street. Mayor Anderson indicated that there are plans to do the street in phases beginning with the first two-block phase from Rt. 17 to Chippewa. No time-line was given.

In other business, the 2019-2020 K-8 Student / Parent Handbook was approved as presented. One significant change in the handbook is regarding seventh/eighth grade Board Scholar designation. GARDNER – Frank Mahoney, 63, died unexpectedly Tuesday, June 11, 2019 at home in Gardner.

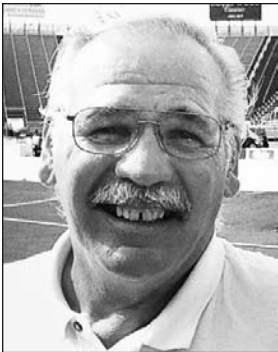
Frank was born in Joliet May 11, 1956, son of Donald and Lola Farmer Mahoney. He was a proud member of Teamster Local 179.

June is Alzheimer’s and Brain Awareness Month

June is Alzheimer’s and Brain Awareness Month, and although there is no cure yet, early detection is necessary to slow the progression, lessen the symptoms, and improve the quality of life for those suffering from Alzheimer’s and other dementia-related diseases.

Alzheimer’s is a progressive mental deterioration due to degeneration of the brain. It is the most common type of dementia disease, and according to the National Institute on Aging, Alzheimer’s affects one’s memory, thinking, and behavior.

According to the Alzheimer’s Association, one in ten adults 65 and over has Alzheimer’s dementia, and someone in the United States is diagnosed with Alzheimer’s every 65 seconds.

According to the Alzheimer’s Association, there are ten warning signs for Alzheimer’s and other dementia diseases to look for and learn.

• **Trouble following plans and solving problems.** Someone with dementia might have problems following directions while driving or cooking, or have difficulty adding numbers to pay bills.

• **Problems completing familiar tasks.** A person with dementia may forget how to turn

on the computer or microwave.

• **Confusion with time or place.** Someone struggling with dementia might forget where they are, or how long they have been there.

• **Difficulty understanding visuals and judging space.** Differentiating colors and judging distance may be hard for a person with dementia, making driving and other activities difficult.

• **Challenges with speaking and writing.** Problems with vocabulary, worsening grammar, and trouble recalling topics can make engaging in conversations hard for someone with Alzheimer’s and other forms of dementia.

• **Misplacing items.** Misplacing everyday items, such as a remote control or cell phone, is common among those struggling with memory loss diseases. Losing items often may

cause someone with dementia to accuse others of stealing from them, making it hard to maintain relationships.

• **Poor judgment.** Someone with Alzheimer’s and other forms of dementia may spend money on unnecessary items or pay less attention to personal hygiene.

• **Withdrawal from socializing.** A person with dementia might lose interest in leaving the house, participating in past hobbies, and spending time with friends and family.

• **Changes in mood.** Someone with Alzheimer’s and other dementia may become suspicious, anxious, fearful, or act inappropriately.

• **Memory loss.** The most recognizable symptom of dementia may be the loss of memory that disrupts daily life. Forgetting important information, routinely relying on notes and reminders, or repeatedly asking for the same information are all common for someone with dementia.

Don’t hesitate – if you notice any of these ten warning signs in yourself or someone you love, see a doctor.

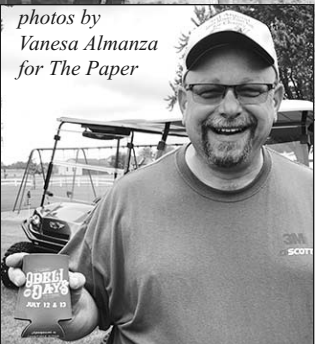

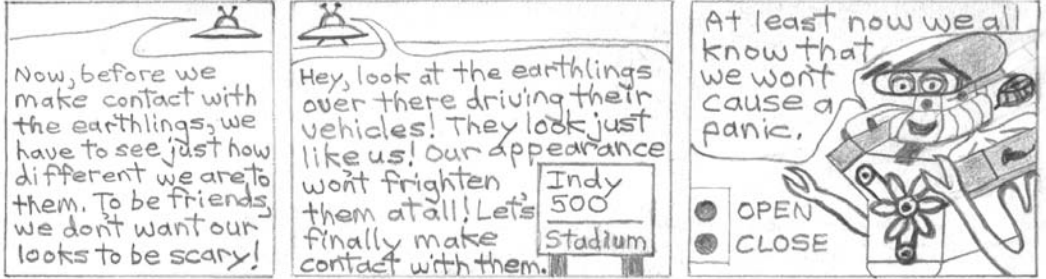

staff in the security role and other frontline staff, as I once was the emergency responder to incidents and can understand some of what feelings they may have.”

Roach is named Joliet Treatment Center's "Rapid Results Champion." She has received "Train the Trainer" training and has implemented over a dozen projects, that have saved more labor hours than any other maximum security facility.

In a speech delivered by IDOC Chief of Staff Edwin Bowen in Springfield, he said Roach was selected for her knowledge, professionalism, ambition, and positive attitude.

Roach is a 2006 graduate of Tri-Point High School and obtained her bachelor's degree in Criminal Justice with a focus on Social Work from Olivet Nazarene University in 2009.

She began her career with the Illinois Department of Corrections completing two internships at Dwight Correctional Center, first as a warden's intern in 2008 and as a clinical services intern in 2009.

In February 2011, she was hired as a juvenile justice specialist working with the incarcerated juvenile female population at Illinois Youth Center Warrenville.

Following transitions from a security role to a programmatic role, working in the business office and the Assistant Superintendents' of Operations and Programs offices, Roach was able to gain a multi-disciplinary knowledge and training.

In 2016, Roach transferred to Sheridan Correctional Center, a medium security adult male facility, working out of the warden's office. She expanded her knowledge of administrative practices and labor management roles.

In 2017, Roach transferred to new Joliet Treatment Center. She lives in Dwight with her husband Charles Roach and daughter Ella Payne.

“It is sometimes hard to explain what we do or why we do it in corrections, as I'm sure is similar with other career choices. Since arriving at Joliet Treatment Center I have been thankful to assist with opening our new facility,” Roach said.
