Casey's West, Dwight, Robbed at Gunpoint, Robbery Suspects Apprehended

On June 12, at approximately 1:34 a.m., Dwight Police were called to Casey's General Store on Watters Drive in Dwight for an armed robbery

Two individuals entered the Casey's store, brandished a long, black gun, and demanded money. Both suspects were male – one being white, and the other being African-American.

The suspects got away with an undetermined amount of cash and some Newport cigarettes.

The two employees at Casey's were unharmed.

Assisting Dwight Police were the Livingston County Sheriff's Police, Grundy County Sheriff's Police, Illinois State Police, and Livingston County Pro-Active. This case remains under investigation.

Later that day, at approximately 10:30 a.m., Dwight Police were notified of a black male, fitting the description of the armed robber, in the area of CVS Pharmacy.

Taken into custody was Lawrence D. Lloyd, 30, of Bloomington. Found in Lloyd's possession was an undetermined amount of U.S. currency and Newport Cigarettes.

Dwight Police did an extensive search and found goods

they believe were part of the armed robbery.

Located during the search was an unopened pack of Newport cigarettes, jacket, and a long, black gun.

Lloyd has been charged with a class X felony (armed robbery with a gun). He has been taken to the Livingston County Jail.

Assisting Dwight Police were the citizens of Dwight, Livingston Co. Pro-Active Unit, and the Livingston County Sheriff's Department.

At approximately 10:30 p.m. that night, Dwight Police arrested and took into custody the second suspect, Kurtis Bowling, 21, of Bloomington, for armed robbery of Casey's General Store in Dwight.

Bowling was picked up from the McLean County Jail and taken to Livingston Co. Jail, where he currently resides.

Assisting the DPD were McLean County Sheriff's Police, Livingston Co. Detective Section, and the Livingston Co. Sheriff's Department.

This case remains under investigation.

Dwight Chief of Police, Tim Henson, commented, "I would like to say thank you to our citizens for helping make our community a safer and better place to live."

Illinois Department of Corrections Employee of the Year, Cassie Roach

A Dwight woman who started her career at the former Dwight Correctional Center has been named the Illinois Department of Corrections' Employee of the Year

Cassie Roach, Administrative Assistant I for the Joliet Treatment Center, was given the honor on May 8 during the Correctional Officer of the Year and Employee Ceremony in Springfield. It is one of three honors given annually, along with the Correctional Officer of the Year and Parole Agent of the Year.

"That was pretty humbling," said Roach, who attributes much of her success to those she has worked with. "A lot of people who taught me what I know haven't gotten this award. ... I feel like I have a pretty well rounded experience."

Roach serves as the Facility Coordinator for the Joliet Treatment Center Staff Wellness Response Team, a new initiative to assist employees in overcoming difficult situations that may arise throughout one's career.

The Joliet Treatment Center opened in 2017. It is a multi-level residential treatment facility that addresses inmates' mental health needs.

Roach established the facility's internal review process, trained new staff, assisted in establishing facility procedures, and coordinated all facility internal reviews.

Roach has served as the primary Employee Litigation Coordinator for the facility, developing case files for past and

present litigation matters, updates and maintains a departmental litigation database, and has trained new staff in this role.

"While my responsibility includes assisting with establishing procedures for staff implementation, I am also tasked with auditing compliance and ensuring corrective action is implemented to correct non-compliance," she said.

While she is in a non-security role now, she has served in a security role and knows the difficulties correctional officers face.

"Being in the office and not having that connection with residents is difficult, but I know our policies and procedures directly affect their care. I have utilized the Staff Wellness Response Team to support

Track Work Causing Rt. 47, Old Rt. 66 Closings in Dwight

Beginning Monday, June the freight line on Route 47, near LSC Communications, will begin.

The work will proceed for ten days and Rt. 47 will be closed through Friday, July 5.

June 10 Board Actions

The Dwight Village Board of Trustees met on June 10 following a meeting of the Vil-Administration lage's Committee.

Village Committees and Chairpersons were appointed and approved as follows:

In another action, the board approved the Administration

to award the West Northbrook Spring BBQ Fest, Christmas Drive project bid to Opperman Construction of Pontiac with a bid of \$222,610. The project will include reconstruction of West Northbook Drive using 14 inches of reinforced con-

Members of the Dwight Economic Alliance were present at the Administration Committee meeting to request reestablishment of DEA funding. During the March budget proceedings, the Board of Trustees elected to reduce DEA funding from \$40,000 to \$15,000. In 2013, the village made a five-year annual commitment of \$40,000 for a total of \$200,000 to the then newly formed DEA. During the March 25 budget hearing, Village trustees expressed concerns around a lack of communication from the DEA to the board and indicated there was also an understanding that the DEA would be self-sustaining after the initial five-year startup period. The DEA has expressed concerns about the funding reduction and loss of needed financial support.

In addition to sponsoring Committee's recommendation many village events such as the

parade, Buzz the Gut, July 4 fireworks and several others, the DEA also works to enhance economic growth and development within the village. After discussion it was agreed that there were communication issues and, to be successful, the DEA and Village need to move forward in more of a partner-

However, budget concerns were raised including the village having just one month of reserve funds available opposed to three months of fund reserves as recommended. No action was taken. On June 24, the Administration Committee will review the request, along with the budget, before making any recommendations.

In reports to the board, Mayor Anderson reported that the State will be mowing and trimming along the front of the former Dwight Correctional Center property. Also to help clean up the overgrowth in the prison, the Dwight Fire Department will be performing controlled burns.

Chief of Police Tim Henson reminded drivers that school is out for the summer and to be

cautious and aware of children playing, walking and riding bikes. Henson indicated that, with the warmer weather, bike patrols have resumed. Chief Henson also reminded everyone to keep vehicles locked and valuables out of sight.

In Public Forum, a question was raised regarding any planned street work for St Louis Street. Mayor Anderson indicated that there are plans to do the street in phases beginning with the first two-block phase from Rt. 17 to Chippewa. No time-line was given.

Class Sizes Pose Concern at Dwight Common School District #232

June 12 Board of Education Actions

An optimal class size helps to provide an optimal learning experience. Dwight Common School District #232 met on June 12 where challenges in finding that ideal balance were a focus of discussion.

Various scenarios of a threeyear plan were presented by Principal Brandon Owens which involved adjusting staff among grade levels to fill continual changing needs. Grade levels varied between two and three sections. However, the board expressed concerns around class size and focused on a strong desire to work towards keeping all class sizes smaller and, ideally, three sections each grade level. With enrollment numbers uncertain, the board directed that a proactive step be taken and that a potential position be posted in an effort to be ready to meet the challenge once enrollment numbers are more solid and the start of the new

school year draws nearer.

In other business, the 2019-2020 K-8 Student / Parent Handbook was approved as presented. One significant change in the handbook is regarding seventh/eighth grade Board Scholar designation. The change will include a shift from the current overall average grade of an "A", to completing the school year with an "A" in each subject area, for each quarter, in order to receive the Board Scholar award. Principal Brandon Owens suggested the change would bring the Board Scholar designation back to being an exemplary award. Another change was around a procedure for medical marijuana. Also approved was the 2019-20 Activities Handbook.

A renewal of Property/Casualty/ and Liability insurance with Prairie State Insurance Cooperative was approved. The contract renewal reflects a savings in premium of \$1,390, or 3.74 percent less than the expiring contract.

The board approved a contract renewal with Shorewood based Hillman Pediatric Therapy for physical therapy services at an hourly rate of \$73 per hour. The contract is effective August 1, 2019 through July 31, 2020.







• Trouble following plans and solving problems. Someone with dementia might have problems following directions while driving or cooking, or have difficulty adding numbers to pay bills.

• Problems completing familiar tasks. A person with dementia may forget how to turn eases. Losing items often may Lodge for the summer.

on the computer or microwave. • Confusion with time or place. Someone struggling with dementia might forget where they are, or how long they have been there.

• Difficulty understanding visuals and judging space. Differentiating colors and judging distance may be hard for a person with dementia, making driving and other activities dif-

• Challenges with speaking and writing. Problems with vocabulary, worsening grammar, and trouble recalling topics can make engaging in conversations hard for someone with Alzheimer's and other forms of dementia.

• Misplacing items. Misplacing everyday items, such as a remote control or cell phone, is common among those struggling with memory loss dis-

cause someone with dementia to accuse others of stealing from them, making it hard to maintain relationships.

• Poor judgment. Someone with Alzheimer's and other forms of dementia may spend money on unnecessary items or pay less attention to personal hygiene.

· Withdrawal from socializing. A person with dementia might lose interest in leaving the house, participating in past hobbies, and spending time with friends and family.

• Changes in mood. Someone with Alzheimer's and other dementia may become suspicious, anxious, fearful, or act inappropriately.

• Memory loss. The most recognizable symptom of dementia may be the loss of memory that disrupts daily life. Forgetting important information, routinely relying on notes and reminders, or repeatedly asking for the same information are all common for someone with dementia.

Don't hesitate – if you notice any of these ten warning signs in yourself or someone you love, see a doctor.

staff in the security role and other frontline staff, as I once was the emergency responder to incidents and can understand some of what feelings they may have."

Roach is named Joliet Treatment Center's "Rapid Results Champion." She has received "Train the Trainer" training and has implemented over a dozen projects, that have saved more labor hours than any other maximum security facility.

In a speech delivered by IDOC Chief of Staff Edwin Bowen in Springfield, he said Roach was selected for her knowledge, professionalism, ambition, and positive attitude.

Roach is a 2006 graduate of Tri-Point High School and obtained her bachelor's degree in Criminal Justice with a focus on Social Work from Olivet Nazarene University in 2009.

She began her career with the Illinois Department of Corrections completing two internships at Dwight Correctional Center, first as a warden's intern in 2008 and as a clinical services intern

In February 2011, she was hired as a juvenile justice specialist working with the incarcerated juvenile female population at Illinois Youth Center Warrenville.

Following transitions from a security role to a programmatic role, working in the business office and the Assistant Superintendents' of Operations and Programs offices, Roach was able to gain a multi-disciplinary knowledge and training.
