### Charges Dropped, Reduced in Alleged **Pontiac Prison Beating**

Two of the three guards at the Pontiac Correctional Center charged with beating an inmate back in February have had their charges dropped or reduced.

Jason Cremer, 45, of Odell, James Fike, 31, of Bloomington, and Giovanni Rodriquez, 21, of Normal, were each charged with one count of official misconduct, a Class 3 Felony, and one count of battery, a Class A misdemeanor, in February for allegedly beating an inmate serving time on a sex charge at the maximum-security Pontiac Correctional Center.

According to Livingston County court records, Jason Cremer, 45, of Odell, had his charges dismissed in court on July 16.

The same day, Fike pleaded guilty to the battery charge and prosecutors dropped the official misconduct charge. He was sentenced to 88 days in the Livingston County Jail and one year probation.

Rodriguez has pleaded not guilty and has a jury trial scheduled for Sept. 9.

It's unclear whether the three are still employed at the Pontiac Correctional Center. In a Facebook post, Cremer's wife said: "Well I can finally announce that the charges against my husband have been dropped. We are beyond excited. Hopefully he will be going back to work next week!

### Historic Building, Post Office Destroyed in Blaze

Water had to be trucked in from miles away and assistance was required from 35 area fire departments to extinguish a massive blaze at VanFab Inc. in Union Hill Friday afternoon.

Corey Eich, assistant chief for the Herscher Fire Department, said it was the biggest fire in the western part of Kankakee County in 30 years. The 7,000-squarefoot building, which housed a metal fabricating production facility, offices and the Union Hill Post Office, was completely destroyed.

It started around 1:50 p.m. Friday. The building was occupied at the time but those inside were evacuated and there were no injuries to workers or firefighters who battled the blaze until 2 a.m. Saturday. Union Hill, a town of 60 residents, does not have water hydrants, Eich said.


Eich said the cause of the fire is believed to be accidental but it is still being

investigated. Published reports say a spark from a crane started the fire.

Although additions have been added, the building dates to 1896. VanFab, Inc. is owned by Hugh Van Voorst and his father, Grant.

VanFab, Inc. and Van Voorst Lumber are wood and metal fabricating companies. The lumber company dates back 110 years, with the Van Voorst family specializing in industrial lumber products for commercial applications, according to the company's Facebook page. The company grew out of a retail hardware store started in the 1890s by George Van Voorst. That business was developed through the 1950s by his son Gilbert Van Voorst.

In the 1960s, Gilbert's son, Hugh, began transforming the business into an Industrial Lumber Company specializing in industrial skids, crates and wood products. Up until the fire, the company provided industrial lumber products and services to companies in northern and central Illinois.

### **Jesse White Encourages Organ/Tissue Donation for National Minority Donor Awareness Week**

White hosted the National Minority Donor Awareness Week event, "Wave Away the Waiting," to promote organ/tissue donation for multicultural communities. White was joined by donor recipients and families.

Nationally, people of color comprise 59% of the waiting list for organ transplants; however, this year they accounted for only 33% of those who donated organs, according to the Organ Procurement and Transplantation Network.

According to the Organ Procurement and Transplantation

Currently there are 1,464 African Americans on the waiting list, but in 2018 only 153 African Americans became donors.

• There are 823 Hispanic Amer-

Secretary of State Jesse icans on the waiting list, but and 17-year olds to register to last year only 137 Hispanic Americans became donors.

• There are 237 Asian Americans on the waiting list, but only 27 Asian Americans became organ donors in 2018.

In Illinois, 6.7 million people are registered as organ/tissue donors, yet there are approximately 4,700 people waiting for transplants. People of color are disproportionately affected by illnesses such as hypertension and diabetes, which can lead to the need for dialysis or a kidney transplant, increasing the number of patients on the organ transplant waiting list, according to United Network for Organ Sharing.

On January 1, 2018, a new law spearheaded by White went into effect allowing 16-

become organ/tissue donors. To date, more than 70,000 teens have registered.

Dozens of volunteers participated in the event, which was held on the plaza of the James R. Thompson Center, Chicago in recognition of the awareness week, August 1-7. Vicki Walker, a donor mom, spoke at the event along with Kim Gosell, a three-time kidney recipient, and Freddy Perez, a heart recipient.

## Bank of Pontiac Building Could Open by Dec. 1

The new 3,000-square-foot Bank of Pontiac branch at the corner of Chippewa and Franklin streets in Dwight is coming along as planned and the hope is it will open Dec. 1.

Bill Kauffman, president and CEO, said electrical and plumbing will be finished next week and the outside of the building will be completed by mid-September.

La Macchia Group, which specializes in building banks and credit unions, began the

work in May. It is expected to cost \$2.5 million to complete, Kauffman said.

The former drive-up facility was demolished and operations at the former branch at 132 E. Main St. in Dwight will be moved to the new location.

Kauffman said that the Bank of Pontiac has entered into an agreement with a local agency to occupy the former location. Although he would not elaborate, he said the space would be donated to the agency.

The new branch is being built to better serve customers. It will have a conference

room, four offices, lock boxes and three drive-up lanes, including a drive-up ATM, and employ seven full-time people.

Kauffman said they thought the time was right to invest in Dwight.

"We just felt like our facility was in need of a facelift."

A temporary drive-up trailer is available in the parking lot of Cherry Red Roasters.

Bank of Pontiac also has full-service banking facilities in Coal City, Odell, Pontiac, Fairbury, and Forrest.

### **Every Body Counts**

Statewide census efforts picking up momentum. Every ten years, the U.S. Constitution requires the federal government to conduct a census of the population of the entire United States of America.

These figures are then used for everything from drawing state and federal legislative districts to dividing up hundreds of billions of dollars in funds from federal programs. Our tax dollars go into those programs

- an accurate count of our population is necessary to make sure our area gets its fair share from Uncle Sam.

To ensure that the state of Illinois, and every county and community within, is fully counted, the state has launched a complete count commission, led by Secretary of State Jesse White. The commission is encouraging local groups, whether they are governments, civic organizations or just concerned citizens, to form their own local complete count group to spread the word about the importance of a complete and accurate census of our

The Secretary of State recently shared information suggesting that an undercount of the Illinois population in 2010 might have cost our state and local governments as much as \$952 per person over the course of the decade. Services (DCFS) has issued a new rule requiring Illinois' licensed foster homes to comply with the federal government's National Model Foster Family Home Licensing Standards. The new standards are intended to better protect foster children and to discourage states from routinely transferring children from their birth families to foster homes. The national policy holds that a safe birth family, when it can exist, is always the best family, but acknowledges that in some cases, foster placement is nec-

essary.

Most foster parents will likely already be in compliance with most or all of the new standards. They include home furnishing standards covering things like kitchens, bathrooms and swimming pools.

For example, a foster home will have to have a stove, oven, refrigerator, sink, toilet, shower and bathtub. The standards prohibit foster parents from smoking in their home or motor vehicle. If the home has a swimming pool, it will be required to have pumps, filtering systems and life jackets. Children will also be required to be vaccinated against contagious diseases.

As of June 30, DCFS was tracking 16,091 children statewide who had been removed from their homes by judicial process. In some of these cases, efforts are being made to remediate the situation and reunite the family. However, in about a third of them the process had advanced beyond that point and the kids were now considered to be foster children.

Did You Know? August 10 was the anniversary of the Chatsworth crash, an 1877 train wreck in Livingston County in which a train trestle caught fire and collapsed beneath a train from Peoria.

The wreck killed 85 people and injured 300. It was later determined that the fire had been caused by an improperly-extinguished controlled-burn meant to protect the trestle from the danger of brush fires in that very dry summer.

### Illinois Underfunds Tobacco Cessation Program

Illinois compared favorably to other states in a report by a national advocacy group evaluating cancer reduction policies in all but one area – funding for its cessation program.

After a legislative session in which the General Assembly raised the minimum age to buy tobacco products, increased the usage tax on cigarettes and implemented a tax on e-cigarettes for the first time, an analysis by the American Cancer Society's Cancer Action Network found Illinois does not spend enough money helping those addicted to nicotine to quit.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommends that Illinois spend \$136.7 million on a tobacco prevention and cessation program. According to the report,

Illinois allocates \$9.1 million to the initiative, 6.7% of the recommended level. tlement-related money this fiscal year on "health related programs" – \$4.1 million to run

The solution, the American Cancer Society's Cancer Action Network recommends, would be for the state to spend more money on its cessation program from a multi-state lawsuit it won against the tobacco industry in the late 1990s. Called the Tobacco Master Settlement Agreement, companies agreed to pay several states annual sums to compensate for medical costs related to smoking.

Illinois is being paid more than \$9.1 billion through 2025 as a result of the lawsuit, according to the Department of Public Health.

A spokesperson from the Public Health Department said in an e-mail that Illinois will spend about \$20 million of settlement-related money this fiscal year on "health related programs" – \$4.1 million to run the Quitline, \$5 million for anti-smoking program grants to local health departments, and additional funds allocated to an assortment of other health programs for community health centers.


It is important to fully fund initiatives to help those addicted to nicotine to quit or to prevent youth from beginning to use tobacco products, according to the Action Network report, because states will experience a "greater and quicker" cost savings impact.

No state supports its tobacco prevention and cessation program at the level the CDC recommends, according to the report. Only four states allocate enough money to fund their program to 50% of what the

CDC prescribes.

Democratic Gov. J.B. Pritzker signed into law "Tobacco 21," a measure raising the legal age to purchase products containing nicotine – including cigarettes, e-cigarettes, vapes, and chewing tobacco – from 18 to 21 in early April. Illinois is the first state in the

ing infrastructure projects is a usage tax increase of \$1 on cigarettes and a new tax on e-cigarettes of 15% of the wholesale price. Illinois was recognized in the Action Network report as a "success story" for these initiatives.





### Dwight: Where Big-League Talent Met Smalltown America

Editor's Note: Bill Pearch, a DTHS graduate, researched and wrote an article about baseball in Dwight in the early 1900s for Society for American Baseball Research Journal. It tells about Frank L. Smith's team playing the Chicago Cubs and other pro teams in Dwight. He shared the article with The Paper. His parents are Bill and Mary Ann Pearch, of Dwight.

In her new book, The Big Fella: Babe Ruth and the World He Created, awardwinning author Jane Leavy used a threeweek barnstorming tour from October 1927 as the structure for telling the Sultan of Swat's life story. Baseball barnstorming tours were commonplace in the early 20th century long before free agency, multi-year contracts and life-changing salaries. For baseball fans living too far from majorleague cities, barnstorming tours brought the national pastime much closer to home. These games weren't just exhibitions and sideshow events; these were opportunities for local semi-pro teams to measure their skills against that era's living legends.

Earlier this year, I had a chance encounter with Mary Flott, my former high school English and communications teacher. Recalling my insatiable interest in Chicago Cubs baseball during my days as a student at Dwight High School, she asked if I knew that the Cubs once visited the town and played against a local semi-pro team. Much to my astonishment, I did not. She introduced me to Kim Drechsel, a docent from the Dwight Historical Society.

During my electronic and face-to-face discussions with Drechsel, he unlocked the story of Dwight's semi-pro baseball team from the early 1900s, the F.L. Smiths. At the time – and possibly still today –

Dwight was best known as the home of the Keeley Institute, where alcoholics were administered the Keeley Cure (also known as the "gold cure"). The baseball team's name came from its founder and owner, Colonel Frank Leslie Smith. During his youth, Frank L. Smith was known for his aggressiveness and will to dominate. He had a passion for baseball, but enjoyed even more engaging in the on-field scuffles that oftentimes brought his sandlot games to an early end. As an adult, the Colonel is best known as the chairman of the Illinois Commerce Commission who attempted to buy a United States Senate seat in 1926.

For a community with less than 3,000 residents at that time, the F.L. Smiths attracted several future major leaguers such as "Turkey" Mike Donlin (St. Louis Perfectos/Cardinals, Baltimore Orioles, Cincinnati Reds, New York Giants, Boston Rustlers and Pittsburgh Pirates), George Cutshaw (Brooklyn Dodgers/Superbas/ Robins, Pittsburgh Pirates and Detroit Tigers) and Eddie Higgins (St. Louis Cardinals). Between the years of 1907 and 1915, the F.L. Smiths played at least five barnstorming games against big-league talent from the American, National and Federal leagues. The Detroit Tigers, Washington Senators, Chicago Cubs, Pittsburgh Rebels and Chicago Whales all passed through the village on the Chicago and Alton Railroad southwest of Chicago.

While news clippings exist for each of those games, the treasure of the Dwight Historical Society's collection is a sepia tone photograph from October 22, 1907. The photo is the only known record of the game between Ty Cobb's Detroit Tigers and the F.L. Smiths played at Dwight's West Side Park. The Tigers, having just lost the World Series to the Chicago Cubs, made a brief barnstorming tour through the

Midwest. Detroit hammered Dwight that afternoon, 8-1. Following the game, the locals hosted a banquet in honor of the American League champions.

Contemporary players are often labeled as prima donnas who complain about the difficulties of intercity travel and grueling schedules, but attitudes were much the same 100 years ago. Look no further than July 7, 1915. The Federal League's Pittsburgh Rebels had a nearly one-week-long gap in their schedule and stopped in Dwight for a mid-season exhibition game. Pittsburgh's manager "Rebel" Oakes refused to play his starting roster that afternoon due to players wading through ankle-deep mud at West Side Park. The Rebels were in a pennant race with the Kansas City Packers. As the Pittsburgh Press reported the next morning, "Manager Oakes will probably take defeat from the future greats rather than risk injuring his

Today, nothing remains of Dwight's West Side Park or the F.L. Smiths save for occasional photographs and a few tales documented in local newspapers. The site of the former park, located along what is now old Route 66, consists of apartments and homes today. Frank L. Smith would serve as a member of the United States House of Representative from Illinois' 17th District from 1919 to 1921. In 1921, he became the chairman of the Illinois Commerce Commission. At the close of 1926, Illinois Governor Len Small appointed Smith to fill the U.S. Senate seat of the late William B. McKinley, but the Senate voted to not allow him to qualify due to questionable campaign donations from public utilities. During a special election in 1927, Smith was once again denied. Smith passed away in 1950 at 82.

#### Dresden Station Hosts STEM Merit Badge Clinic

Scouts earned hundreds of merit badges August 10 at Dresden Station in Morris, where the nuclear energy facility hosted more than 400 people from throughout the region in a day-long hands-on STEM Merit Badge Clinic.

It's the seventh year in a row for the partnership between Dresden Station and Boy Scouts of America, which draws Scouts from surrounding towns and much of northern Illinois, as well as Indiana, Wisconsin, and Michigan.

It's the largest clinic to date at the station. Scouts, ages 11 to 17, chose from 17 different categories, including nuclear science, fingerprinting, first aid, and electrical maintenance.

While merit badge clinics exist in other places throughout the country, Dresden's partnership offers a unique element, in that it takes place at a nuclear facility. Additionally, parents and scouts alike praised the level of instructional and institutional knowledge being shared by volunteers – many of whom retired from Exelon after decades-long careers.

In addition to being the largest clinic ever, it was the first time girls participated

Bryan Schulte, an Instrument Maintenance Control System Technician at Dresden, organizes the event on behalf of the station and is also Scout Master of Rainbow Council's Troop 19, in addition to several other instructional roles within the council. As a father of a son and two daughters, he couldn't be more excited to welcome the new and eager participants.

Of the 288 kids signed up to earn badges, 30 of them were girls.

Scouts could potentially pursue two badges from those available: nuclear science; engineering; electricity; electronics; signs, signals, and codes; first aid; medicine; plumbing; bird study; automotive maintenance; farm mechanics; fire safety; traffic safety; railroading; fingerprinting; pet care; and reptiles and amphibians.

About 100 of the Scouts at the clinic camped at the nearby Rainbow Council Scout Camp for the weekend. Dresden Station bussed the scouts from the camp to the station for the day, providing lunch and hours of hands-on educational experience.

This isn't to say there aren't good festivals that take place now, ones like Coachella, and Lollapalooza, Governors Ball. All are bigger and take place in California, Illinois, and New York respectively, but there probably won't be anything that carries the allure that the original Woodstock had.

For the sake of entertainment, however, I hope people keep attempting it, there's something about failed large scale festivals that makes for very good content. The Fyre festival debacle being example A for that. Another one being Woodstock '99 which was successfully completed from start to end, but not without much scrutiny over the safety conditions for the people who attended the event.

I hope people keep trying, I think it's impossible to recreate anything close to the original, but maybe someday, eventually someone will pull it off.



Many people dream of traveling the world in retirement. Such dreams come true every day. But many more retirees or people nearing retirement fear that their dreams of seeing the world won't be possible due to mobility issues beyond their control. Before booking a hotel room abroad, travelers with limited mobility should contact the hotel directly to confirm that it can accommodate their needs.

Men and women with limited mobility can still enjoy the wonders of travel, even if it requires some extra effort before embarking on their trips.





