"We're putting the money back into the community," Morris said.

## Say Good-Bye to Another Harvest 'Daze'

### Rain Forecast Scared Some Away but Everyone in 'Good Spirits'

If you could sum up Dwight's 40th annual Harvest Days, organizer Randy Irvin said, "The weatherman was no friend."

Forecasters had predicted heavy rainfall and flooding for the Chicagoland area for the weekend, but the rain actually held off until late afternoon Sunday for Dwight. The threat of downpours affected the vendor show, grand parade and attendance on Sunday.

"It played into attendance big time," Irvin said. "The scary forecast kept people away and vendors away the second day."

The actual weather showed that the weatherman isn't always right. Late Saturday afternoon, the National Weather Service called for 2-3 inches of rain on Sunday for half of Livingston County. The two-day total rainfall in Dwight? 1.01 inch.

None of the events throughout the weekend were canceled because of the weather and Saturday was actually quite busy. There were some sprinkles and an occasional light rain both days, but that didn't stop people from coming out Saturday to enjoy the vendor fair, food and carnival. Four games of mud volleyball were played under sprinkles, which only made it more fun. Fifty-four teams competed in the bags tournament. The kiddie parade had overcast but dry weather on Saturday. Saturday night, there were about 70 players for bingo, Irvin said.

Friday's car show, which was moved downtown this year, was "massive," Irvin said, with more than 170 vehicles on display.

He said he and other volunteers got plenty of good feedback on the new carnival by Skinner's Amusements, "which everyone loved." People also loved the new mobile escape room; the majority of time slots were booked, he said.

Sunday's weather called for plenty of rain, which kept many vendors from coming back to the craft show on Sunday. Only 36 participants came out for the parade -- about half that were expected, said Erica Snyder, who oversaw the event. But the bands didn't let the weather dampen their enthusiasm; nine of 13 marched in the parade.

"All in all, people showed up in good spirits," she said.

Irvin echoed that sentiment.

Overall, "Considering the weather, things went good."

**Former Dwight Teacher Faces Charges of Sexually Exploiting a High School Student**

A former Dwight teacher will be arraigned in court Oct. 15 on charges of sexually exploiting a 17-year-old male Dwight Township High School student.

Maleah White, 34, of Dwight, faces misdemeanor sex charges after she allegedly sent unclothed photos of herself to the student in May 2018. The incident was not reported until August of this year.

According to a police press release, on Aug. 20, an anonymous caller on the "Report It" system at the high school said they believed there was an inappropriate relationship between White and a student. The system alerts the administration and school resource officer.

Dwight police conducted the investigation along with the Department of Children and Family Services, the Pontiac and Morris Police Departments, Livingston County Sheriff's Police, Children's Advocacy Center and the Livingston County State's Attorney's Office, which charged White with sexual exploitation of a child.

After being contacted by *The Paper*, a written press release was provided by the Dwight Police Department.

Dwight Township High School Superintendent Rich Jancek said White was a substitute teacher from 2009 up until a couple years ago, when she worked as a part-time technology instructor at the grade school. She also coached track and volleyball at the high school.

Jancek said she resigned her position in

early August in order to take a teaching position in Pontiac. Pontiac Township High School Superintendent Jon Kilgore said she was approved to coach volleyball but only coached during a few practices.

"She is no longer with our volleyball team in any way, shape or form," Kilgore said.

It's unclear if she was offered a job at the Pontiac grade school and Kilgore would not comment if she was offered a job at the high school.

Sexual exploitation of a child is a Class A misdemeanor.

Sexual exploitation of a child is a Class 4 felony if the victim was under 13 years of age at the time of the commission of the offense.

**Livingston County Board District 2 Vacancy**

# DTHS Approves FY20 Budget

The Dwight Township High School Board of Education approved the FY20 budget as presented when the DTHS Board of Education met on September 18.

Following a Public Hearing, Superintendent Dr. Richard Jancek presented the 2019-2020 budget with a starting balance of \$6,551,198. The Education Fund continues to be very healthy with a projected positive FY20 revenue and expenditure difference of \$71,370 and a projected FY20 end balance of \$4,211,116. Proposed FY20 revenues across all funds are expected to be \$5,918,318 with proposed expenditures across all funds totaling \$6,069,511, for a negative difference of \$151,193. The projected FY20 end balance across all funds is \$6,400,005. While all district funds remain very healthy, the negative revenue versus expenditure difference shown in some funds is the result of a BOE direction to begin spending down some of the larger fund balances.

"The High School District continues to be very healthy," stated Dr. Jancek.

Also in financials, it was reported that the State of Illinois currently owes the District \$47,404.45 in financial reimbursements for the 2018 - 19 school year. For the current year, the State is flush with the district.

In other matters, the board continues to work towards the installation of an elevator to access the second floor of the building. Originally planned for this past summer, in June the project was cancelled when

complications surfaced along with continued delays of the project by the then-contractor. Last week, the board approved entering into a new contract with Dewberry Architects Inc. for design, construction documents, bidding and negotiations, and construction administration of a two-stop elevator. Dewberry's contracted fees are \$98,500.

The board discussed the anticipated Building Principal opening and the interview process for filling the position. Two internal candidates are being considered for the position and a recommendation is expected to be presented to the board next month. Current DTHS Principal Dan Kaiser had notified the district of his intent to retire at the end of this school year, leaving an opening for the 2020-21 school year.

Approval of a proposed intergovernmental agreement by and between DTHS and Gardner-South Wilmington High School regarding co-op sports was again tabled until a pending meeting between designated members of both school boards takes place. As part of the proposed agreement, GSW athletes would provide their own transportation between Gardner and Dwight for practices during the season, to Dwight for home and away contests, as well as out of season voluntary practices. The agreement states that DTHS will be held harmless for any claims, damages or liability arising out of this transportation agreement. Previously, the DTHS BOE had requested that transportation for athletes to Dwight and back to Gardner would be provided.

Mrs. Lindsey Jensen, 2018 Illinois Teacher of the Year, was present providing a report to the board on the week-long program she was invited to participate in at Harvard this summer. The course focused on Family and Community Engagement - the critical partnership among families, educators and the community with regard to promoting learning and development from birth through college and career. Jensen noted that Dwight's initiatives towards family and community engagement were discussed as part of the program at Harvard.

"I think it is something we do really well here," Mrs. Jensen told the board. "There were moments when, at Harvard University in July with 162 of the most influential educational leaders in the country, Dr. Karen Mack, the guru of family engagement in the nation, was talking about Dwight Township High School...they were talking about us at Harvard...as a community and as a school. It was amazing."

In other business, the BOE:

- accepted the resignation of William Herr, Maintenance Worker.
- affirmed employment of Madison Herlan, Substitute Teacher.
- affirmed employment of Steven Mann, Substitute Teacher.
- affirmed employment of Kristen Telford, Paraprofessional.
- affirmed employment of Alisha Horrie, Paraprofessional.
- approved early graduation requests from three DTHS seniors.
- approved student atten-

dance to the FFA Convention October 30 - November 2 in Indianapolis.

- approved student attendance to FCCLA Conferences on October 6 - 7 in Springfield and on October 22 in Bloomington.

- approved EIS Administrator and Teacher salary and benefits report.

- approved IASB Press Plus Board Policy Updates (Second Reading)

- learned that BOE members Brian Perschnick and Betty Gantzert will be recognized by the IASB as Master Board Members.

- heard a report from teacher Sid Mau and FFA students.

Dr. Jancek also noted that Friday, September 27, there will be an early release of students (10 to 15 minutes early) from school due to an electrical upgrade/power outage taking place at Dwight Grade School that afternoon. The early release will allow student pickup and bus schedules to coordinate at both schools.

Congratulations are in order for all those involved with the technical, physical and financial aspects of the 40th Anniversary Dwight Harvest Days. It was a fast-paced collection of activities over four days, and presented in spite of interruptions by Mother Nature. The crowds are also to be congratulated.

The week before Harvest Days the Public Works superintendent contacted an unofficial, bench painter/repairman, and asked him to replace some wood on a bench in the planted area near the central cross-town sidewalk between West and East Main streets.

There were some problems, but R.P. Lumber in Streator, Ace Hardware in Dwight, public works personnel and the unofficial bench painter/repairman combined efforts to produce a rehabbed bench on which people could sit and rest during the weekend festivities.

The village has a total of 37 wooden benches in the downtown area, Renfrew Park, and Pinecone Path.

In 2011, the former Impact Dwight organization replaced and repainted the wood on seven benches in Pinecone Path between Columbia and Franklin Streets.

Impact Dwight was swallowed up when the Dwight Economic Alliance was

formed by combining a number of local organizations, but some of the former members of Impact cobbled together a group in 2016 that replaced the wood on 15 benches in Renfrew Park with new 2x4x6' planks.

Painting took place in the former pressroom at *The Paper* and other locations around town, then the planks were taken to the Park and bolted in place. (It should be noted that public works people had to cut off lots of rusty bolts to remove the old planks.)

A quick survey of those benches would indicate they are still in good condition, but could use some patching and another coat of paint.

See where this is heading?

I think the village could use a Friends of the Park committee to take care of matters like this. It's mundane work -- pick up, clean up, paint up, trim up, but it's fun if you have a little extra time and the inclination to keep Dwight a better than average village. It's a self-satisfying endeavor.

**August Video Gaming**

The State of Illinois added 247 video gaming terminals at 35 locations during August, now having 32,561 terminals in 7,079 establishments. State income from the vgts was \$39,618,042 compared to \$37,613,496 in July.

Funds gambled in Dwight slipped from \$621,455 in July to \$585,191 in August, though the village share was higher in August, \$7,706, than in July, \$7,684.

**Risk factors for suicide are varied. Responses must be tailored to be effective.**

Suicidal behaviours are complex. Research and evidence indicate that no single cause or stressor alone can explain a suicidal act. The foundation of prevention is to understand what puts a person at risk.

**Chronic illness: a deadly risk**

There is a potentially deadly interplay between chronic pain and illness, and suicidal behaviour. Evidence shows the risk is two to three times higher in those with chronic pain. All illnesses that are associated with pain, physical disability, neurodevelopmental impairment and distress increase the risk of suicide.

These include chronic diseases such as cancer, diabetes and HIV/AIDS which can create a deadly risk for suicide.

Experts call it multicausality – an interplay of biological, psychological, social, environmental and cultural factors. For example, the communities that people live in and the support available, as well as stigma, religious and legal factors can be involved.

*With awareness, commitment and action we can save lives. Together.*

A person's immediate relationships with family, friends and significant others as well as psychological and cognitive functions play important roles. Identifying and restricting access to the means of suicide are also key to prevention, such as limiting access to pesticides and firearms, or barriers on subways and bridges.

It is important to note that most people who engage in suicidal behaviour are ambivalent about wanting to die, and suicides can be impulsive responses to acute stressors.
