

Gardner-South Wilmington High School Board Meets

Hears Reports from Principal, Superintendent

Gardner-South Wilmington High School District 73 Board met Wednesday, October 16, with no public comment.

Mr. Engelman, Principal, told of a possible change in the RVC, with two new schools wanting to join. These schools have joined the IHSA (for high school sports) and IESA (for junior high sports). A meeting is scheduled for November 14 to vote to add the teams to the current RVC. If they are added, there would be eight teams in the RVC.

Mr. Engelman also reported on the 11:30 a.m. early dismissal on October 11 for students, and professional development in the afternoon for staff when the Grundy County Police Department members were here for a Stop the Bleed presentation/hands-on training.

GSW used grant money to purchase 38 Stop the Bleed kits for the building and will receive a few additional kits from the Regional Office of Education. The police officers also had a building safety refresher discussion.

Gardner Woman Killed in Crash

The Grundy County Coro- bound tractor-trailer loaded ner John W. Callahan has released details of the October 24 crash that claimed the life of a 35-year old Gardner woman.

Coroner Callahan states Samantha M. Serena, of Gardner, was pronounced dead at the scene at 7:35 p.m. by Coroner Callahan.

Miss Serena was westbound on Goodfarm Road when she went through the intersection of Campus Blacktop without stopping - striking a southwith beans.

The crash caused the trailer to open, spilling a large amount of beans onto the highway. Several hours went by for clean-up and getting the proper equipment to the scene before extrication could take place by Gardner Fire.

The crash remains under investigation by Callahan's office and the Grundy Sheriff's department.

Early last week the Chicago Tribune featured several pictures of the marching, striking Chicago school teachers on its front pages.

Teachers, and their supporters, had taken to the streets to protest a number of matters they felt were not being properly considered by Chicago's Mayor Lightfoot and her Board of Education.

I tried to remember some of the teachers I had while in school in Dwight, and I found it impossible to imagine Miss Ellis, the Wiegman sisters, Mister Coe, Mr. Kresl, Miss Jarman or Miss Leasman beating drums, waving their fists, yelling slogans, waving banners, posters -- in order to get their demands turned into some favored legislation.

My teachers years ago may have gone face to face with the Principal over some matters, I don't know -- but it was impossible to imagine them in those Tribune photos of the striking teachers.

Greg Hinz in Crain's says the teachers' strike is a struggle between the Mayoralcontrolled Chicago Board of Education and the Chicago Teacher's Union as to who controls the classrooms.

ing weaponry. What do the students think? What is their percep-

tion of an Illinois education? In 2000, 29% of Illinois high school grads enrolled in out-of-state colleges. In 2017 it was 48% who left Illinois seeking a college education.

The really bad news concerning the student exodus to out-of-state colleges is that the young men and women who leave are oftimes the best, the most highly recruited. Many of them also find a job out-of-state after graduation.

Gov. Pritzker has been throwing money at the problem, with \$50-million designated for higher education and \$25-million for Aim High grants to retain the best students.



How to store firewood the right way



A fireplace is a cozy and warm spot around which a family can gather. The home and real estate resource HomeGuides.com indicates that 60 percent of new homes have a fireplace, which is up from 36 percent in the 1970s.

Naturally, fueling a fireplace for the season may require homeowners with wood-burning units to keep an ample supply of wood at the ready. How that wood is stored is important, as properly stored firewood can prevent waste and other issues around the house

Wood that is freshly cut has a water content of 60 percent or more. Yet, for best burning ability, wood should be near 20 percent in water content. Green wood is hard to ignite and will not burn nearly as well or efficiently as seasoned wood. Another concern associated with green wood is that it can contribute more to creosote accumulation in the flue of a fireplace. Creosote is a combustible material that may lead to fires if left unchecked.

According to BioAdvanced®, a science-based lawn, garden and home improvement innovator, seasoning wood typically takes six months to a year. Homeowners may opt to purchase seasoned wood that already has sat and dried.

Homeowners who have an abundance of firewood have to store it somewhere. Log Splitters Direct suggests choosing a dry, breezy area of the property that is about 20 feet from the nearest door to the house. This helps avoid hitchhiker pests from coming inside with the wood, such as termites, ants, spiders, and mice. Do not stack the wood flush against a structure. It should be at least a few inches away to allow airflow behind the stack.

Stick to organized rows of wood no more than four feet high. Log racks and pallets and posts will keep the wood up and off of the ground where moisture and rotting can develop. Placing the logs in an unorganized pile will impede air flow and cause the wood to rot rather than continue to dry and season even more.

Homeowners also should use a cover to protect seasoned firewood from the elements. Position a tarp or plastic sheeting so it blankets the top of the stack and extends a few inches down the sides. Keep the sides mostly exposed to air. Others prefer to stack it in a barn or shed or under an overhang.


Green wood is less expensive than seasoned wood. Those who prefer this method should do so in the early spring and let it season over the next several months.

Bankrate says that the cost of a cord of wood varies across the country, but in general one can expect to pay between \$120 and \$180 for a cord of hardwood that is split and seasoned. This price may be higher in mid-winter when demand increases.



Did you know? According to a survey Home-

Advisor found that the average kitchen remodeling project took six weeks to complete. • Safety: Trips and falls can occur at night when trying to traverse walkways and landscapes in the dark, as it can be difficult to see rocks, stairs and uneven pavement. Outdoor lighting can illuminate pathways, entryways and other areas for safer access for homeowners and their guests.

• Extend outdoor entertaining: Ample lighting can increase the amount of time one can use outdoor spaces and make them the perfect gathering spot. As autumn arrives, days become shorter. However, patios, porches and more can get extended use with lighting.

• Safeguard security: A well-lit home may be less likely to be targeted by burglars than one swathed in darkness and shadows. Lights can remain on all evening or be motion-triggered. Setting lights on timers also ensures that the home is illuminated whether residents are home or not.

• Create drama: Landscape lighting designers can establish focal points around the landscape and highlight the best features of a property. Uplighting in trees, silhouetting techniques to showcase plants and spotlights to show off architectural features are all options for homeowners to consider.

• Add value: The experts at Parker Homescape, a landscape design service, say that exterior lighting can add roughly 30 percent to the value of a home. They also indicate that 50 percent of all home buyers say that outdoor lighting is important when buying a home. If current residents are thinking about selling, now may be the time to invest in exterior lighting.

Improving a home's exterior may be as simple as adding more lighting to improve functionality and beauty.

How to protect wood floors from inclement weather

Wood floors are a worthwhile investment that can improve the beauty and function of just about any room in a home. Even though wood floors are durable, and new protective treatments help seal out many of the things that may have damaged floors in the past, homeowners still need to prioritize protecting their hardwood floors.

Certain seasons of the year can be more harsh on wood floors than others. For example, seasons characterized by moisture and precipitation, particularly the early spring, winter and fall, can be hard on wood floors. The experts at ServiceMaster Clean say that cold, snowy days can damage wood floors, and Lumber Liquidators agrees that winter weather can be harsh on flooring.

Homeowners need not give up on hardwood if they live in an area that sees all four seasons. They just need to take a few steps to keep floors looking beautiful.

· Clean up the salt. Salt that keeps sidewalks and streets clear of snow and ice inadvertently gets tracked inside a home. Hard chunks of salt can scratch wood floors, and, if left to sit, that salt can eventually cause white marks and other stains. Routinely vacuuming and sweep-

ing up salt is necessary to protect wood floors.

· Invest in shoe Wet or storage. snowy boots can create puddles around the house. Have a special mat or tray by the front door where wet shoes can be kept. A nice bench in the entryway makes it easy for residents and guests to remove their shoes until it's time to go back outside.

· Use waterwicking mats Homeowners will probably need a

few extra mats around to tame errant drips and wipe shoes. Any entrance that might be used by people or pets should be protected. Try to avoid petroleum-based, rubber-backed mats, as they could discolor the wood floor.

• Control humidity indoors. Cold, dry air in a home can be problematic because the moisture in the wood can eventually evaporate into the air. The heat will suck that moisture from the flooring, causing it to shrink, creak and splinter and become more brittle. Think about investing in an in-line humidifier for the home's HVAC system that can keep a moderate amount of humidity in the home. Hardwood floorboards are installed to accommodate minor temperature and humidity fluctuations. This is typically a range of between 60 and 80 degrees F with a relative humidity range of 35 to 55 percent, advises ServiceMaster.

• Use the right cleaning products. Avoid excessive water to clean wood floors, and select soaps that are specially designed for wood flooring. Consult with the flooring manufacturer for a list of detergents that are safe to use.

With proper care, hardwood flooring can survive rain, snow and cold weather.

It's All In a Tree

George Monbiot, environmental activist, says "there is a magic machine that sucks carbon out of the air, costs very little, and builds itself. It's called a tree. [...] A natural climate solution." The statement leaves you baffled. Simply planting a tree can help solve climate change.

In school, we learned that trees take carbon from the air, and through photosynthesis, convert it to oxygen, sugars, and cellulose. The oxygen is released into the air, sugar gives the tree energy to grow, and the cellulose becomes new wood. As the tree grows, more and more carbon is held in the tissues of the tree. Then, when the tree dies, the carbon is slowly released into the soil and back into the atmosphere.

But it is not enough to just plant a tree. Many trees planted in urban environments do not survive for long due to incorrect planting. The tree needs to grow and thrive for the effect on climate change we are seeking. When we plant trees correctly, we help them get through transplant shock.

One of the most critical mistakes people make is planting trees too deep. When preparing to plant, you must find the top root, and plant up to that level no higher. Sometimes the tree is planted too deep at the nursery, so gently remove the soil by hand from the trunk, until you find a root. This one small step before planting will improve the establishment of the tree and drastically increase the life expectancy of the tree.

A second mistake is overmulching. Mulching is a huge benefit to trees - the practice conserves water, insulates roots, reduces weed competition, and helps avert lawn mower damage. Yet too much mulch is a tree killer. When mulch is piled against the trunk of a tree, a handful of stresses are easily introduced: moisture build-up encourages rot and insect access, rodents have suitable coverage for nibbling on the tender young bark; and new roots may try to grow in the mulch, where they quickly dry out. It is important to understand that tree bark breathes through little dots called lenticels, helping the plant break down sugars when they are unable to photosynthesize.

A third mistake is thinking you can plant the tree and walk away. Trees need nurturing until well-established and can survive the environment on its own. Watering newly planted trees is essential. In the process of getting to your yard, the tree has lost roots and is super stressed. A good rule of thumb is to water two gallons per inch of tree diameter, every week. Check the first two inches of topsoil around the tree. When the topsoil is dry, it is time to

Learn from tree failure in the urban landscape by not making these three mistakes, and you can contribute to the natural climate solution, using trees to sequester carbon.

Village of Odell Trustees Mull Cannabis' 3% Tax

Five Village of Odell trustees were present, along with Mayor Brian Mills, at the September 9 regular board meeting.

August 12 meeting minutes were approved by roll call vote.

The treasurer's report for the month ending July 31 was emailed to the Mayor and board members as it was not complete for the August meeting. A copy of the July treasurer's report was included with the September meeting

Trustees Morris and Russell reported that not a lot of studies have been completed on the legalization of cannabis. Colorado studies show that basically there are no negative effects, but there are pros and cons to the issue.

They also suggest a public "Question and Answer" session be scheduled.

Trustee Morris moved to approve that Odell collect the 3% sales tax should the Village legalize the sale of cannabis in the future. Brian Verdun seconded the motion, and by roll call vote it was approved with "yeas" from Brian Verdun, Lisa Lambert, Rodney Morris and Tom Russell. One dissent was by Mark Tissiere.

The Amended Junk Car Ordinance was approved by roll call vote, as was the fence variance at 212 W. Hamilton St. It had been recommended by the zoning board.

Jennifer Leenders was appointed IMRF Agent.

The Mayor reported there are 11 trees to be removed, three to be trimmed, and five stumps to be removed, and the Village received two bids for the work: \$4,750.00 from Trost Tree Removal, and \$4,490.00 from Bradbury Tree Removal. All Trustees approved the Bradbury bid.

Discussed was the structure of one of the downtown Front Street buildings, and it was decided to proceed with the next

state highway projects. On Monday the Illinois Department released its long-awaited list of projects to be funded by the Rebuild Illinois capital program passed this spring. It includes hundreds of millions of dollars over the next six years for dozens of projects in all five counties of the 106th dis-

A lot of details still remain to be worked out regarding the timing of these projects, which are scheduled to occur between now and the year 2025. The list released this week includes only state projects. Additional funds are being made available to cities, counties and townships, and they will be releasing their own lists of projects in the future.

These newly-announced projects include work such as a rehabilitation of pavement on Route 9 in Ford County, and a series of improvements to Illinois Route 17 in Livingston

All told, the big picture for the 106th district is: 113 projects on 471.49 miles of state roads for a total investment in our area of \$410,417,000.

Legislation filed to eliminate automatic pay hikes for legislators. This spring, legislators received a pay raise which we did not deserve Back in the 1980s, the General Assembly enacted a law to give legislators automatic costof-living adjustments each year unless the House and Senate specifically act to stop them. To prevent the raise from going into effect each year, the legislature can pass a bill preventing it. Now we have legislation which will change the 1980s law and do away with the automatic pay raise altogether.

House Bill 3910 will phase out and end the automatic costof-living pay adjustments for legislators effective at the start of the next fiscal year on July 1. Because legislative pensions are also tied to lawmakers' pay, stopping these annual increases would have the added benefit to taxpayers of reducing the future cost of General Assembly pensions. The bill has been referred to the House Rules Committee.





Jesse White Promotes National

Teen Driver Safety Week at Safety Fair

Jesse White announced that teen driver deaths are down 69% since 2007. White made the announcement during National Teen Driver Safety Week, October 20-26, as he joined the Illinois Partners for Traffic Safety at the House of Hope in Chicago.

According to the Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT), since White's efforts to overhaul the state's graduated driver licensing (GDL) laws took effect in 2008, teen driving fatalities have dropped more than 60%. So far this year, there have been 32 teens killed in traffic crashes. Many cite White's nationally heralded GDL program for the dramatic decrease in fatalities.

Motor vehicle crashes are


(NHTSA). In 2017, there were 2,247 people killed in the U.S. in crashes involving a teen driver, according to NHTSA. 48 teens were killed in traffic crashes in 2018, according to IDOT. In 2017, 77 teens were killed in crashes, IDOT reported. In 2007, the year before White's stronger GDL laws took effect. 155 teens were killed in crashes.

More than 500 Chicagoarea high school students attended the safety fair which included rollover and driving simulators, a golf cart driving range, motorcycle awareness presentations and a perform-

Illinois' GDL program better prepares teen drivers by giving them more time to obtain valuable driving experience while under the watchful eye of an adult, limiting in-car distractions and requiring teens to earn their way from one stage to the next by avoiding traffic convictions.

White emphasized the important roles that parents, teachers and driver education instructors play in preparing safe and responsible teen drivers. State and national traffic safety organizations have praised Illinois' stronger GDL program as one of the best in the nation. 





Federal REAL ID Mandate Takes Effect October 1, 2020

Illinois Secretary of State Jesse White is reminding Illinoisans that the federal REAL ID mandate takes effect on October 1, 2020. For Illinois residents who fly domestically, effective Oct. 1, 2020, the federal government will require you to use a valid U.S. passport or obtain a REAL ID from the Illinois Secretary of State's of-

It is important to know the following key points:

• You have a choice. You do not need a REAL ID if you have a valid U.S. passport, military ID, or other TSA-acceptable form of identification. These documents will be accepted for domestic air travel. For a complete list of acceptdocuments, visit: www.tsa.gov/travel/security-

screening/identification. • You do not need a REAL ID if you do not fly domestically

or visit secure federal facilities. • However, if you want to apply for a REAL ID, go prepared with the necessary documents.

• Customers are encouraged to visit www.REALID.ilsos.gov and use the interactive document checklist to help ensure process more efficient.

• Customers are asked to be patient at facilities, as the process to apply for a REAL ID takes longer due to the multiple documents required by federal government.

 Customers are also encouraged to take advantage of the many online services allowing patrons to conduct business from home. Some online transactions include: obtaining a duplicate driver's license or ID card, renewing a vehicle registration, obtaining a driver record abstract or renewing a standard driver's license with the Safe Driver Renewal Program.

now a permanent option for Illinois residents.

Current Illinois driver's licenses or ID cards will be accepted for domestic air travel or to enter secure federal facilities until Oct. 1, 2020. According to the federal government, a valid U.S. passport, passport card, and military ID are some acceptable alternatives to a REAL ID real-id-public-faqs. card.

The REAL ID Act is a federal mandate by the U.S. Department of Homeland Security that sets standards for state-issued DL/IDs by making identification documents more secure to combat fraud and

identity theft. REAL ID cards meet security requirements set by the federal government and have a gold star marking the top right corner. Standard DL/IDS that do not comply with requirements of the federal REAL ID Act are marked with the Phrase "Federal Limits Apply," as called for by the federal law.

Based on federal guidelines, to obtain an Illinois REAL ID card, all applications - including those who currently hold a standard Illinois DL/ID – must provide:

 One document proving identity (examples: a certified U.S. birth certificate, a U.S. Passport, an employment authorization document, a permanent resident card or a foreign passport with an approved I-94 form). Important: Name change documents, such as certified copies of a marriage certificate, etc., will be required if the applicant presents they take the proper documents a certified birth certificate with to the facility, making the a name different from his/her current name. Multiple name change documents will be required if the applicant's name has changed multiple times.

· One document proving Social Security Number (SSN) (examples: an SSN card, a W-2 or a pay stub with full SSN).

 Two documents proving residency with the applicant's correct name and address (examples: a utility bill, rental agreement, deed/title, bank statement or credit card statement).

· One document proving signature (examples: a credit/debit card, a canceled check or a current Illinois DL/ID).

Section 6: That should any clause, sentence, paragraph or a part of this Ordinance be declared by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, such decision shall not affect the validity of the Ordinance as a whole or any part thereof other than the part so declared to be invalid.

Section 7: That the Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the Kempton Community Fire Protection District is hereby directed to publish this Ordinance once within thirty (30) days of passage in The Paper, a newspaper of general circulation in both the District and in each of the counties included in the District.

Section 8: That the Secretary of the Board of Trustees of the Kempton Community Fire Protection District is hereby directed to file a certified copy of this Ordinance with the County Clerks of the Counties of Ford, Livingston and Iroquois, Illinois, as required by law, together with a certificate of publication

Section 9: This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and posting in accordance with the law.
