New Info Unearthed About Famous Cardiff Coal Mine Photograph

New information has just been discovered about one of the most famous photographs of the Cardiff coal mine.

The photograph, which was produced as a postcard scene, identifies the people in the picture after more than a hundred

Cardiff was located between Dwight and Herscher. It was a booming mining town, from the time coal was discovered in 1899 until the Wabash Railroad stopped buying its coal in 1912. The town declined rapidly after that. Stores were dismantled for the lumber, and houses were picked up and placed on railroad flat cars and moved to a number of places across Livingston County and elsewhere. An entire neighborhood in Kankakee is made of former Cardiff houses.

At its peak, Cardiff had a population close to 2,500 plus two banks, two grain elevators, a large school, a church, a baseball diamond and grandstand (with lights for night baseball), a soft drink bottling plant, a candy factory, dance halls, a bowling alley, meat markets, clothing stores, bakeries, barber shops, a millinery shop, livery stables, general stores, blacksmith shops, a real estate and insurance office, a doctor's office, a post office, an opera house and an automobile dealership in 1902 when there were

few automobiles or hard roads. Cardiff had a pressurized water system, a gas works system and an electric light plant. It had a depot where two railroad lines stopped. There was a racetrack behind the livery stable for horse racing. Cardiff had a semi-pro football team. There also was a first class hotel with a cuisine that was said to be the finest between Chicago and St. Louis.

And it had a couple dozen saloons.

Today, a dozen or so houses remain in the area, and one business, Romanetto's Welding. There are still some fragments of cement sidewalks remaining.

Andy Kelleher, a Dwight historian, has acquired a postcard that shows the coal mining operation. The picture is one of

many taken by professional photographers to sell as postcards, in an era when "penny postcards" were a popular form of communication.

The picture shows two women at the top of the hill. Information on the back of the postcard identifies the two women – for the first time since the photograph was taken more than 110 years ago.

The women are Rosie Bertoncello and Margaret Mey-

Rosie worked at John Mamer's tile factory in Campus. Margaret Meyers was the daughter of Henry Meyers, who owned a saloon and restaurant in Cardiff.

Dwight Accepts Surplus Property Bids

November 12 Dwight Village Board Actions

Bid openings for five Village of Dwight-owned vacant lots took place at the November 12 meeting of the Dwight

Board of Trustees. The ordinance authorizing the sale of the surplus village property required a minimum \$2,000 bid. Bids were also to include the intended proposed use for the property. The board accepted the high bid on each property as follows:

• 221 E. Waupansie Street – Bid \$2,500; James Fleishman; adjacent property owner (only bid)

300 Odell Road - Bid \$2,000; Jarrard Emmons; adjacent property owner (only bid)

• 305 E. Delaware Street – Bid \$3,187; Chris and Kim Frauli; intent to build house (two bids received)

• 411 W. Delaware Street – Adam Christensen; Bid \$2,500; intent to build on lot or extend adjacent property (only bid)

• 1201 S. Union Street – No bids received

An official ordinance to approve the accepted bids is required and will be presented for board approval at the next village board meeting.

In his report, Village President Jared Anderson acknowledged the ten-year anniversary of Heritage Woods in the Village of Dwight. Mayor Ander-

bed Alzheimer's and memory loss facility to be built in Dwight. The new facility will be located to the south of the current Heritage Woods loca-

"That is very fortunate for Dwight," stated Anderson. "This will serve a very good purpose that is much needed."



October Video Gaming

October gambling on video gaming terminals in Illinois took place at 7,121 locations, only 19 more than in September, and on only 32,823 terminals, a reduction of 1,190 machines.

That could be a rather ominous reduction in the number of terminals, but the total amount of

money gambled in Dwight during October once again pierced the \$600,000 level on the 50 terminals in the village.

Dwight's take also increased, to \$7,666 from \$6,707 a month ago.



But there is more. Most people looking at this picture will never notice there are two other women there. Look at the long steps leading up to the left side of the tipple building. There are two figures on the landing. They are identified as Clara and Rachel Taylor. There was a Ralph Taylor who operated the Hotel Cardiff.

The postcard was sent by Margaret Mevers to her sister. Dr. Mary Urbain, in Hamilton, Ohio. There are descendants of the Urbain family today in Her-

The message on the back of the postcard says, "Dear Sis. What do you think of this? Don't I look natural? I didn't intend to have my picture there but I and Rosie B. happened to be at the shaft when it was taken. It is cold here today. We have fire in the hard coal stove. Margaret and I went to Campus this A.M."

Margaret Meyers' sister, Goldie, married Joseph Roquet in 1906, in the year's top social event that united two prominent Cardiff families. Joseph and Goldie had a daughter, Mary, born in Cardiff in 1912. Mary married Louis McCabe and returned to Cardiff in 2007 for the dedication of the state historical memorial. Mrs. McCabe came back in September 2012 for one last visit when she was dying of cancer. She died on February 18, 2013, at the age of 101.

(Note: this writer published two books about the history of Cardiff and other coal mining towns in Livingston, Grundy, Kankakee and Will counties. The books contain numerous photos, including pictures of the people mentioned here and pictures of Cardiff when it was a big town. A history of Campus is included in the books, which are on sale at Campus State Bank).

Marijuana. Weed. Pot. What wonderful stuff. What a terrible drug.

Medical uses of marijuana have been proven to be of benefit to those suffering from arthritis, epilepsy, glaucoma, multiple sclerosis.

But smoking marijuana can lead to breathing problems, especially long-term use: chronic cough, bronchitis, asthma, cystic fibrosis.

I presume most everyone knows that January 1, 2020, just a month and a half away, is the date when lines will allegedly form at locations where recreational marijuana ("smokable, edible, rub-it-onyour-skin-able, drinkable, chewable, whatever," Rex Huppke, Trib) will be legally sold in Illinois for the first

The subject of marijuana took up quite a lot of time at an Ordinance, Judicial and Licensing committee meeting preceding the regular Dwight Village Council meeting November 12.

Dwight Police Chief Tim Henson said he was concerned about the additional enforcement of laws that would be necessary if sales were allowed in Dwight.

Dwight wanted to be prepared, and after bringing up the mostly negative aspects of marijuana use, the committee

decided to have a full Council vote at the next regular meeting, Nov. 25, on a motion to not allow the sale of recre-

ational marijuana in Dwight. One out-of-towner to whom I broached the marijuana question replied, "I think you (Dwight) should go for it. As bad off as Illinois is, what difference will it make?

You need the money.' A local source: "Half the town has used marijuana, onefourth of those 18 and up are using it now -- we're surrounded by drinkers and drunks. What's the problem?"

Gov. Pritzker expects \$500-million annually in taxes from his newly-created recreational marijuana industry. Communities can charge a 3% tax on sales. As usual, the Pritzker plan, like video gaming, shorts the towns while the big guy in Springfield pads his budget.

In Chicago, recreational marijuana dispensaries are planned to be all over in the poorest areas, a supposed payback for the drug problems that have enslaved the areas. Go figure.

Eleven states have legalized recreational use of mari-

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





Dwight Grade School District Prepares 2019 Tax Levy November 13 DOE Actions

The Dwight Common School District #232 Board of Education met on November 13 when District Superintendent Dr. Richard Jancek gave a financial presentation which included the projected 2019 EAV and recommendations for the upcoming tax levy.

According to Livingston County assessors, the projected 2019 EAV for the Dwight Grade School District is expected to have risen approximately \$8 million over last year for an 8.60 percent increase and projected EAV \$100,970,100. At the time of the meeting, official Grundy County assessment numbers were still pending. Using an inflated 3.09 percent Grundy County EAV over last year, Dr. Jancek put together his best "guesstimate" for his recommendation to the board.

Using a 2019 total EAV estimate of \$126,970,100, Dr. Jancek presented his recommendations for the 2019 tax levy rate and extension. The recommended 2019 tax rate is \$3.2004 with a projected extension of \$4,063,497. Dr. Jancek explained that while this is a .07 cent tax abatement of the overall rate, with this recommended scenario the extension would be projected to increase by approximately \$191,972 or 4.96 percent due to the increased EAV. So, while taxpayers would see a .07 cent decrease in the tax rate from the school district, due to the increased EAV, tax bills could still increase. The 2018 tax levy rate was \$3.2756 with an extension of \$3,871,525.

"We are very healthy now," Dr. Jancek told the board. "This is the healthiest we have been in a long, long time and a long time since we have had these kind of fund balances, so we want to make sure that is protected and we stay healthy.'

No action was taken. Once final EAV numbers are received from Grundy County and applied, adjustments may be necessary. The BOE will review and discuss any adjustments to the tax levy proposal before adopting the final 2019 Tax Levy at its December meeting.

In other financial business, it was reported that the State of Illinois has now made all of its mandated categorical payments for the 2018-19 school year. To date for the 2019-20 school year, the state owes the district \$57,016.17.

In another matter, School Resource Officer Gary Beier was present to provide observations from a recent ALICE school and to discuss the school safety drill, procedures and next steps. The group talked over any weaknesses noted during the drill and ideas for improvements. Proper ways to barricade classroom doors, classroom concealment, window egress options, and the front door entry system were areas of discussion.

In his report, Dr. Jancek informed the board of a proposed solar farm that could have a significant financial impact to the district if it comes to fruition. Nearly 2,700 acres of current farm land has been designated for the solar farm, which would be located in Grundy County between Dwight and Gardner. The largest proposed solar farm in Illinois, it could potentially bring \$300,000 of new money to the Dwight Common School District each year after any agreed upon tax abatements are gone. Environmental studies are being conducted and tax abatement agreement proposals are being discussed.

Dr. Jancek also reported that an additional \$5,850 in Pre-K Grant money has been received which may be used to purchase interactive technology boards.

Insurance renewal rates for 2020 were discussed with Dr. Jancek noting that an unusually high number of employee medical insurance claims has caused provider Health Alliance to increase its renewal rate by 30 percent. Rate relief is being investigated. With contract negotiations pending, Dr. Jancek is also working with the negotiating team members of both school boards and the negotiations committee to look at training that took place at the options for offering financial support for all staff to lessen the burden of the significant rate increase.

> Assistant Principal Julie Schultz noted that Grandparent and Other Special People Days will be held on November 25 and 26.

"We are looking forward to this event and opening our doors to our greater school community," stated Mrs. Schultz.

Principal Brandon Owens reported that approximately twelve new students have recently enrolled in the district pushing the total enrollment to nearly 550 students. The district is looking at adding a paraprofessional at the Junior High

level to help meet student

Moving to other business, the circle driveway project was again discussed. Last month, the BOE approved improvements to the circle driveway with regard to rock that currently sits between the asphalt and the sidewalk. However, new concerns, including drainage, have been brought forward causing the BOE to place the project on hold until spring while other options are investigated.

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

Health Insurance Open Enrollment

Get Covered Illinois health insurance open enrollment now underway. The open enrollment period for the Get Covered Illinois health insurance marketplace is underway from now until December

The marketplace is the official exchange where Illinoisans can go to purchase coverage or to apply for federal subsidies to lower costs. After the December 15 deadline, potential customers will not be able to make purchases through the exchange unless they have had a "qualifying life event" such as having a child or losing their existing health care coverage.

There are over 140 health

insurance plans available on the exchange. Automatic re-enrollment in the same plan or a similar plan from the same insurer will be available for anyone who previously enrolled in a plan through the marketplace. More information is available at: https://get covered.illinois.gov



recreational cannabis. Chief of Police Tim Henson provided input from a police standpoint outlining enforcement concerns and how a local dispensary might task current police personnel. After much discussion. the committee will recommend to the Board not to approve or allow a recreational cannabis dispensary, or related business, to locate in Dwight.

The committee also discussed concerns regarding the tearing down of downtown buildings and losing the integrity of the downtown area should tear downs continue. Business district design guidelines for downtown storefronts were also discussed with sample ordinances from other communities reviewed. Guidelines for Dwight will be established and recommended to the board.

A party request for the 100 block of Susan Drive for July 4, 2020 was discussed by the board. Among other things planned, the block party would include stage entertainment, food truck and kid bounce house or slide. Some questions and concerns were raised that will go back to the requester for

clarification before the request comes back to the board for approval.


