Fight Like a Girl Area Youth's Story Stresses Importance of Donations

Tenley Koger is a three-year old from Mazon who was diagnosed with Acute Lymphoblastic Leukemia B-Cell February 18, 2019. She is the daughter of Caleb and Tanya Koger, of Mazon, and niece of Bo and Christy Partney of Dwight.

In March, she had a massive GI bleed that caused seizures and resulted in hemorrhagic shock and received 30 pints of blood, as well as ten more of platelets and plasma to slow the bleed down for surgery.

Tenley spent the next 16 days in ICU, ten of those days on a ventilator and the last six days having to learn to walk again and trusting everyone around her again.

In July, she received a chemotherapy that is known for causing allergic reactions and other minor side effects. Tenley took it to another level and ended up with pancreatitis and was hospitalized until the pain subsided.

A week later, she returned with a pseudocyst on her pancreas and spent another week in the hospital.

By September, she had recovered from the pancreas issues and the cyst had shrunk and did not need surgery.

Since September, she has had a few emergency room visits for fevers and viruses, but has been doing well overall.

November 15 was her last intense chemotherapy and last weekly trip to Chicago before beginning the maintenance phase with monthly visits. This phase is the last phase of treatment and will continue until May 16, 2021.

Tenley had received 30 bags of blood, as well as ten more different blood products. Blood cancer chemotherapies cause our bodies to not be able to hold or make our own blood – requiring many transfusions.

Tenley has had well over 80 blood product transfusions in the last nine months. This will continue for the next two years, and she will hopefully continue to need less blood.

Blood is a very important component in blood cancer treatment. The patient is taking medications and chemotherapies that suppress the bone marrow (what makes our blood) and sometimes it can't make **any** blood and needs help with transfusion.

Platelets also play an important role and are always needed for donation.

Medications cause our blood to **not** be able to clot properly and sometimes our bodies are unable to make any platelets due to medications, chemotherapy, and diseases/ conditions.

Louise Davis: 104 Years Old Today December 11, 2019

Louise Davis has been a fixture in Dwight for more than half a century, and today, Wednesday, Dec. 11, she turns 104 at Heritage Health where she resides.

She was born in 1915, 15 years before the Great Depression, 54 years before man landed on the moon, and decades before the dawn of the Internet.

She was the youngest of five sisters. She grew up in Walker's Grove on the northwest side of Plainfield. The house she grew up in is still there, said her great-nephew, Matt Forneris, of Joliet. His grandmother, Mildred Vertin, was Louise's sister.

Her father was a third generation farmer in the area and she attended Plainfield schools through high school, when

there were only 25 in her class. "She's very old school prim and proper," Forneris said.

Louise went to nursing school in the 1930s, and worked at Illinois Research Hospital in Chicago and then as a railroad nurse with Illinois

In 1943, at the height of World War II, she enlisted in the Navy as a charge nurse, serving until 1945. She was stationed at San Diego, Pearl Harbor and then Great Lakes, one of only 800 nurses in the entire fleet.

She worked on hospital ships in the burn unit. Forneris said she didn't talk much about her days in the war, likely having seen much pain and suffering of soldiers wounded as they island-hopped from mission to mission. She said they'd often come back in bad shape.

Catholic Charities and the Northern Illinois Food Bank have partnered to deliver nutritious food (meat, produce, and nonperishable items) to people in need.



As a result, each graduate was awarded their Basic Operations Firefighter certificate through the Office of the Illinois State Fire Marshal.

"This graduation is a celebration to recognize a significant milestone to starting a career as a firefighter," Deputy Chief Justin Dyer spoke to the graduating class and their families at the ceremony. "I challenge each of you to never stop being a student in the fire service, as it is an ever-evolving industry. Share your knowledge as you go, and remember that it

All academy training was in-house, through the DFPD, making this the third graduating class since 2015. "The ability to hold our own Fire Academy results is a substantial cost savings over sending members to an outside agency," DFPD Battalion Chief and Academy Training Director Craig Cousins spoke about the graduating class. "They complete over 200 hours of classroom and hands-on training. It is a very rewarding feeling to have trained the future firefighters of the Dwight Fire Protection District."

When she did talk about her service, she'd joke about being a pretty young lady in the Navy, surrounded by so many soldiers. "There were more of them than us," Forneris remembers her saying. She came home having earned the Pacific Theater medal.

She met her husband Elmer Davis in Dwight and they married in the 1950s. She was a stay-at-home-wife, never having children but helping her husband manage the many farms they sharecropped in the Dwight area.

Their marriage was short lived. Elmer died in the mid-'60s of natural causes.

She never remarried but stayed in Dwight and continued to manage the land they owned. She was active in Dwight Woman's Club and was an avid painter of landscapes and portraits. She loved painting dishes and was involved in the local painters' group. She also enjoyed traveling with her sister, Mildred, to places like Europe and Australia.

Louise lived on her own

until she was 100 -- and still driving, Forneris said. He said the family had tried to get her into a nursing home for 15 years but she refused. It wasn't until she was in rehab for a broken hip at Heritage Health that she decided she liked it enough

Forneris said she's in good health, can carry on a conversation and enjoys the community at Heritage Health. She can walk on her own but her doctor makes her use a walker, which she doesn't like. Forneris and his mother, Joanne Sovich, 86, of Joliet, get her out as much as they can. She was at the VFW helping on Veterans Day. They took her to Station 343 for her birthday dinner this past weekend and stayed out past 7. Heritage Health will celebrate her birthday during their Christmas party today.

"She's the prim and proper little old lady who enjoys everyone," Forneris said.

What's her secret to turning 104? Forneris isn't sure, but did say this:

Marc Magliari at Amtrak Media Relations, Chicago, has e-mailed me a little updated information about Amtrak ridership at Dwight.

I mailed him a copy of my Nov. 27 column in which I tried to make the case that "ridership" figures by Amtrak were inflated because they count people both coming and going and most often publish those figures as "ridership" without noting their methodology. Actual people boarding at Dwight, for instance,

4,959 in FY18, 5,010 in FY19.

Roughly double the above numbers are shown on many Amtrak Fact Sheets. You just gotta read the small print.

An Austin, Texas newspaper writer, Ben Wear, put it this way when he wrote about Amtrak's up and down ridership over the years:

"Taking the ridership numbers down to the Austin level is murkier. Station by station, Amtrak reports 'usage' rather than boardings. That is, it counts everyone who gets on at a station and then adds it to everyone who got off there. So each passenger gets counted in two places, a statistical flourish you have to admire.'

Statistical flourish or whatever, Wear went on to theorize why Amtrak ridership seemed to change dramatically -dropping when times were good -- and rising when the economy was bad-

A good economy produces more freight traffic, more freight traffic produces more scheduling conflicts and late

arrivals by Amtrak, and that causes lower ridership, and vice versa.

Interesting theory.

As far as Dwight boardings over the years are concerned, approximate yearly numbers are below:

FY 2015 5,095 FY 2016 4,815

FY 2017 5,029 The new Dwight train station that opened in October of 2016 doesn't seem to have had much influence on board-

110 mph train speeds are still predicted, and have been since 2015, while the pipe dream of whisking Dwight residents into Chicago in less than one hour was abandoned long ago in favor of trying to get the trains to run on time.

Sen. Dick Durbin has introduced legislation that would allow Amtrak to sue the freight railroads for holding up any of the passenger trains. Ha.

Amtrak has only 1% to 2% of the passenger traffic Chicago/St. Louis while St. Louis is fast becoming an epicenter of the freight-carrying Midwest, with a 40% increase in freight volume expected in the next three decades.

Do you sense a continuing passenger problem?

Meanwhile according to Crain's Chicago Business, Amtrak and Metra continue to battle over who will control operations at Chicago's Union Station -- owned by Amtrak.



Spotify Wrapped

This week the music streaming platform released their year-end "Wrapped" packages for everyone who uses the service.

Basically what these packages included was a very de-

tailed list of everything you had listened to in the calendar year of 2019 up until December 1st. The result, well, the result is fairly obvious, you end up

with a playlist of a lot of your favorite songs and songs that you gave consistent play throughout the year.

The gripe with streaming is often that the services do not pay enough. Apple, Spotify and Tidal all pay out about .006-.008 per stream of a song. While this is a very very small amount for one play of a song as opposed to a purchase of a song for \$1. (You would need roughly 142 streams of 1 song to equate the same pay-

I think the thing that often gets overlooked when looking at streaming is the longevity of it.

Yes, 142 streams initially might seem like a lot to get to that \$1. There will likely be countless fans and maybe new listeners who will give it 20-30 listens who maybe never would've given the \$1 for the song without the ability to hear it in full.

It also provides income for artists who might be "past their prime", but instead of relying on reselling copies of albums from years ago it allows for new listeners to stream and stream and stream their old material and provide them a consistent flow of income in their later

Jay Z, for example, has 10,000,000 monthly listeners currently. That comes out to 325th in the world on Spotify's platform.

That comes out to roughly 250,000,000 streams on the

250,000,000 streams at .007 is 1.75 million dollars, and that's at 325th in the world.

Now, there's likely labels, and songwriters and other people to pay that money out to than just Jay Z, but the point being is it provides a consistent revenue flow for artists later on in their career.

For an independent artist at around 200,000 monthly listeners they would be looking at about \$42,000 of income just from spotify, factor in the other two in Apple and Tidal and you're probably coming out close to \$70,000 a year. Spotify doesn't give stats on what 200,000 monthly listeners in relation to the world leader board is, but it's much much lower than 325th. That means there's countless artists in-between that range living on a decent income because of streaming.


stallation, and plant propagation.
