Dwight Approves Lions Lake Temporary Closure Periods

November 9 Board of Trustee Meeting Summary

The Dwight Village Board of Trustees approved temporary December weekend closure dates for Lions Lake when the board met via teleconference on November 9.

Last month, Mayor Jared Anderson reported that he had been in touch with IDNR regarding an over-population of geese at Lions Lake. Mayor Anderson proposed a controlled hunt to take place over the first three weekends in December at the lake during which time Lions Lake would be posted "closed" until the controlled mitigation process has been completed. The board approved the temporary closure of Lions Lake for December 5 -6, December 12-13, and December 18 - 20.

Under old business, the board approved the final installment of membership dues be paid to three organizations. Approved for payment was \$532.50 to the Grundy Economic Development Council; \$2,126.00 to the Greater Livingston County Economic Development Council; \$5,000.00 to the Dwight Economic Alliance. These payments represent one-quarter of the 2020 commitment to each organization.

In reports to the board, Chief of Police Tim Henson notified board members that the law enforcement community has experienced a surge in COVID-19 cases. Precautions are being taken with officers working to reduce physical contact with the public when possible and will eliminate any unnecessary traffic stops until the risks have been reduced. Chief Henson also reminded residents that overnight parking (2 a.m. to 6 a.m.) on village streets is prohibited from December 1 until March 1, or anytime snowfall reaches two inches or more.

GSW Panther Hall of Fame – Class of 2021 Announced

The Gardner-South Wilmington Panther Hall of Fame nomination committee met on November 5 to discuss and vote on nominations for the Panther Hall of Fame – Class of 2021.

This award recognizes and honors outstanding alumni or other persons who have distinguished themselves through service to Gardner-South Wilmington High School or the community. This award recognizes pride shown for the community, accomplishments, and dedication to the GSW High School community.

While a lot has changed since 1954, one common denominator at GSW hasn't - the lasting legacy of longtime superintendent, Mr. Leroy Brandt.

Leroy Brandt was superintendent of GSW High School from 1954-1975. It's said that if you ever met Mr. Brandt, you will always remember him.

Leroy grew up in Coal City and was a star basketball and tennis player for the Coalers. He attended Illinois State University, where he continued his basketball career. His senior year, he was the ISU basketball team captain.

He once played against the famous Jackie Robinson of UCLA.

Brandt married his high school sweetheart, Jessica, in 1941 – the same year he began his teaching career. Leroy and Jessica had two daughters, Cathie and Connie, who both attended GSW.

Leroy served in World War II for 2½ years, before returning home and earning his masters degree from ISU. That degree would take him to Gardner, where he would take over the superintendency.

Mr. Brandt and his family quickly became an integral part of the GSW community. Leroy treated GSW essentially as his third child, spending tremendous amounts of time at GSW and attending GSW events. He could be found outside the building planting flowers all along the parking lot and sidewalks with his daughters helping out. His wife, Jessica, worked at GSW as a secretary while attending night school Class of 1974.

for many years before earning her degree and later becoming a librarian at GSW.

Mr. Brandt's former students and colleagues fondly remember him and recall that he was always interested in you and strived to get the best out of you. He was a strong leader and created a wonderful climate at GSW for all those years and beyond. The drive behind the school was named in his honor many years ago.

After retiring from GSW, Mr. Brandt was elected to be the Grundy County Superintendent of Schools, a position he held for two years. Leroy also served on the Grundy

Board for several years. Mr. Brandt – longtime GSW

leader and local personality passed away in 2001. Mr. David Doglio is a life-

long resident of the Gardner-South Wilmington community. He was born and raised in South Wilmington.

As a GSW student, he participated in many activities, including Math Club, basketball, school play, Student Council, and he was Sports Editor for the Yearbook. He also served as pantry. He is also a Trustee of the Class President for the

David graduated from Illinois State University, where he earned an accounting degree. He spent most of his career in the accounting field, and he continues to enjoy serving local residents as a tax preparer.

His biggest accomplishment for the GSW community was being a dedicated GSW school board member for over 20 years. He served as the Board President for many of those years. While serving on the board, he used his accounting background to guide financial decisions made by the district. He also played an instrumental role in many building project improvements to ensure a safe

school environment for years to

David continues to be available and willing to provide guidance and support to the GSW school district when needed.

Through his adult life, he has been involved in many aspects of the community, including volunteering his time on the St. Lawrence Parish Council and at various church activities, including the local mobile food the South Wilmington Fire Pro tection District and Greenfield Township, Treasurer of the SWEB Sanitary District, and a member of the Knights of Columbus Council No. 1574.

Doglio also volunteers annually at South Wilmington's Party in the Park.

At the county level, he is a member of the Grundy County Justice Assistance Board and has volunteered his time at the Elbow Benders Spaghetti Supper that supports youth baseball and softball, as well as many Prom Lock-Ins.

His most treasured moments are spent with his family, including his wife, two daughters, and sons-in-law who are all graduates of GSW, along with his four grandchildren who are all future Panthers.

David is very proud of this small town community. He looks forward to continuing to support the GSW community, and he is always willing to lend a helping hand when needed.

Mr. David Doglio – active community member and proud GSW alum – is now a Panther Hall of Famer.

Driver Services Facilities Closed Until December 7, Due to Worsening COVID-19 Pandemic

Jesse White has announced, as of November 17, Driver Services facilities statewide will be closed to the public for in-person transactions, due to the worsening COVID-19 pandemic. They will reopen Monday, December 7.

White is encouraging the public to take advantage of online services.

In addition, White announced that expiration dates for driver's licenses and ID cards will be extended until June 1, 2021. This June 1, 2021, extension also includes those who have February, March, April and May 2021 expiration dates. As a result, expired driver's licenses and ID cards will remain valid until June 1, 2021. CDL (Commercial Driver License) holders and commercial permit holders are excluded from this extension due to federal requirements.

As White noted, many transactions with the Secretary of State's office may be conducted online at cyberdrive illinois.com, some of which include:

Illinois Secretary of State • Renewing a license plate sticker;

> • Renewing a valid driver's license for qualifying drivers;

• Renewing a valid ID card for those age 22-64 (seniors 65 and older have free, non-expiring

 Obtaining a driver record abstract;

 Filing Business Services documents, such as incorporations and annual reports; and

· Customers with issues involving administrative hearings may contact adminhear ings@ilsos.gov.

Those who are eligible for online driver's license renewal will receive a letter from the a PIN necessary for online renewal. Those whose driver's licenses or ID cards expired between February 1, 2020, and January 31, 2021, who qualify for online renewal should receive their PIN letter in December 2020 or January 2021. Those whose driver's licenses or ID cards expire after February 1, 2021, will receive their PIN letter approximately 90 days before their expiration date.

White noted that 19 CDL (Commercial Driver License) facilities will remain open for CDL written and road exams. These CDL facilities are located in: Belleville; Bradley; Charleston; Danville/Tilton; DeKalb; Elk Grove Village; Marion; Moline/Silvis; Olney; Peoria; Princeton; Quincy; Rantoul; Rockford; Salem; South Holland; Springfield; and West Chicago.

CDL driving tests are by appointment only by calling 217-785-3013.



Dwight Common School District Prepares 2020 Tax Levy

COVID-19 Continues to Challenge Staff and Students

Dwight Common School District #232 Board of Education met via a virtual meeting on November 11 where District Superintendent Dr. Richard Jancek gave the BOE a financial presentation including the projected 2020 EAV and recommendations for the upcoming tax levy.

According to the Livingston and Grundy County Assessors, the projected 2020 EAV for the Dwight Common School District is expected to increase approximately \$10 million over 2019 for an 8.13 percent projected increase. Assessed valuations for the Livingston County portion is projected to increase 5.71 percent while Grundy County projects a 17.67 percent increase for its portion.

Using the projected 2020 total EAV of \$136,404,511, Superintendent Jancek presented his recommendations for the 2020 tax levy rate and extension. The recommended 2020 tax rate is \$3.0766 and with an extension of \$4,196,607. With this recommended scenario, the district would see approximately \$191,247 in new money, or a 4.77 percent increase over last year, largely due to the increased EAV. The 2019 tax levy rate was \$3.1751 with extension an \$4,005,360.

No action was taken. The BOE will review, discuss and adopt the final proposed 2020 Tax Levy at its December meeting.

In other business, the BOE discussed thoughts around incorporating additional remote learning days and amending the 2020-21 school calendar. With growing concerns as COVID-19 cases continue to rise in the area, suggestions that going full remote for two weeks following the holiday travel season might be in order. BOE member Nick Stipanovich expressed his concerns with regard to the youngest members of the student body and how the learning limitations of a remote program, along with loss of group interaction, is impacting these

Kindergarten Teacher Joy Meister described ways that she provides virtual instruction to her young students and expressed that "there is teaching going on, it just looks a lot different than normal."

"Instruction is happening," echoed Principal Julie Schultz. "It is just not traditional."

BOE member Cathy Ferguson and School Nurse Erica Sandeno shared their concerns regarding COVID contact tracing and the constant disruption that occurs when students are removed from the classroom.

'There is no consistent, solid day of teaching," said Ferguson.

No action with regard to amending the calendar was taken. The board will continue the discussion at its December meeting and make a decision then regarding possibly moving to a full remote schedule for two weeks following Christmas break.

"Always the goal is to be inperson as much as possible," said Dr. Jancek. "We will keep marching forward until we

In another COVID related matter, the BOE heard a proposal for a classroom supervision option that will allow the school to continue operating in a time when staff members may be out due to quarantine mandates and substitute teachers are scarce. The suggestion is to allow unlicensed district employees, such as bus monitors, to act as classroom supervisors. These classroom supervisors do not teach, but would monitor students and equipment while an otherwise healthy but quarantined teacher provides instruction virtually from home. While unlicensed to teach, all classroom supervisors would require a clean background check. The board gave consensus to move forward with the proposal.

In other new business, a key card access security system was discussed. The swipe-in system would be installed on each school door and provide the ability to track building entry and exit of each person with key card access. cess. The total cost of the system is still being reviewed, but would be funded 50/50 from grant monies and the district's O&M Fund. No action was taken as more information is being gathered.

Dr. Jancek provided an update on the Blue Sky Solar Project which could have a significant financial impact to the district as it comes closer to fruition. Nearly 2,700 acres of farmland has been designated for the solar farm which would be located in Grundy County between Dwight and Gardner. The largest proposed solar farm in Illinois, it could potentially bring substantial new money to the Dwight Common School District each year after any agreed upon tax abatements are gone. While more information is being gathered regarding the financial impact, Dr. Jancek commented that "it will be a benefit to both school districts." It is anticipated that the solar farm proposal will come to the BOE for action next month.

In his reports to the Board, and in honor of Veterans Day, Dr. Jancek extended thanks to all Veterans for their service. DCS Teacher Sam Beier was also recognized for her efforts each year to pay tribute to Veterans with an outstanding display of flags on the school lawn.

School Nurse Erika Sandeno was also recognized with gratitude expressed for her 'amazing work and tireless hours" put forth due to COVID-19.

"She puts herself in harm's way for our staff and students," said Dr. Jancek.

Livingston County Health Department Issues Letter to Businesses Regarding Mask, Distancing Compliance

The Livingston County Health Department understands that many are exhausted by the ongoing battle with the COVID-19 pandemic. It is imperative, however, that everyindividuals and businesses alike - continue efforts to reduce the spread of COVID-19 in order to ensure the health and safety of Livingston County residents. The LCHD has released the following letters to area businesses:

Per Governor Pritzker's orders, which went into effect August 26, employees of businesses are mandated to wear masks (correctly - securely over the nose and mouth) when unable to maintain six feet of social distance, while also strongly encouraging patrons to do the same. This mandate is an effort to keep both workers and consumers healthy and safe.

While hoping businesses would comply on their own, it has become clear that some businesses are not taking these actions – as the LCHD receives daily complaints for businesses of all types across the county.

As COVID-19 cases continue to rise across the county, ensuring compliance with this mandate has become increasingly more important.

This letter is to be considered by all Livingston County businesses as a first warning in failing to comply with the mandate to enforce facemasks and social distancing in places of employment. The LCHD will be conducting

compliance checks in Livingston County businesses and offering continued support to help these businesses comply with this mandate. Note that businesses found to be in repeated violation of this mandate may incur a fine.

The LCHD also asks that you talk with your employees about taking action outside of the workplace as well. It is imperative that everyone:

- Avoid large gatherings
- Limit social interactions and
- tighten their social circles Stay home when sick
- Wear masks correctly
- Practice social distancing • Get tested if symptomatic or in close contact with a confirmed case (5-7 days after ex-

Quarantine while waiting to be tested and/or for test re-

This is for the health and safety of not only the Livingston County community at large, but for the health and safety of your own business.

Should an employee test positive for COVID-19, it is asked that employers not require a negative test result in order to return to work after completing isolation. People may remain positive for up to 90 days after contracting COVID-19; however, they are not contagious after their ten days of isolation. Those individuals who are considered close contacts must quarantine for 14 days regardless of whether they test negative or

never develop symptoms. Release letters required to return to work may be accessed through a link sent via text message after individuals complete a survey on their final day (day 11 for isolation or day 15 for quarantine). The LCHD will not provide these letters.

Local employers and their workers may visit the Illinois Department of Commerce & Economic Opportunity (DCEO) website to download resources and find further details on employee safety to help guide their businesses. You may also visit the Livingston County Health Department's Local Business page, as well as the LCHD Food Safety page, for links to these resources.

It is important to note that new guidance is continuously being developed, and the LCHD is doing its best to update its website as often as possible with new information for their communities.

Morris Hospital COVID Testing Supply is Limited

In an effort to balance limited testing supplies with increased demand for testing, Morris Hospital has asked providers on its medical staff to limit COVID testing orders to those who need it most: symptomatic patients and those at high risk for complications.

'Right now, there is a very high demand for COVID testing," says Kimberly Wolfer, Director of Laboratory Services at Morris Hospital & Healthcare Centers.

Wolfer says the recent ineased demand for testing has also slowed test results.

'We have a limited allocation of rapid tests each week and at this time have to reserve the rapid tests for patients being admitted to the hospital or having pre-surgical testing," explains Wolfer.



operate its outpatient COVID exam. The cost includes a drive-thru testing site on the hospital main campus for patients who have a physician's order. After the physician's order is received, a Scheduling representative from Morris Hospital calls the patient to schedule the appointment. The drive-thru testing does not accept self-referrals or walk-ins.

COVID testing is also done at Morris Hospital's urgent care Morris Hospital is available at locations only if the provider determines testing is appropriate after evaluating the patient's available at website: dph.illinois. medical history and symptom gov/covid.

Morris Hospital continues to severity through a medical physical exam and a separate charge for COVID-19 testing if testing is ordered. Both get billed to insurance.

Morris Hospital also advises that the hospital emergency department should be reserved for those who are in need of emergency medical care.





WHEREAS, the President and the Board of Trustees of the Prairie Creek Public Library District in the counties of Grundy, LaSalle, and Livingston and the State of Illinois, did on the 8th day of September, 2020 adopt the Annual Budget and Appropriation Ordinance (Ordinance No. 2020-04) for said Library District for the fiscal year commencing on July 1, 2020 and ending June 30, 2021; and

WHEREAS, said Annual Budget and Appropriation Ordinance was duly published as provided by law after its adoption.



WINTER CAR CARE



Preparing the Vehicle for Winter Driving

winter conditions - wet, cold and icy weather - present the greatest challenge to your vehicle's operating efficiency. Since these conditions cannot be avoided, prepare for winter by performing a complete vehicle checkup in the fall. Check, or have your mechanic check, the following items:

1. Electrical system

Battery:

The heart of your vehicle's electrical system is the battery. Cold-weather starts require a battery that is fully charged. Have your battery checked and replaced, if needed. Have your alternator or generator, voltage regulator and drive belts checked, too.

Ignition system:

Damaged ignition wires, a cracked distributor cap or worn spark plugs can make starting difficult or may cause a sudden vehicle breakdown. A fall vehicle checkup will reveal any problems. Lights:

During the winter, working lights become more critical for others to see you. Make sure all your !lights and lenses are clean and functioning properly. Grime on headlight lenses reduces their effectiveness by as much as 90 percent.

2. Brake system

The ability to slow the vehicle is critical in any driving environment. Have your brakes checked regularly and do not delay any necessary maintenance or repairs.

3. Tires

The amount of traction that exists between the tires and roadway surface determines how well the vehicle accelerates. turns and stops. Make certain your tires are properly inflated and in good condition.

If you live in a region that receives light to moderate snowfall, then a set of all-season tires (M+S rated) might be the answer to your winter driving needs. For driving in greater amounts of snow, tires specifically designed for use in snow would be a better choice.

While it is best to purchase tires in sets of four, if you only purchase two, mount them on the rear wheels. For extreme snow and ice driving conditions, tire chains can provide the best traction. If chains are necessary, they should be on all

four tires. 4. The exhaust system

The exhaust system serves two main purposes. First, it carries off carbon monoxide and other harmful gases produced by the engine. Second, it muffles engine noise. Have a mechanic check your exhaust system for leaks in order to minimize the chances of carbon monoxide poisoning. Carbon monoxide is odorless, very hard to detect. and it can quickly cause death. If your car is stuck in the snow and you

5. Heating and cooling system

Make sure your vehicle's cooling system contains enough antifreeze to prevent freezing in cold weather. Keep the mixture fresh by changing it regularly and having the entire system checked for leaks. Please check your vehicle owner's manual to determine the best type of coolant for your

6. Windshield wipers, washer, glass and vehicle exterior

Clean windows offer optimal visibility. Thus, wiper blades that streak the windshield should be replaced. The washer reservoir bottle should be filled with an antifreeze washer solvent. To prevent damage to your wiper blades or



Secretary White Upgrades Temporary License Plates

Illinois Secretary of State Jesse White has announced that his office has upgraded temporary license plates (also known as TRPs or temporary registration permits), making them more durable and providing more information to law enforcement in an effort to continue to combat fraud and criminal activity.

The newly designed temporary license plate features a more durable material that is thicker and will better withstand car washes and inclement weather, ensuring that the information on the temporary license plate is easily visible to law enforcement. The new temporary license plates also include a bar code and enlarged expiration date, as well as identification including the vehicle's VIN, year, make and



model, and the name of the automobile dealer that issued the temporary license plate. Like the old temporary license plates, the new ones will be affixed to the rear back license plate holder.

In addition, the issuance process of temporary license plates has been upgraded to require that applications for title and registration are completed before an automobile dealer may issue a temporary license plate. This change improves

protection consumer and helps combat fraud. ensuring automobile dealers and remitters apply for title and registration before a temporary license plate can be printed. This step guarantees that ownership of the vehicle will be properly transferred in a timely fashion to the purchaser.

The newly designed temporary license plates – which are being issued statewide at all Driver Services facilities as well as the 10,048 automobile dealers, currency exchanges and remitters - continue to give law enforcement the ability to access vehicle information immediately through LEADS.

Approximately 500,000 temporary license plates are issued each year. There are more than 10.2 million vehicles in
