





DTHS February Board Actions

BOE Returns to In-Person Meetings/21-22 Calendar Approved

The Dwight Township High School Board of Education met on February 17 in its first inperson session since measures to combat the pandemic moved meetings to a virtual platform.

The 2021-22 school calendar was approved by the BOE. Next year's calendar calls for the first day of student attendance to be Wednesday, August 18, 2021. Highlights from the calendar include no school November 24 - 26 due to the Thanksgiving holiday. Winter Break will begin on December 20, 2021 with students returning to school on January 5, 2022. Spring Break has been designated as March 21 -March 25, 2022, May 26, 2022 is the planned last day of student attendance; however, five emergency days designated as May 27 and May 31 - June 3, 2022 could impact the final day of school.

Addressing other business, school bus leases and extensions were discussed. The Board approved a two year lease extension for the nine pre-owned 2019 buses at a cost of \$11,150 per bus per year. For the two needed lift busses, the BOE approved a three year lease for two new 2022 lift busses at an annual cost of \$15,514 per lift bus.

In an effort to keep the Industrial Arts program alive and available to DTHS students in a time when teachers in this field are scarce, the board approved the hiring of a currently uncertified teacher. Robert Caridi will be employed as a Long Term Substitute / Industrial Arts Teacher. Mr. Caridi, who has a substitute teaching license and brings much experience in the field of woodworking and industrial arts, will complete his master's pro-



gram within a year to earn his teaching certificate. Caridi will work alongside Mr. Jeff Froelich for the fourth quarter this year to mimic student teaching before taking over the classroom as a long team substitute next fall while completing the program for his teaching certificate. Mr. Froelich, who has retired but was filling the position, will not be retuning next fall.

In reports to the board, Superintendent Dr. Richard Jancek noted that the Livingston County Health Department recently held a clinic at DTHS to provide COVID vaccinations for Dwight Public School employees along with staff of the Odell Public School and St Paul School. It was noted that LCHD has trained school nurse Erica Sandeno to administer rapid COVID tests. This free test will be made available to high school coaches and high school athletes on a voluntary basis and when applicable.

DTHS Principal Andrew Pittenger reported that current enrollment at DTHS reflects 229 total students with 175 students opting for in-person learning and 54 students currently choosing remote learning. Mr. Pittenger also informed the board that an after school study program began on January 25 providing additional assistance to students with failing grades.

Mr. Pittenger also discussed recommendations with the board for the 2021-22 year including the addition of a Tran-

sitional Math course. Regarding schedule structure, it was decided to move to a modified block schedule. The modified block format, which was the preferred option of most teachers, will allow for one day of traditional learning, on Mondays, with four days of block scheduling each week.

Athletic Director Cathy Ferguson reported that the season for boys basketball, girls basketball and competition cheerleading has begun. Scholastic Bowl has also been holding virtual meets and Dwight has agreed to host the Regional Scholastic Bowl on Monday, March 8, with ap proximately six to seven schools in attendance. The Regional meets will be in-person. It was also reported that football practices are allowed to begin on March 3 and Volleyball practices can begin on March 8.

The board also:

- affirmed employment of Elisabeth Bland, Substitute Bus Monitor.
- approved employment of Jared Steck, Assistant Boys Golf Coach.
- affirmed employment of Nick Schultz, Substitute Teacher.
- discussed additional Social Worker resources for the 2021 – 22 school year.
- approved a Resolution, TRS supplemental Savings Plan/Voya Financial.

The next regular meeting of the Dwight Township High School Board of Education will be 6 p.m., Wednesday, March 17 in the DTHS cafeteria. Virtual access for anyone wanting to attend BOE meetings will also continue to be available. Anyone logging in will be able to listen and watch only. New Series Steers Into Grundy County Speedway

Midwest Super Cup Series Begins May 7

"We took the rules, and laid them out side by side. At the time, there were three other cup series, all racing under very slim differences," Eric Heddins, owner/operator of Heddins Motorsports, paused a moment, reflecting on the course-altering conversation that led to the creation of a new series. "Now, for the first time in 20 years, drivers from all over will be able to race together under one series, thanks to a few simple changes. It's really exciting."

Debuting this season at Morris' Grundy County Speedway, the new program is a super cup series, promising a friendlier atmosphere, more accessibility for racers, and plenty of updates for a completely new and unique competition. Pulling potential racers from Wisconsin, Iowa, Indiana, Michigan and even Ohio, this series is planned to be much larger, and much more inclusive, leading to better races.

Though the point system

other series, purses will now be offered as part of Heddins' new program, currently unheard of in any midwest super cup series. A purse is a pool of prize money paid out to racers, usually funded by sponsor donations. "We are currently seeking 11 businesses to fund the upcoming races," Heddins said of the new feature. "There will be a payout every night of the race, something that's completely new for these kids." As part of the series, kids will also get the chance to win trophies, and participate in an end of the year celebratory banquet, also funded in part by sponsor do-

Heddins also put together new staff, placing the utmost importance on his team's role and responsibility for how the race goes. "Combined, both Scott Pool and Ken Odo have decades of racing experience," Eric said confidently of the new hires. "And the additional staff also allows for me to completely remove myself from

Well-versed in his line of work, Eric was always interested in cars - particularly the ones that went fast. "I loved anything with four wheels and an engine," he said, remembering long days spent working on cars with his father. "I still do." Having also owned and operated Heddins Motorsports since 2019, Eric has always searched for ways to bring people together, originally forming the business to help service more teams.

Heddins took time to address any concerns parents might have about becoming involved with the sport, and above all, stress the family-oriented and supportive atmosphere down at the track. "The time investment breaks down to about two hours a week, outside of actual time spent racing," he explained. "This could (continued on page 3)

Protect Benefits for Children with Special Needs

If you have a child or other family member who has special needs due to physical or mental conditions, you face a variety of challenges planning for their care, including financial ones. You may also have some well-meaning relatives who want to help, but who may not realize that their moves could actually result in some serious lifestyle and monetary problems for your loved one. Fortunately, by planning ahead, you can avoid these potential traps.

As you probably already know, individuals with special needs are eligible for a variety of government benefits and local programs that provide assistance with housing, medical needs, specialized equipment, independent living, job training and other services. You may also know that some of these programs require participants to meet financial criteria to qualify for benefits. Usually, this isn't a problem if your loved one has little income and few assets.

Difficulties can arise, though, when other relatives, such as grandparents, include loved ones with special needs in their estate plans by naming them as beneficiaries of insurance policies or retirement assets, or as beneficiaries of any trusts the grandparents have established. In these situations, loved ones who receive or inherit a sizable amount of assets may then be ruled ineligible for some important services.

Hopefully, your relatives will have informed you of their plans. If so, let them know that although you appreciate their generosity, the way they've chosen to show it could have unanticipated - and harmful - effects. You could then suggest ways they could structure their gifts to be more valuable.

Specifically, they can help through a special needs trust, either one that's already been created or one they create for their gift. A special needs trust is designed to help people with special needs use financial gifts or inheritances for a variety of purposes while keeping their eligibility for some government programs and other services. There are two main types of special needs trust:

First-party special needs trust

An individual with special needs, their legal guardian or the court can establish a first-party special needs trust benefiting that individual. The first-party special needs trust is funded by the individual's own assets, either through earnings or an inheritance or a personal injury award. A first-party trust contains a "payback" rule, which means that when the individual beneficiary with special needs dies, the trust must pay back the state for certain benefits received.

Third-party special needs trust

A relative or person other than the individual with special needs who wants to include that individual in their estate plan can set up a third-party special needs trust. The third party trust is funded with assets from someone other than the individual with special needs. With a third-party trust, no "payback" provision is required.

Many issues are involved in establishing an appropriate special needs trust. Consequently, you'll need to consult with your legal advisor to determine your next steps. Afterwards, you'll want to involve everyone in your family who could contribute to a trust, so they'll all know what to expect and how they can participate. Once the arrangements are made, you can all feel like you've done your part to make things easier for the loved one in your life with special needs.

Dwight FPD, EMS, PD Assist in Life-Saving Rescue Following Crash

An accident occurred shortly after 2:00 a.m. February 20 near the intersection of Verona Road and 3300 North Road (County Line).

OnStar notified Vermilion Valley 911 Dispatch, who then notified Dwight Fire, Dwight EMS, Dwight PD, and Livingston County PD. Upon the emergency crews' arrival, the driver of the vehicle was not located.

Knowing the time of the accident through OnStar, emergency crews began a ground search for the driver. Mutual aid was requested to assist with the search, including Grundy County Sheriff's Department, Livingston County Sheriff's Department, Pontiac Police Department Drone, and Illinois State Police.

Search efforts continued through the early morning when the subject was located near the northwest corner, outside of the closed women's correctional center, at approximately 8:45 a.m.

The subject was located in a combined effort with all of the aforementioned agencies. When the subject was located, he was in severe hypothermia laying in a snowbank.

Dwight Fire requested mutual aid assistance from Reddick with their UTV and Dwight EMS requested a helicopter for medical transport. A local resident was on scene and was able to assist with the use of a tractor to get emergency crews and equipment to the subject.

Crews had to get through a

fence and track through high snow drifts to be able to extricate the subject, who was removed from the elements and in the care of Dwight EMS until the Superior helicopter arrived on scene and transported the patient to Christ Hospital.

Dwight FPD Deputy Fire Chief Justin Dyer stated that "the combined efforts and the dedication of all emergency crews proved to save a life today. We are unsure at this time why the individual had left the scene of the accident, but we are certain he is alive at this time because of the amazing work by all of the emergency agencies. Dwight Fire would like to thank all of the agencies involved in the search and rescue; especially the dispatchers at our 911 center."

Jesse White Calls on Drivers to Move Over for Stopped Emergency Vehicles

Jesse White has issued an ur-Law, designed to protect law enforcement and emergency responders who are stopped on the side of roadways. White also underscored the importance of not driving while distracted - with a special emphasis on avoiding texting while driving at all times.

White has taken steps over the last few years to increase public awareness about protecting those who protect us. His office added a reminder about the Move Over Law to driver's license and vehicle registration renewal notices, produced an educational brochure and


lating the Move Over Law face a minimum fine of \$250 up to \$10,000, and the offense goes on their driving record. Driving privileges can be suspended for 24 months in the event of a fatality and six months for a crash causing personal injury. In addition, White called on

motorists to avoid distracted driving and to stop texting while driving. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), a motorist traveling at 55 mph takes his or her eyes

White initiated a July 1, 2019, law that further cracked down on texting while driving by classifying first-time offenses as moving violations. Under the previous law, which took effect in 2014, second and subsequent texting while driving offenses were treated as moving violations, while first offenses were treated as nonmoving violations.

Scott's Law is named after Chicago Fire Lieutenant Scott Gillen who was struck and killed Dec. 23, 2000, while responding to a traffic crash.

(continued from page 1) involve practicing, or performing maintenance on the car, but beyond that it's pretty comparable to any other youth sport." Eric also assured that parents who worry about being car literate enough for the maintenance aspect of the sport will also find support at the track, with plenty of friendly faces willing to offer tips and a helping hand.

Heddins also discussed safety concerns, making it a top priority of his team at the Speedway. Safety equipment, such as fire resistant suits and gloves, as well as protective head gear, like helmets, and head and neck retraints, will need to be purchased prior to racing. The cars used in the series, considered stock cars, are fully contained, and allow for more crash protection. "All the parts of these cars are wellmade, and their smaller size makes them a bit safer," Heddins explained, also mentioning that the vehicles allow younger racers currently driving carts to smoothly transition to entry-level racing cars. "Of course, there are some bumps and bruises from time to time, but drivers are, for the most

After all the registration fees and purchasing necessary equipment, Heddins realizes racing can get pricey. "Some of these things can get up there in cost, but we also set out to make this series as inexpensive as possible to get into," Heddins said. "It kind of depends on you and your child, and how much you want to put into the sport beyond the necessities."

Racing may prove to be a slightly hefty time and cost commitment, but the benefit to youth racers through experience and connection is unmatched. Time spent off the track is just as important as time spent on, with plenty to take away from the process of preparation and practice. With tools in hand, surrounded by family and friends, kids have a safe and supportive environment to learn, grow, and discover themselves.

Nothing is more empowering than problem solving a repair, and seeing the results of the fix as the car zooms flawlessly around the track. Determination, too, can be found intermingled in the losses just as much as the wins, encouraging kids to keep pushing for-



ward, uncovering essential life lessons with each new race. Even the interpersonal connections that form almost effortlessly, from conversations sparked at school to trading racing tips with fellow competitors, all lead to more confidence, a stronger sense of self, and safe, productive social interactions.

Parents can also rediscover themselves at the track, finding a new way to bond and connect with their children, learning and growing right along with them. "You get a chance to be more involved with your kids," Heddins said. "It's a good time for them, and it's a good time for the family."

With events planned all the way through September, the first race of the series is set for May 7, at the Grundy County Speedway. Interested parents can e-mail or call for registration information and forms, and visit www.midwestsupe rcupseries.com for schedules, updates and more. Racers need to be at least 8 years of age to start, and while there is no deadline for registration, those signed up by March 31 will be able to receive a discount.

One of the first races this season for the new series is a memorial race, in remembrance of fallen soldier Corporal Christian P.K. Smith. Smith,

originally of Crown Point, IN, passed away while on active duty in the United States Marine Corps at just 25 years old. "His father, Thomas Smith, still races with us," Heddins said. "We are hoping to make this a huge event, and are honored to race in his memory.'

The Heddins team is beyond thankful for all the sponsors, whose generosity and monetary support have made these races possible. The team is currently hoping for more sponsors this season, and anyone interested can submit forms via mail or email.

"Come race with us," Heddins invited as the interview came to an end. "But most importantly, come laugh with us. Come spend time with us. There's no better place to be on a Friday night."

Heddin's Motorsports and the Midwest Super Cup Series also races for Suicide Awareness continuously throughout the season, hoping to remember and honor all those we have lost, and support resources for those

In the reel world, Governor Pritzker has submitted a \$42.9 billion budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1. 

Why Do We Have Visitations?

As a funeral director working with families who have experienced a death, I am more commonly hearing questions such as: "What is the purpose of having a visitation? We're just going to have a memorial service at a later date." Or even, "We don't want anything at



Morris Hospital Announces **Updated Visitor Guidelines**

In response to improvements in COVID-19 test positivity and incidence rates, Morris Hospital has updated its visitor guidelines.

As of February 19, one visitor/support person age 18 or older is permitted for patients going to Morris Hospital for any reason. There is only one exception: visitors are not permitted for patients who are hospitalized with COVID-19.

Inpatient visiting hours are 12:00-7:00 p.m. The support person for obstetrical patients will continue to have 24-hour visiting.

Visitors going to the hospital on weekends should use the Emergency entrance after 1:00 p.m. on Saturdays and after 11:00 a.m. on Sundays.

Special visiting arrangements may be requested for children 17 and younger, patients with an intellectual and/or developmental visitors.







Senate Agriculture Chairman Patrick Joyce (D-Essex) is joining the Illinois Department of Agriculture in reminding farmers and farm workers to be cautious when working in and

around grain bins. "This week is dedicated to raising awareness of hazards and safe work practices to reduce the number of accidents associated with grain handling and storage," Joyce said. "I urge farmers to slow down and be safe to prevent a tragedy."

Joyce says moving grain acts like quicksand and a worker standing on moving grain can be trapped within just five seconds and completely covered in grain in less than half a minute.

Three of the most common scenarios leading to grain entrapment include:

A worker stands on moving

Joyce Stresses Grain Bin Safety On The Farm

February 21-27 is Grain Bin Safety Week

caused by an auger running or grain being moved out of the bin by gravity.

A worker stands on or below a grain bridging situation. Bridging happens when damp grain clumps together, creating an empty space beneath the grain as it is unloaded. A worker above or below this bridge of grain is at risk should the bridge collapse.

A worker stands next to an accumulated pile of grain on the side of the bin and attempts to dislodge it. It can collapse onto the worker.

While workers should avoid entering grain bins if possible, safety measures can greatly diminish the risk if they must enter. Workers entering a grain bin wear a body harness attached to a lifeline, and an observer should be stationed outside the bin to track the worker and call for help if something goes wrong.

Joyce suggests farm workers attend regular safety trainings as a reminder to utilize

DTHS February Board Actions

BOE Returns to In-Person Meetings/21-22 Calendar Approved

The Dwight Township High School Board of Education met on February 17 in its first inperson session since measures to combat the pandemic moved meetings to a virtual platform.

The 2021-22 school calendar was approved by the BOE. Next year's calendar calls for the first day of student attendance to be Wednesday, August 18, 2021. Highlights from the calendar include no school November 24 - 26 due to the Thanksgiving holiday. Winter Break will begin on December 20, 2021 with students returning to school on January 5, 2022. Spring Break has been designated as March 21 -March 25, 2022, May 26, 2022 is the planned last day of student attendance; however, five emergency days designated as May 27 and May 31 - June 3, 2022 could impact the final day of school.

Addressing other business, school bus leases and extensions were discussed. The Board approved a two year lease extension for the nine pre-owned 2019 buses at a cost of \$11,150 per bus per year. For the two needed lift busses, the BOE approved a three year lease for two new 2022 lift busses at an annual cost of \$15,514 per lift bus.

In an effort to keep the Industrial Arts program alive and available to DTHS students in a time when teachers in this field are scarce, the board approved the hiring of a currently uncertified teacher. Robert Caridi will be employed as a Long Term Substitute / Industrial Arts Teacher. Mr. Caridi, who has a substitute teaching license and brings much experience in the field of woodworking and industrial arts, will complete his master's pro-



gram within a year to earn his teaching certificate. Caridi will work alongside Mr. Jeff Froelich for the fourth quarter this year to mimic student teaching before taking over the classroom as a long team substitute next fall while completing the program for his teaching certificate. Mr. Froelich, who has retired but was filling the position, will not be retuning next fall.

In reports to the board, Superintendent Dr. Richard Jancek noted that the Livingston County Health Department recently held a clinic at DTHS to provide COVID vaccinations for Dwight Public School employees along with staff of the Odell Public School and St Paul School. It was noted that LCHD has trained school nurse Erica Sandeno to administer rapid COVID tests. This free test will be made available to high school coaches and high school athletes on a voluntary basis and when applicable.

DTHS Principal Andrew Pittenger reported that current enrollment at DTHS reflects 229 total students with 175 students opting for in-person learning and 54 students currently choosing remote learning. Mr. Pittenger also informed the board that an after school study program began on January 25 providing additional assistance to students with failing grades.

Mr. Pittenger also discussed recommendations with the board for the 2021-22 year including the addition of a Tran-

sitional Math course. Regarding schedule structure, it was decided to move to a modified block schedule. The modified block format, which was the preferred option of most teachers, will allow for one day of traditional learning, on Mondays, with four days of block scheduling each week.

Athletic Director Cathy Ferguson reported that the season for boys basketball, girls basketball and competition cheerleading has begun. Scholastic Bowl has also been holding virtual meets and Dwight has agreed to host the Regional Scholastic Bowl on Monday, March 8, with ap proximately six to seven schools in attendance. The Regional meets will be in-person. It was also reported that football practices are allowed to begin on March 3 and Volleyball practices can begin on March 8.

The board also:

- · affirmed employment of Elisabeth Bland, Substitute Bus Monitor.
- · approved employment of Jared Steck, Assistant Boys Golf Coach.
- · affirmed employment of Schultz, Substitute Teacher.
- · discussed additional Social Worker resources for the 2021 - 22 school year.
- approved a Resolution, TRS supplemental Savings Plan/Voya Financial.

The next regular meeting of the Dwight Township High School Board of Education will be 6 p.m., Wednesday, March 17 in the DTHS cafeteria. Virtual access for anyone wanting to attend BOE meetings will also continue to be available. Anyone logging in will be able to listen and watch only. New Series Steers Into Grundy County Speedway

Midwest Super Cup Series Begins May 7

"We took the rules, and laid them out side by side. At the time, there were three other cup series, all racing under very slim differences," Eric Heddins, owner/operator of Heddins Motorsports, paused a moment, reflecting on the course-altering conversation that led to the creation of a new series. "Now, for the first time in 20 years, drivers from all over will be able to race together under one series, thanks to a few simple changes. It's re-

ally exciting." Debuting this season at Morris' Grundy County Speedway, the new program is a super cup series, promising a friendlier atmosphere, more accessibility for racers, and plenty of updates for a completely new and unique competition. Pulling potential racers from Wisconsin, Iowa, Indiana, Michigan and even Ohio, this series is planned to be much larger, and much more inclusive, leading to better races.

Though the point system

will stay similar to that of any any sort of decision-making in other series, purses will now be offered as part of Heddins' new program, currently unheard of in any midwest super cup series. A purse is a pool of prize money paid out to racers, usually funded by sponsor donations. "We are currently seeking 11 businesses to fund the upcoming races," Heddins said of the new feature. "There will be a payout every night of the race, something that's completely new for these kids." As part of the series, kids will also get the chance to win trophies, and participate in an end of the year celebratory banquet, also funded in part by sponsor do-

Heddins also put together new staff, placing the utmost importance on his team's role and responsibility for how the race goes. "Combined, both Scott Pool and Ken Odo have decades of racing experience," Eric said confidently of the new hires. "And the additional staff also allows for me to completely remove myself from

race outcomes, ensuring a fair competition."

Well-versed in his line of work, Eric was always interested in cars - particularly the ones that went fast. "I loved anything with four wheels and an engine," he said, remembering long days spent working on cars with his father. "I still do." Having also owned and operated Heddins Motorsports since 2019, Eric has always searched for ways to bring people together, originally forming the business to help service more teams.

Heddins took time to address any concerns parents might have about becoming involved with the sport, and above all, stress the family-oriented and supportive atmosphere down at the track. "The time investment breaks down to about two hours a week, outside of actual time spent racing," he explained. "This could (continued on page 3)

Protect Benefits for Children with Special Needs

If you have a child or other family member who has special needs due to physical or mental conditions, you face a variety of challenges planning for their care, including financial ones. You may also have some well-meaning relatives who want to help, but who may not realize that their moves could actually result in some serious lifestyle and monetary problems for your loved one. Fortunately, by planning ahead, you can avoid these potential traps.

As you probably already know, individuals with special needs are eligible for a variety of government benefits and local programs that provide assistance with housing, medical needs, specialized equipment, independent living, job training and other services. You may also know that some of these programs require participants to meet financial criteria to qualify for benefits. Usually, this isn't a problem if your loved one has little income and few assets.

Difficulties can arise, though, when other relatives, such as grandparents, include loved ones with special needs in their estate plans by naming them as beneficiaries of insurance policies or retirement assets, or as beneficiaries of any trusts the grandparents have established. In these situations, loved ones who receive or inherit a sizable amount of assets may then be ruled ineligible for some important services.

Hopefully, your relatives will have informed you of their plans. If so, let them know that although you appreciate their generosity, the way they've chosen to show it could have unanticipated - and harmful - effects. You could then suggest ways they could structure their gifts to be more valuable.

Specifically, they can help through a special needs trust, either one that's already been created or one they create for their gift. A special needs trust is designed to help people with special needs use financial gifts or inheritances for a variety of purposes while keeping their eligibility for some government programs and other services. There are two main types of special needs trust:

First-party special needs trust

An individual with special needs, their legal guardian or the court can establish a first-party special needs trust benefiting that individual. The first-party special needs trust is funded by the individual's own assets, either through earnings or an inheritance or a personal injury award. A first-party trust contains a "payback" rule, which means that when the individual beneficiary with special needs dies, the trust must pay back the state for certain benefits received.

Third-party special needs trust

A relative or person other than the individual with special needs who wants to include that individual in their estate plan can set up a third-party special needs trust. The third party trust is funded with assets from someone other than the individual with special needs. With a third-party trust, no "payback" provision is required.

Many issues are involved in establishing an appropriate special needs trust. Consequently, you'll need to consult with your legal advisor to determine your next steps. Afterwards, you'll want to involve everyone in your family who could contribute to a trust, so they'll all know what to expect and how they can participate. Once the arrangements are made, you can all feel like you've done your part to make things easier for the loved one in your life with special needs.

Dwight FPD, EMS, PD Assist in Life-Saving Rescue Following Crash

An accident occurred shortly after 2:00 a.m. February 20 near the intersection of Verona Road and 3300 North Road (County Line).

OnStar notified Vermilion Valley 911 Dispatch, who then notified Dwight Fire, Dwight EMS, Dwight PD, and Livingston County PD. Upon the emergency crews' arrival, the driver of the vehicle was not located.

Knowing the time of the accident through OnStar, emergency crews began a ground search for the driver. Mutual aid was requested to assist with the search, including Grundy County Sheriff's Department, Livingston County Sheriff's Department, Pontiac Police Department Drone, and Illinois State Police.

Search efforts continued through the early morning when the subject was located near the northwest corner, outside of the closed women's correctional center, at approximately 8:45 a.m.

The subject was located in a combined effort with all of the aforementioned agencies. When the subject was located, he was in severe hypothermia laying in a snowbank.

Dwight Fire requested mutual aid assistance from Reddick with their UTV and Dwight EMS requested a helicopter for medical transport. A local resident was on scene and was able to assist with the use of a tractor to get emergency crews and equipment to the subject.

Crews had to get through a

fence and track through high snow drifts to be able to extricate the subject, who was removed from the elements and in the care of Dwight EMS until the Superior helicopter arrived on scene and transported the patient to Christ Hospital.

Dwight FPD Deputy Fire Chief Justin Dyer stated that "the combined efforts and the dedication of all emergency crews proved to save a life today. We are unsure at this time why the individual had left the scene of the accident, but we are certain he is alive at this time because of the amazing work by all of the emergency agencies. Dwight Fire would like to thank all of the agencies involved in the search and rescue; especially the dispatchers at our 911 center."

Jesse White Calls on Drivers to Move Over for Stopped Emergency Vehicles



(continued from page 1) involve practicing, or performing maintenance on the car, but beyond that it's pretty comparable to any other youth sport." Eric also assured that parents who worry about being car literate enough for the maintenance aspect of the sport will also find support at the track, with plenty of friendly faces willing to offer tips and a helping hand.

Heddins also discussed safety concerns, making it a top priority of his team at the Speedway. Safety equipment, such as fire resistant suits and gloves, as well as protective head gear, like helmets, and head and neck retraints, will need to be purchased prior to racing. The cars used in the series, considered stock cars, are fully contained, and allow for more crash protection. "All the parts of these cars are wellmade, and their smaller size makes them a bit safer," Heddins explained, also mentioning that the vehicles allow younger racers currently driving carts to smoothly transition to entry-level racing cars. "Of course, there are some bumps and bruises from time to time, but drivers are, for the most

After all the registration fees and purchasing necessary equipment, Heddins realizes racing can get pricey. "Some of these things can get up there in cost, but we also set out to make this series as inexpensive as possible to get into," Heddins said. "It kind of depends on you and your child, and how much you want to put into the sport beyond the necessities."

Racing may prove to be a slightly hefty time and cost commitment, but the benefit to youth racers through experience and connection is unmatched. Time spent off the track is just as important as time spent on, with plenty to take away from the process of preparation and practice. With tools in hand, surrounded by family and friends, kids have a safe and supportive environment to learn, grow, and discover themselves.

Nothing is more empowering than problem solving a repair, and seeing the results of the fix as the car zooms flawlessly around the track. Determination, too, can be found intermingled in the losses just as much as the wins, encouraging kids to keep pushing for-

originally of Crown Point, IN, passed away while on active duty in the United States Marine Corps at just 25 years old. "His father, Thomas Smith, still races with us," Heddins said. "We are hoping to make this a huge event, and are honored to race in his memory.'





Pre-Planning and Honoring the Memory of a Loved One

Why Do We Have Visitations?

As a funeral director working with families who have experienced a death, I am more commonly hearing questions such as: "What is the purpose of having a visitation? We're just going to have a memorial service at a later date." Or even, "We don't want anything at

In many cases, families arrive to make arrangements already planning on not having a visitation.

Some common explanations may be: "Mom didn't want a fuss..." or "Dad didn't want anyone looking at him in a casket..." Or one of the most common, "They said if they didn't come see me alive, I don't want them to see me dead..."

Today's society would not think of attending a wedding without the newlyweds present for the ceremony, or go to a baptism without the baby. We may chuckle to think of showing up for church to that wedding, only to see the couple's photo on an easel, all while the new Mr. and Mrs. may have already left for the honeymoon.

It is, however, becoming common practice for people to show up for a memorial service without the body present. Or not have any ceremony at all to honor the life of the departed.

During the current pandemic, it has become even more clear to us the importance of being able to see the loved one who has died, and join together to not only mourn the death, but celebrate the life

A visitation gives the community an opportunity to say goodbye. To process that their loved one, friend, colleague, etc. has died. It provides a support network and gives others the opportunity to show love and support, as well as extend words of kindness. 

Morris Hospital Announces **Updated Visitor Guidelines**

In response to improvements in COVID-19 test positivity and incidence rates, Morris Hospital has updated its visitor guidelines.

As of February 19, one visitor/support person age 18 or older is permitted for patients going to Morris Hospital for any reason. This includes hospital inpatients, emergency visits, surgeries and procedures, outpatient tests and therapy sessions, Immediate/Convenient Care and physician office visits. There is only one exception: visitors are not permitted for patients who are hospitalized with COVID-19.

Inpatient visiting hours are 12:00-7:00 p.m. The support person for obstetrical patients will continue to have 24-hour visiting.

Visitors going to the hospital on weekends should use the Emergency entrance after 1:00 p.m. on Saturdays and after 11:00 a.m. on Sundays.

Special visiting arrangements may be requested for children 17 and younger, patients with an intellectual and/or developmental visitors.





Senate Agriculture Chairman Patrick Joyce (D-Essex) is joining the Illinois Department of Agriculture in reminding farmers and farm workers to be cautious when working in and

around grain bins. "This week is dedicated to raising awareness of hazards and safe work practices to reduce the number of accidents associated with grain handling and storage," Joyce said. "I urge farmers to slow down and be safe to prevent a tragedy."

Joyce says moving grain acts like quicksand and a worker standing on moving grain can be trapped within just five seconds and completely covered in grain in less than half a minute.

Three of the most common scenarios leading to grain entrapment include:

A worker stands on moving

Joyce Stresses Grain Bin Safety On The Farm

caused by an auger running or grain being moved out of the bin by gravity.

A worker stands on or below a grain bridging situation. Bridging happens when damp grain clumps together, creating an empty space beneath the grain as it is unloaded. A worker above or below this bridge of grain is at risk should the bridge collapse.

A worker stands next to an accumulated pile of grain on the side of the bin and attempts to dislodge it. It can collapse onto the worker.

While workers should avoid entering grain bins if possible, safety measures can greatly diminish the risk if they must enter. Workers entering a grain bin wear a body harness attached to a lifeline, and an observer should be stationed outside the bin to track the worker and call for help if something goes wrong.

Joyce suggests farm workers attend regular safety trainings as a reminder to utilize





"Back-to-back nights with two road RVC wins," added Wills. "One more hard one this Friday at St. Anne."


Friday, February 19 GSW vs. St. Anne Varsity -


