

Dwight Proposed Budget Discussions Underway

February 22 Board of Trustees Recap

The Dwight Village Board of Trustees met on February 22 following an Administration Committee meeting where a review continued of the proposed Fiscal Year 2021/22 budget.

Administrator Village Kevin McNamara noted that the basically flat budget proposal includes no major projects except for those affiliated with expected grants and bonds. A two percent employee salary increase is reflected in the budget proposal. With regard to the proposed budget, Finance Director Austin Haacke commended Village officials saying, "We are passing a balanced budget in what can easily be called a trying time – so that should not be taken lightly."

A public hearing with regard to the proposed budget will be held on March 22 prior to that evening's board meeting where the final budget proposal is slated to be passed.

In other business, the board approved contract agreements for both Local 399 International Union of Operating Engineers (Dwight Public Works employees) and Chapter 636 Metropolitan Alliance of Police (Dwight Police personnel). Both three year contracts include a two percent salary increase for year one; a 2.5 percent increase for year two; and a three percent increase for vear three. Both contracts include the addition of the employee's birthday as a paid holiday and the elimination of the Good Friday holiday, but with the addition of the Martin Luther King holiday. All Trustees present voted in favor of the two contracts with the exception of Trustee Jerry Curtis who opposed. Trustee Curtis expressed disagreement with the addition of the employee birthday as a holiday. Trustee Chuck Butterbordt was not present.

Three ordinances with regard to bonds were also approved by the board.

Ordinance 1455 authorizing the issuance of Waterworks Revenue Bonds in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$2.3 million or, in lieu thereof, Taxable General Obligation Bonds not to exceed \$2.3 million, for the purpose of refunding outstanding obligations of the Village, paying the costs of improving the waterworks system of the Village, and paying costs associated with said Bonds was passed by the board with Trustee Justin Eggenberger opposing.

Ordinance 1456 authorizing the issuance of Taxable General Obligation Refunding Bonds in one or more series in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$600,000 for the purpose of refunding outstanding obligations of the Village and paying for costs related thereto (bond restructuring) was approved by all present.

Ordinance 1457 authorizing the issuance of Taxable General Obligation Refunding Bonds, Series 2021C, in one or more series, in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$4,150,000 for the purpose of refunding certain outstanding obligations of the Village and paying for costs related thereto (bond restructuring) was approved by all present.

In reports to the board, Mayor Jared Anderson commended Dwight Public Works for their efforts during the February extreme cold and snow and the outstanding job done to keep Dwight streets clear and the village operational.

Village Administrator Mc-Namara noted that a Livingston County Department COVID-19 vaccination clinic recently took place in Dwight with 416 vaccines administered during the four hour period.

Chief of Police Tim Henson, along with others, commended Dwight Police Officer Alex Butts for his actions to assist during a recent County Police call where Butts located the driver of a vehicle that had left the single vehicle accident scene on foot during extreme cold temperatures. Butts was credited for life-saving efforts of the accident victim.

The board also approved: payment of bills totaling \$66,326.53.

Present at the February 22 session were Mayor Jared Anderson and Trustees Randy Irvin, Jerry Curtis, Marla Kinkade, Jennifer Johnson and Justin Eggenberger. Absent was Chuck Butterbrodt.

The next meeting of the Dwight Village Board of Trustees will take place at 6:30 p.m., Monday, March 8. The Dwight Common School District #232 Board of Education met in a special session on February 24 where Fourth Quarter learning platforms were approved.

For the 2021 Fourth Quarter, all Dwight Common School students will have the Bailey Conroy, 8th Grade Girls option for fulltime in-person learning. The fulltime in-person learning platform will include a daily 2 p.m. dismissal time. In addition, all students are also offered the option of a full remote learning platform.

Fourth Quarter begins March

Gardner Village Board Meets, **Discusses Solar Ordinance**

The Gardner Village Board met in regular session February 22 and opened with the board discussing amending the solar ordinance. Mayor Mike Serena commented there were inquiries regarding installing solar panels and the village code does not currently reference solar panels on buildings. The board reviewed neighboring ordinances and Commissioner Dick Hileman suggested revising the ordinance from Coal City to reflect Gardner and then use it to amend the existing reference to solar farms. The issue was tabled until the next meeting to allow revision

and further review.

Commissioner Dick Hileman reported several CD's have come due and he is renewing in Dwight and Gardner banks. Hileman opened a discussion of attempting the sale of the five-plus acres on the northwest corner of the intersection of 53, 129, and Gardner. Hileman provided a proposal outlining options for marketing the property to tax revenue generating enterprises. The board agreed with moving forward and Hileman will continue discussion with the marketing agent.

Hileman reported one new

pump is on line at the water plant, 50 tons of salt ordered last year has arrived, and the village has already used over 125 tons this winter. Hileman is investigating options for using motor fuel tax funds for purchasing salt to lessen the burden on the general fund following the expenditure for the water tower.

Village engineer Casey Mc-Collom commented Chamlin & Associates can complete the paperwork for using motor fuel tax funds for salt and the board will only need to pass a resolution to move the project forward.

Election Judges are responsible for the administration of election procedures in the polling place on Election Day and are in a position to ensure that the election process is administered fairly and in accordance with the law.

Following is general information with respect to the qualduties ifications, compensation for participating as an election judge.

Qualifications – Must be a citizen of the United States; of good repute and character; be able to speak, read and write the English language; not be a candidate for any office in the election and not be elected committeeman; and declare your party preference.

Duties - Opening (6:00 a.m.) and closing (7:00 p.m.) the polls; responsible for all election materials; ensure that only qualified voters are permitted to vote and that each qualified voter is permitted to vote once and only once; give instruction in the method of voting when requested by a voter; give assistance to illiterate and physically disabled voters; maintain order in the polling place throughout the day; tally the vote after the polls are closed and certify the

> Training/Compensation -Prior to serving as a judge, a training session must be completed. Before each election, several election judge training schools will be held, with a mandatory session held every two years. Rep. Kinzinger Statement on the Equality Act


Congressman Kinzinger (IL-16) released the following statement after his vote against H.R. 5 on Febru-

"Without question, we need to provide for protections for LGBTQ Americans, and at the same time, defend religious liberties. The overreach of the Equality Act was extensive in some areas of real concern. The partisan bill failed to include protections afforded by the Hyde Amendment. And that is something I simply cannot allow, so I voted against the legislation.

"As this legislation was done entirely without House

Adam Republican input, I believe there is an opportunity to try and work on an alternative proposal. If the Senate can negotiate a solution to some of the issues raised, I will look to vote in support of that version of the Equality Act.'

The Congressman spoke on CNN Feb. 25, about the need to treat one another with basic human decency. As he said, we can disagree on policy, which we do, but we have to start seeing the humanity in each other again. Congressman Kinzinger remains committed to finding a way to support this legislation with the protection of religious

January Video Gaming

Video gambling in Dwight and statewide was okayed to resume January 16. It was stopped in November of 2020 due to the pandemic.

\$338,796 was played in Dwight's 53 video gaming terminals, the village receiving \$4,196 as its share of Net Terminal Income.

Video gambling in Illinois took place at 7,283 locations in January, 50 more than in November.

There were 14 fewer video gaming terminals in use in January for a total of 37,145. Two terminals were added in Dwight.

Livingston County Voter Registration Deadline Information

Kristy Masching will have her office open Saturday, March 6, from 9:00 a.m. until noon for in-person voter registration. The in-person and mail-in registration deadline for the April 6, 2021, Consolidated Election is Tuesday, March 9. This includes new registrations as well as changes of address or name.

In order to register to vote: You must be a U.S. citizen; must have been a resident of the precinct at least 30 days prior to Election Day and the age of 18 on or before the Consolidated Election (April 6, 2021).

voter registration: Must take two forms of identification showing your current residence address (current government issued photo ID and a piece of mail delivered to the registrant at their address).

• All voters must be registered to the correct physical address before casting a ballot postmark date). (this includes changing apartments in the same building). • If a voter has not cast a

ballot at the last two Federal Elections, his/her registration could be inactivated. • If you have changed your

name and moved, your voter registration will need to be transferred.

• Livingston County voters needing to register to vote or change registration on Election Day, can only do so at the Livingston County Clerk's office. Voter registration is not available at any Livingston County polling sites.

How Can Women Overcome Obstacles to Financial Security?

On March 8, we observe International Women's Day, a celebration of the social, economic, cultural and political achievements of women. Of course, women still tend to encounter more obstacles than men in the pursuit of financial security. Let's consider a few of them.

To begin with, women are still more likely to leave the workforce, at least temporarily, to raise children, resulting in lower contributions to employer-sponsored retirement plans such as 401(k)s. Consider the COVID-19 pandemic: Just a few months ago, in December, women lost 156,000 jobs, while men gained 16,000, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, which also reported that women accounted for 54% of the jobs lost from the pandemic in 2020.

And women are not unaware of their circumstances and outlook. Just 41% of women are confident about retirement, compared with 56% of men, according to a survey by Edward Jones and Age Wave.

But if you're a woman, you can take steps to help improve your financial outlook. Here are a few suggestions:

• Take full advantage of retirement plans If you are still working and your employer offers a 401(k) or similar retirement plan, take full advantage of it. Put in as much as you can afford each year and increase your contributions when your salary goes up. Also, within your plan, you'll want to choose the mix of investments that can help provide the most growth potential, given your individual risk tolerance. Also, even

if you contribute to a 401(k) or similar plan, you may also be eligible to fund an IRA, which gives you even more investment

• Evaluate your Social Security options You can typically start taking Social Security benefits when you're 62, but your monthly checks will be much larger if you wait until your "full" retirement age, which will likely be between 66 and 67. You might also consider whether you'd be better off by taking spousal benefits, if you're married and your spouse earned more money than you. You're generally even eligible for spousal benefits if you are divorced, as long as you were married at least 10 years and you haven't remarried.

 Look for unexpected income opportunities Even after you've formally retired, you may still find ways to receive some earned income. Perhaps you can work part time or do some consulting. And if you're a caregiver, you might be able to receive some compensation for your work. Many local governments pay non-spouse caregivers who act as personal attendants, although the rules vary greatly by state and

These certainly aren't the only ways you can improve your financial status, but they may prove useful to you. In any case, be aware of the challenges facing you and do whatever you can to brighten your future.

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























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Alpha Beta Learns About **Nearby Hiking and Outdoor Activities**

On February 13, Alpha Beta Chapter of the Delta Kappa Gamma Society met via Zoom. Mary Jo Adams, Illinois Grand Prairie Master Naturalist, and Lenore Sobota, reporter for the Pantagraph, informed members about the year-round hiking and outdoor activities available in central illinois.

If hiking, Mary Jo suggested to take a buddy; take a camera, binoculars, and phone; get a trail map; dress appropriately with good footwear; and beware of poison ivy, ticks, etc. Lenore added to take insect repellant, wear long pants, and stay on the trails.

Constitutional Trail, which borders Bloomington-Normal, has 50 miles of paved trail with numerous parking spots. Parklands Preserves in McLean and Woodford Counties, has the 175-acre Lexington Preserve, with four miles of hiking. Merwin Preserve, with 713 acres of prairie, savanna, and woods, is noted for its wildflowers and birds in the spring. The Letcher Basin Preserve has 260 acres of restored prairie great for hiking, including Wyatt's Ford, where Lincoln crossed the river on his way to Metamora. The Kenyon and Hayes Woods Preserve features Panther Creek, along with being bordered by the Mackinaw River.

Comlara Park at Evergreen Lake, between El Paso and Hudson, is the favorite of the speakers and is popular for hiking, boating, fishing, archery, birding, and cross-

country skiing. Moraine View State Park by Leroy provides invigorating exploration, has a restaurant, and the Timber Point Handicapped Trail, which is 1/2-mile long. Funk's Grove in southern McLean County has seven miles of trails, many parking areas, and the Sugar Grove Nature Center.

At the business meeting, Co-Pres. Karen Harms (Fairbury) announced that Lila Mc-Culley (Minonk), who passed away, will be honored at the May meeting.

Membership Chair Louann Harms (Fairbury) requested that Early Education Grant applications be distributed. Note: Making a false statement to obtain a mail ballot or soliciting someone to do so is considered voter fraud, a criminal offense punishable by up to five years in prison.










I spent an hour last week watching an internet presentation by Rick Harnish on the "Lessons Learned and Challenges Presented" by the proposed Chicago/St. Louis high-speed rail project. Harnish is executive director of the Midwest High Speed Rail Alliance.

Readers have seen stories in this column about the failure of the proposed high speed venture in Illinois. which was begun with \$1.2billion in federal dollars in 2009. Illinois later added \$300-million.

Trains go no faster than they did before, they are ofttimes late, right now two trains north and two south have been temporarily discontinued on the Chicago/St. Louis route.

Meanwhile, Governor Pritzker budgeted another \$50-million to help keep Amtrak running in Illinois for another year, however limited the service.

In his presentation, Harnish made a case for not only continuing the high speed rail effort, but enhancing it with the addition of more frequent trains, which could increase ridership. Increased government aid and commitment would be absolutely necessary.

I say Privatize it. Get the government out of it.

He estimated the prescribed use of body cameras would cost Dwight some \$20,000, plus some means of storage. Those making complaints against the police will no longer have to sign an affidavit and can remain anonymous. There are a lot more negatives.

Henson said the new rules, regulations and restrictions will make it much more difficult to secure qualified applicants for police work.

"But," he said, "we will abide by the new rules and regulations and continue to serve the people as best we

Personally, I think those who backed the new "reform" legislation should spend a week riding with police in the real world. A vest would be recommended.

Time Out for the Sea Turtles

Personnel from Ranch Cryogenics, Inc., Dwight/ Blackstone, were especially busy two weeks ago helping save thousands of sea turtles which had washed up on Texas beaches due to the windy, freezing weather which struck the gulf coast relentlessly.

Power outages added to the problems.

The people from Cryogenics had been working at the Space X launch site nearby. They joined hundreds of other volunteers who waded in to rescue the sea turtles, which cannot survive in prolonged temperatures below 50 de-

The turtles, some weighing hundreds of pounds, are unable to regulate their own body temperature and though awake, lose their ability to move. It is called a "cold stun."

The rescued turtles were taken to warming tanks, a gymnasium, kiddie pools, and boxes, and many were saved by a large electrical generator from Space X.

There are five species of sea turtles found in Texas waters and all are considered either threatened or endangered, according to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife service.

The Beginning of the End

It is officially March of 2021, if you blinked you may have missed the last year. Simultaneously it may have felt like the last year was 4 years long.

This probably won't be the first, or last piece that's something along the lines of "what the last year has been like." I'm here to bring a positive spin to this idea that a year has passed, largely focusing on the vaccine and the numbers involved.

Let's look at some simple math to break this down. Math is fun, right? (Keep in mind I am in no way a epidemiologist or doctor, these are just simple observations from someone with internet access.)

As of today, according to NPR's numbers, somewhere between 75-80 million Americans have received at least one dose of the vaccine. That is coupled with the fact, as of now, 29 million Americans have had COVID-19. There are experts that estimate that could be as much as 3x that, for the sake of splitting the difference we're going to use 1.5 times that, so around 45 million.

That means as of right now, conservatively roughly 120 million Americans have some form of immunity to Covid-19, which is somewhere between 35-40% depending on the exact totals of those inoculated and having had covid as well as the American population.

The average number of people being inoculated per day is 1.7 million. At that pace, which I think will only tick up as the bottleneck un-bottlenecks itself, we will be at the number of Americans needed for "herd immunity" in roughly three months. Again, I'm just a guy with the internet, but I really do think the beginning of what we would deem as "normal life" or something close to it is much closer to the horizon. Three more months might seem like an eternity but given everything else when it's all said it done will likely seem like a drop in the bucket.

I hope the media coverage turns to this and shines light on the fact that developing and distributing a vaccine in this amount of time is incredible and something that should be applauded. I've seen and read enough of the dreary covid news and I think we are finally turning the corner.

I could, and very well might be wrong, but I would anticipate more and more restrictions are lifted in the coming weeks and months.





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

ORDINANCE NO. 1455

AN ORDINANCE authorizing the issuance of Waterworks Revenue Bonds of the Village of Dwight, Livingston and Grundy Counties, Illinois, in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$2,300,000 or, in lieu thereof, Taxable General Obligation Bonds (Waterworks System Alternate Revenue Source) (said bonds being general obligation bonds for which property taxes, unlimited as to rate or amount, may be levied, but which are expected to be paid from the net revenues of the waterworks system of said Village) in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$2,300,000, for the purpose of refunding outstanding obligations of the Village, paying the costs of improving the waterworks system of the Village, and paying costs associated with said Bonds.

WHEREAS, the Village of Dwight, Livingston and Grundy Counties, Illinois (the "Village"), is a duly organized and existing municipality incorporated and existing under the provisions of the laws of the State of Illinois (the "State"), and is now operating under the provisions of the Illinois Municipal Code, as amended (the "Code"), and for many years has owned and operated a municipally owned waterworks system (the "System") as set forth in Division 129 of Article 11 of the Code ("Division 129"); and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the Village (the "Corporate Authorities") has determined that it is necessary to (i) refund the Village's outstanding General Obligation Bonds (Alternate Revenue Source), Series 2016A (the "Refunding"), which were originally issued to construct certain water system improvements including water infrastructure extension, (ii) finance certain capital improvements within the Village (the "Project"), and (iii) pay certain costs of issuance of the Bonds (as such term is hereinafter defined), all for the benefit of the inhabitants of the

WHEREAS, the estimated cost of the Refunding and the Project, including legal, financial, bond discount, printing and publication costs, capitalized interest, and other expenses (collectively, the "Costs"), is not less than \$2,300,000, and there are insufficient funds on hand and lawfully available to pay such costs; and

WHEREAS, the Corporate Authorities have further determined that it is advisable, necessary and in the best interests of the Village that the Refunding and the Project be completed and, in order to finance the cost of the Refunding and the Project, it will be necessary for the Village to issue bonds payable from the Net Revenues (generally, Net Revenues means gross revenues minus operation and maintenance expenses) derived from the operation by the Village of the System as authorized to be issued at this time pursuant to Divison 129 (the "Water Revenue Bonds") or, in lieu thereof, alternate bonds (the "Alternate Bonds"), being general obligation bonds payable from the Net Revenues of the System (the "Pledged Revenues"), in an amount not to exceed \$2,300,000, as authorized to be issued at this time pursuant to the Act;

WHEREAS, if the Pledged Revenues are insufficient to pay the Alternate Bonds, ad valorem property taxes upon all taxable property in the Village without limitation as to rate or amount are authorized to be extended to pay the principal of and interest on the Alternate Bonds:

NOW, THEREFORE, Be It Ordained by the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Dwight, Livingston and Grundy Counties, Illi-

Incorporation of Preambles. The Corporate Au-Section 1. thorities hereby find that all of the recitals contained in the preambles to this Ordinance are full, true and correct and do incorporate them into this Ordinance by this reference.

<u>Declaration of Intent.</u> Section 2. It is advisable, necessary and in the best interests of the Village to complete the Refunding and the Project in accordance with the estimate of costs as hereinabove described, and that for such purpose, there are hereby authorized to be issued and sold the Water Revenue Bonds or, in lieu thereof, the Alternate Bonds, in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$2,300,000.

Publication. Within ten (10) days after the adoption of this Ordinance, this Ordinance, together with a notice in the statutory form, shall be published once by the Corporate Authorities in The Paper, being a newspaper of general circulation within the Village, and if a petition, signed by 271 electors (said number being 10% of the registered voters in the Village), is filed with the Village Clerk within thirty (30) days after the date of the publication, asking that the question of the issuance of the Water Revenue Bonds (the "Water Revenue Bond Proposition") be submitted to referendum, then the Water Revenue Bond Proposition shall be submitted to the electors of the Village at the general primary election to be held on the 15th day of March, 2022, unless there are no voters scheduled to cast votes for any candidates for nomination for, election to or retention in public office, in which case the Water Revenue Bond Proposition shall be submitted to the electors of the County at the general election to be held on the 8th day of November, 2022. If no petition is filed with the Village Clerk within said 30-day period, then this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect and the Water Revenue Bonds shall be authorized to be issued. A petition form shall be provided by the Village Clerk at the principal office of the Village, located at 209

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South Prairie Avenue, Dwight, Illinois, to any individual requesting one. This Ordinance, together with a notice in the statutory form, shall be published once by the Corporate Authorities in The Paper, being a newspaper of general circulation in the Village, and if a petition, signed by 203 electors (said number being the greater of (i) seven and one-half percent (7½%) of the registered voters in the Village or (ii) the lesser of 200 registered voters or 15% of registered voters), asking that the question of the issuance of the Bonds (the "Alternate Bond Proposition") be submitted to the electors of the Village, is filed with the Village Clerk within thirty (30) days after the date of the publication, then the Alternate Bond Proposition shall be submitted to the electors of the Village at the general primary election to be held on the 15th day of March, 2022, unless there are no voters scheduled to cast votes for any candidates for nomination for, election to or retention in public office, in which case the Alternate Bond Proposition shall be submitted to the electors of the County at the general election to be held on the 8th day of November, 2022. If no petition is filed with the Village Clerk within said 30-day period, then this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect and the Alternate Bonds shall be authorized to be issued. A petition form shall be provided by the Village Clerk at the principal office of the Village, located at 209 South Prairie Avenue, Dwight, Illinois, to any individual requesting one.

It is expressly provided that in the event that there shall be filed with the Village Clerk in a timely manner a petition, asking that the issuance of the Water Revenue Bonds be submitted to referendum, the Alternate Bonds, payable from Net Revenues of the System, shall not be authorized to be issued until such time as the issuance of the Water Revenue Bonds shall have been submitted to the electors of the Village and a majority of the votes cast on such question shall have been in favor thereof.

Additional Ordinances. If no petition with respect to the issue of the Water Revenue Bonds or, in lieu thereof, the Alternate Bonds, and meeting the requirements of applicable law is filed during the petition period hereinabove referred to, then the Corporate Authorities may adopt additional ordinances or proceedings supplementing or amending this Ordinance providing for the issuance and sale of the Water Revenue Bonds or, in lieu thereof, the Alternate Bonds, and prescribing all the details of the Water Revenue Bonds or, in lieu thereof, the Alternate Bonds, so long as the maximum aggregate principal amount of the Water Revenue Bonds or, in lieu thereof, the Alternate Bonds, as set forth in this Ordinance is not exceeded and there is no material change in the Refunding or the Project. Such additional ordinances or proceedings shall in all instances become effective in accordance with applicable law. This Ordinance, together with such additional ordinances or proceedings, shall constitute complete authority for the issuance of the Water Revenue Bonds or, in lieu thereof, the Alternate Bonds, under applicable

Additional Proceedings. If no petition meeting Section 5. the requirement of applicable law is filed during the petition hereinabove referred to, then the preparation and distribution of a preliminary official statement relating to the Bonds is hereby approved, and the Mayor is hereby authorized to deem the preliminary official statement nearly final.

If any section, paragraph, clause Severability. Section 6. or provision of this Ordinance shall be held invalid or unenforceable, the invalidity or unenforceability of such section, paragraph, clause or provision shall not affect any of the other provisions of this Ordinance.

All ordinances, resolutions or Repealer. Section 7. orders, or parts thereof, in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are to the extent of such conflict hereby repealed.
