Turning 150 St. John's Lutheran Church, Cullom, **Celebrates Standing Since 1871**

Can any of you remember 1871?

Without a history book or Wikipedia page,

History book open (OK, Wikipedia lit up on the phone), Ulysses S. Grant was the President of the United States, the first reported game of Major League Baseball was played and France and Prussia were battling in a war.

Over here, in countryside Illinois, St. John's Lutheran Church was born in Cullom.

Fast forward to 2021, there has been 28 presidents since Grant, the MLB is an organization worth \$1.9 billion and the Franco-Prussian War was over five months into 1871.

The St. John's Lutheran Church still stands and is celebrating it's 150th Anniversary June 12-13 with music, food and fun for all.

"We're very involved with the community," said Andrew Flessner, a member of the church council and a deacon who was baptized at the church in 1970 and confirmed in 1987. "We do blood drives, lots of programs where we help out places like the Cullom Library, give money to nursing homes, we're active in the Cullom Junior Fair where we always run a church stand. Being benevolent in the community has always been a major goal for the church.

"This church has been a constant presence in the community. We take pride in helping the community and being a part of the community. It's given me a sense of community. A sense of wanting to help others, especially the less fortu-

With 150 years in the books, St. John's

Lutheran Church wants to thank you for attending, thank you for supporting it and helping to bring in the next 150 years.

At 3 p.m. Saturday, the festivities will begin as there will be a bags tournament – for kids, adults and seniors – a bounce house and other inflatables, kid's games, live music, food such as hamburgers and hotdogs cooking on the grill, refreshments, horse and carriage rides and church memorabilia to check out such as photos.

At 10 a.m. Sunday, there will be a special 150th Anniversary worship service. Immediately after the service will be a pork loin dinner and

Both days of fun and fellowship are free.

"There are signs all over town and we've been spreading the word," said Marsha Haag, a member of the church for 62 years. "Hopefully everyone comes out and joins us in having a good time. There are things for absolutely everyone." Haag is excited about the celebration because the church has meant a lot to her and her family over the years. Marsha and her husband David, a member of the church for 75 years, spent their childhoods, teenage years and adult life at St. John's.

Then their children went to Sunday School, Bible Study and were confirmed at the very same church.

'We've been creatures of habit. We continue to wake up and make sure we're there," said Marsha Haag. "Through the years, he and I have served on the church council in different positions.

Baseball on Display

Dwight Historical Society Shares 27 Locals Who Played in the MLB

Baseball has been played on American soil since the 1860s and Major League Baseball was formed in 1903.

These are years, landmarks easily found all over the internet.

What's not easily found and put into one hub for researchers, historians and baseball fans to learn and enjoy, is all the MLB players from one town, county or surrounding counties.

The Dwight Historical Society took the time to put up a baseball display sharing the accomplishments of 27 players from Dwight and its neighbors.

"I've always been interested in sports and Bill Flott has always been interested in doing something with sports at the society's depot," said Kim Drechsel, a Dwight High School Class of 1969 graduate and a member of the Historical

Society for the last five years. "I was helping Bill Pearch (Dwight native, who resides in Chicago and is the editor of SABR Magazine) with a project on Frank L. Smith and I was looking through microfilm. Now we're working on a project on Thomas Higgins, who lived six or seven miles west of Dwight, and played with the (St. Louis) Cardinals in

"That was kind of a starting point for my project of looking at Illinois born baseball players that kind of surrounded Dwight. I first went to the computer and

looked up Illinois born baseball players and started going through the counties. You can't pick everybody out, so I stuck with the counties touching Dwight and Livingston County. Thomas Higgins was our focal point."

Besides Livingston County, he found players from Grundy County, Will County, Kankakee County, Iroquois County and La Salle County.

The list of 27 players displayed doesn't contain a legend or a superstar and some of them only played 15 games or one season.

But to small, rural Illinois, Tom Prince, Terry Wells, George Cutshaw, Burt Keeley, Tanner Roark, Brian Dubois, Al Braithwood, John Sears, Lou Kolls, Bill Luhrsen, Scot Garrelts, Elmer Koestner, Bud Clancy, Harry Bay, Andy Bednar, Ruby Novotney, Ken Sears, Adam Shabala, Clay Zavada, Silas Johnson, Tom Sheehan, Dave Callahan, Billy Petrick, Greg Washburn, Scott Spiezio, Ed Spiezio and Eddie Higgins

mean a whole lot. "It was amazing to me to see guys like Burt Keeley from Wilmington play for Round Grove in 1899. He played for Washington in the majors and came to Dwight in 1908 to play against Dwight. George Cutshaw from Wilmington pitched against Dwight for Pontiac and then with Dwight, Frank Smith's

team, against the Detroit Tigers

1907. Thomas Higgins was a senior in high school and pitched against the Tigers.

"Silas Johnson was the last guy to strike out Babe Ruth three times in a game before he retired."

In part of the Red Carpet Corridor, the Historical Society opened the baseball display on

However, due to obtaining the other half of the depot after the Dwight Economic Alliance relocated, the society has been renovating to make the two halves of a building come together for one museum of interesting history.

For the baseball display to reach it's full potential, there will be a grand opening in June or early summer.

"I love it, I love it," said Mary Flott, a resident of Dwight since 1970, who took over as the Historical Society president in 2007 after Tony Thorsen held the reigns from 1980-2006. "I was a school teacher and my husband (Bill) and I were looking for things to do when I retired. We got involved kind of late, really, and we've met some great people and have done some fun projects. It's just been a great thing for us.

"We knew that Dwight has quite a baseball history and we knew about the Frank L. Smith team in the early 1900s. We knew that he brought clubs like the Cubs and the Tigers to play the Dwight team. Kim said, 'I really want to do a baseball display on other baseball players'. He found great information and made a great display about the players. It has been fun."

Drechsel did the majority of the research for the display and was trying to find the best way to present names, stats and accomplishments.

The pictures were neat and telling of eras, but (continued on page 12)

Illinois House completes spring session

The House adjourned on General Assembly on Friday. Tuesday, June 1, after finishing its spring session. Here is a quick recap of what was done (and not done) in the closing days and hours of the session.

State budget adopted, new taxes on businesses. I voted against the \$42 billion state budget just before midnight when it was hastily brought to the floor and put up for a vote. The final version of the 3000page bill was introduced just minutes before it was called for a vote. It relies on more than \$600 million in new taxes on businesses and it scuttles a bipartisan agreement on taxes that was part of the 2019 budget deal.

This budget is a relic of the old days which we all hoped had ended this year. A massive, last minute bill with tax increases at its core: this is no way to pass a budget.

Governor signs unfair, partisan map after clearly pledging not to do so.

After repeatedly pledging to do the opposite, Governor Pritzker signed House Bill 2777, the gerrymandered, partisan redistricting plan which was passed last week on a party-line vote.

Gerrymandering district map passed, election laws rewritten. Less than 24 hours after it was introduced, the bill creating new Illinois House and Senate districts was passed through both houses of the The map was drawn in a back room behind a locked door where a select group of politicians met to select which voters they would represent. Just like the final draft of the budget, there was no transparency in this process whatsoever. It was done solely for partisan gain.

Governor Pritzker repeatedly promised to veto an unfair, partisan district map. A few days after rushing the redistricting plan through, Democrats rammed through a re-write of Illinois election laws which included polling places in jails and a change to election law after a high-ranking state official was found to be in violation of the existing law. It was a good summary of so much that is wrong with how state government oper-

Most of trailer fee increase rolled back. It wasn't all bad news in the closing days of session. One piece of good news came when the House passed legislation to roll back most of the fee increase put in place in 2019 for registering a trailer in Illinois. I would have preferred to have seen the entire increase eliminated, but I was glad to see that most of it will be removed. Fees were raised to \$118 two years ago. Now they will drop back down to \$36.

Ethics bill passes. I reluctantly supported a watered down ethics bill which passed late on Monday night. The bill was much weaker than the many good ethics reform proposals which other members and I have made this year, but our proposals were ignored. We will continue to push for real ethics reform. As much as some people might want it to, this issue is NOT going away.

After last week's indictment of former Speaker Madigan's Chief of Staff I had expected a stronger ethics reform proposal. But this is all that was allowed to come up for a vote. Some reform is better than none, so I voted for the bill, but I continue to believe that we have to do much better.

Natural gas support for area community. House Bill 3404 was passed on Tuesday morning, a bill which helps to bring much-needed natural gas supplies to the village of Hopkins Park in Kankakee County. It creates a pilot program within the Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity to bring natural gas infrastructure to the village and help residents convert appliances to natural gas.

How much do we owe? As of the time of this writing, the State of Illinois owes \$3,053,824,228 in unpaid bills to state vendors. One year ago, the backlog stood at \$6.9 billion. This figure represents the amount of bills submitted to the office of the Comptroller and still awaiting payment. It does not include debts that can only be estimated such as our unfunded pension liability which is subject to a wide range of factors and has been estimated to be more than \$141

What Fully Vaccinated Seniors Should Know About Travel

The efforts of researchers and public health officials in developing safe and successful COVID-19 vaccines was nothing short of historic. Vaccines typically take years to develop, but a combination of factors enabled researchers to make COVID-19 vaccines available to vulnerable populations by December 2020, or roughly nine months after the World Health Organization declared a global pandemic.

Researchers had already conducted years' worth of vaccine research on human coronaviruses, which the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention notes were first identified in the mid-1960s. That research proved invaluable as pharmaceutical companies raced to produce COVID-19 vaccines. In addition, a less linear approach to testing and vetting vaccines than was traditionally applied in past outbreaks enabled the vaccine to be rolled out more quickly, potentially saving millions of lives.

Men and women over the age of 65 were among the first groups to be given the COVID-19 vaccine. Many people within that group are retired and had looked forward to traveling, only to have those plans interrupted by the pandemic. Now that they're fully vaccinated, seniors are setting their sights on travel once again. Though the COVID-19 vaccines have made vulnerable groups like seniors less likely to suffer severe illness from the virus, there's still a few things adults over 65 should know when making travel plans.

The virus

Data from the CDC indicated that more than 87 million people in the United States had been fully or partially vaccinated as of April 20, 2021. Among those, just 7,157 had become infected with COVID-19, and only 331 of those required hospitalization. That's an encouraging figure that illustrates just how effective the vaccines are at preventing infection and serious illness. Recognizing that efficacy may help calm any concerns fully vaccinated seniors have about traveling.

Restrictions Though a significant portion of the eligible populations in the United States and Canada had been fully or partially vaccinated by mid-spring, overseas travel restrictions may still be in place. Some countries, such as India, continued to confront devastating waves of the virus and may not be allowing overseas visitors anytime soon. In addition, in mid-spring the European Union was still devising a strategy to allow fully vaccinated foreign tourists to visit the continent. Proposals sug-

gested such travel could be allowed by late June, but it's important that seniors learn of any potential restrictions before booking trips.

Attractions

When planning a trip, seniors may want to look for areas with plenty of outdoor attractions. The CDC continues to recommend that people, even tions can be a great way to those who are fully vaccinated,

gather outdoors, where the virus is less likely to be transmitted. 



More Fruits and Veggies Available Through WIC

The American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 allows Women, Infants & Children (WIC) state agencies to temporarily increase the dollar amount of the Cash Value Benefits (CVB) for up to four consecutive months. Illinois has chosen to allow this temporary increase in WIC benefits.

From June 1 to September 30, the monthly CVB amount will increase to \$35.00 for all women and children participants. Under normal circumstances, monthly allotments are \$9 per child and \$11 for pregnant, postpartum and breastfeeding women. The short-term increase in CVB may be used to purchase additional fresh. frozen, or canned fruits and vegetables.

WIC is a grant-funded supplemental nutrition program for women, infants, and children and services to support our that is administered by the Illinois Department of Human Services (IDHS) and is funded by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA). While there have been lots of changes to the delivery of WIC services due to the pandemic, the Livingston County Health Department (LCHD) WIC program continued to effectively support many Livingston County families during the difficult time. Their successes were recently recognized by IDHS, increasing the funding and caseload, or the amount of clients expected to be served, for the LCHD program.

"Our staff has worked hard



(continued from page 1) they didn't tell the story in the way Drechsel wanted. There were display racks, but space was a premium. He wanted write-ups to be large, but not Wikipedia pages.

Needing an editor and some help arranging, Drechsel brought in his daughter Kelli Drechsel to help justify baseball in Dwight.

"She was really good with fixing my notes and putting them into real English," Kim Drechsel said. "Kelli made it sound good and then found things to help with the displays like gloves, bats, birth dates and death dates. She was my computer."

Kelli Drechsel, 38, had helped the society here and there with ice cream socials and behind the scenes, but hadn't been a major contributor to an exhibit.

Bringing baseball and history together, as well as working with her father, made it easy

for Kelli to dive in.

"Dad had found everybody. I took what he had written. I used Power Point to display it. I double checked everything and if I found another cool fact, I would ask if we could add it if there was room," Kelli Drechsel said. "I was the research assistant and the editor.

"We've been raised on baseball. My brothers and I all played as kids. We've gone to White Sox games since I can remember. I worked in baseball for a while. If there is a game on TV, it's on at the house. It's a passion of mine.'

This display like many others at the Dwight Historical Society, bring back memories, make you drop your jaw after finding out something happened in Dwight you didn't know about and help pass on the legacy, lineage, history of the community.

Kelli has found this out through her father

and working with the society.

"Dwight is lucky to have all the dedicated members of the Historical Society to tell the story of our town. Everybody does such a nice job," Kelli Drechsel said. "It's nice of them to put in the time and it's nice to be able to learn from everything that they do.

"There are so many things about Dwight that people don't know, don't realize and would be surprised by. Sure, this is a little town, but there is a deep and rich history. The fact that Ty Cobb played in Dwight in 1907, that's awesome. People may not realize that because it's not really a nugget you come across during your regular daily routine."
