Gardner Village Board Hears Concerns on Ordinance Enforcement

The Gardner Village Board met in regular session July 12.

Terry Jensen addressed the board during public comment asking about ordinance violations and enforcement. Jensen noted when he was on the board, then Village Attorney Scott Belt told the board the ordinances in place were solid and would be enforceable in court

court. Benny Grant addressed the board on the agenda. The board again heard comments from residents regarding property maintenance in the village. Grant repeated some of the prior comments regarding the condition of properties, particularly on Jackson Street. Grant echoed prior concerns and suggestions that the village needs to take enforcement action. Mayor Mike Serena commented that letters can be sent, which are followed by legal action, which costs money. Serena further commented that progress is being made, but probably not as quickly as

some would like. Serena repeated earlier comments that fees and fines collected as a result of legal action do not come back to the village, they are collected and kept by the county

The board discussed an ordinance to authorize, with limitations, the operation of golf carts on village streets. Mayor Mike Serena, following up on the draft discussed at the June 28 meeting, referenced the drafts of ordinances from several other villages with various rules and stipulations. Serena pointed out Main Street is owned by the county and the perimeter roads are stateowned and none of these would be covered by any ordinance approved by the village. The board discussed several options including safety, registration, types of vehicles, inspection, and fees. The matter was ultimately tabled for further discussion.

Village Engineer Casey Mc-Collom provided an update on the water tower. The progress (continued on page 6)

Once upon a time, a canine police dog was needed to smell marijuana and help apprehend the drug seller or user.

In 2021, marijuana is legal and the need to arrest anyone with a little bit of weed doesn't exist. Has the legalization of the substance outsourced the need for a K-9 on police forces?

Short-term answer: No. Long-term answer: No.

"Having a K-9 is a valuable resource to our community," Dwight Chief of Police Tim Henson said. "I know sometimes people want to measure things with statistics. I measure things by whether crime is down and whether the visibility of the drug problem in the community is down. I think when people know we have the resources and the ability to attack the problem, they decide to do things differently."

The Dwight Police Department enlisted Katscho, a German Shepherd, in 2010 and he served the department until a cancer diagnosis in 2018.

In April 2018, Spyke was added to the department's staff. Since his hire, the Belgian Malinois has been credited with multiple arrests.

"I've seen him in action first hand. He assisted the Bloomington Police Department in the tracking and apprehension of two males who made their way to the Dwight area after stealing a car and cell phones worth several thousand dollars from seven different stores," Henson said. "They abandoned their vehicle after a short chase. Spyke located them hiding about 10-12 blocks away from the scene hiding in an automobile.

"Another example is he helped apprehend a suspect who was wanted for felony domestic battery in Dwight. The suspect was somewhat barricaded and resisting officers. Spyke was called to help. The suspect was given several commands to stop resisting, but refused even though it was known Spyke was on the call. After three warnings, Spyke was given the command to bite and he performed flawlessly. Spyke held the suspect until the suspect stopped resisting and could be secured and cuffed. The suspect was convicted of domestic battery."

Back to the narcotics question and how does a canine help a police force in 2021.

After Spyke flew from the Netherlands to O'Hare Airport

in Chicago in 2018 at the age of 15 months, he engaged in a 12-week police canine training program to learn tracking skills, conduct area and article searches, building searches, engage and apprehension of violent offenders and how to detect the odor of narcotics.

Officer Watson McKee handled Katscho for eight years and was the man for the job when Spyke came aboard.

"There is still a list of narcotics. He detects methamphetamine, cocaine, MDMA (ecstasy, molly) and heroin. There are still other narcotics he can detect besides marijuana," Officer McKee said. "If we need to use him for somebody who is resisting, it's just another tool so we don't have to use officers. The longer a resisting suspect is dealt with, the more chance of things escalating and officers, people, arrestees, suspects getting hurt.

"Usually with the dog, it stops everything pretty quick."

When Officer McKee became a cop he did not think being a K-9 Officer was going to be on his resume for the next 11 years.



Legislative Inspector General Steps Down

Two years ago the General Assembly hired former Appellate Court Judge Carol Pope to be the new Legislative Inspector General, our top ethics watchdog.

This week she resigned after expressing frustration at having her suggestions for reform ignored by the General Assem-

"The public has had it up to their eyebrows with public corruption," Judge Pope said on Wednesday. "This last legislative session demonstrated true ethics reform is not a priority."

Judge Pope is 100% right. This spring I had a strong ethics bill which would have prohibited legislators from becoming lobbyists until they have been out of office for two years. The House Republican caucus put together a whole package of ethics reform bills, but they were ignored. We ended up passing a very weak ethics bill which many of us supported just because some reform is better than none, but it left much to be desired.

It feels like every few months we have some new scandal, indictment or conviction that makes us hope that it will be the event which finally leads to real ethics reform. We

are usually disappointed. But maybe Judge Pope's eye-opening comments will be the straw that breaks the camel's back and gets the legislature to act on cleaning up state government. Time will tell.

Illinois finishes unusual fiscal year on the upswing. June marked the final month of the state's fiscal year, as FY22 began on July 1. The just-completed fiscal year began in the depths of the coronavirus shutdown, saw a large rebound as businesses began to re-open, and included a big infusion of one-time federal assistance.

In Illinois, personal income tax receipts went up by \$4.7 billion for the fiscal year, corporate income tax receipts increased by \$1.8 billion and sales taxes were up by \$1.1 billion. These figures are compared to the 2020 fiscal year which included more than three months of pandemic shutdowns. A few days ago the state's

Commission on Government Forecasting and Accountability released its June revenue report. It showed that overall the state's tax revenues stayed strong, but as the one-time assistance from Washington began to run out, state revenue fell by \$70 million in the month of June.

Illinois continues to have the lowest credit rating of any state in the nation, but thanks to the vast amount of federal relief money which has come into the state in the past year, our credit situation actually stabilized somewhat and one ratings agency, Standard & Poor's, actually gave Illinois an upgrade. The move to the BBB rating level, which is two steps above junk bond status, is the first time Illinois' credit has been upgraded since 1997.

Another ratings agency followed suit a few days later. Since these upgrades are due to a one-time infusion of cash from Washington, we should not let them divert our attention from the need to greatly improve our fiscal management of state government.

Gas Prices For This Week

Since July 12, the national average for a gallon of reg-

ular gasoline increased by two cents to \$3.17. In its latest weekly report, the EIA reported that gas demand decreased from an all-time high of 10.04 million b/d to 9.28 million b/d. The decrease, alongside a 1 million bbl increase in total domestic gasoline stocks to 236.5 million, has helped to slow pump price increases. However, with oil prices above \$70 per barrel, pump prices will likely remain high (above \$3 per gallon) throughout the busy summer driving season.

Democratic mapmakers in Springfield have crafted new legislative districts that are so laughably offensive to the Illinois Constitution that the state Supreme Court would either have to reject them outright, or confirm the court's unsavory reputation for partisan political corruptness.

Illinois GOP leaders have challenged the remap in federal court, on grounds that Dems used loosey-goosey population survey figures, rather than the actual U.S. Census headcount. I think Republicans have even stronger grounds in state court, but GOP leaders probably fear the four Dems on the seven-member court will, per usual, find a way to protect their party.

The state charter is crystal clear: "Legislative (state Senate) Districts shall be compact, contiguous and substantially equal in population. Representative Districts shall be compact, contiguous, and substantially equal in population."



"When I got hired there was that was to go ahead and get the dog. Chief Henson had asked me to do it multiple times. I turned it down multiple times. Once I saw the necessity of it, I volunteered to handle the dog. "It was a way to actually make a difference instead of just being here collecting a paycheck. I wanted to impact the community, specifically the drug problem.'

Canines are like people where there are different personalities and react to certain situations differently.

Upon meeting and training with Spyke, Officer McKee noticed the difference between Katscho and Spyke.

"The first dog was a German Shepherd so he wasn't as high pace as Spyke. The Belgian Malinois' drive is a little higher," Officer McKee said. "For the most part during the initial training, getting used to each other was alright.

"I handled Katscho for eight years, so transitioning to a second dog wasn't difficult. If I would have gotten Spyke as the first dog, it would have been a little more difficult because he wasn't trained. He was completely green when I got him. With the higher drive, he's a little more difficult to handle."

Chief Henson can also see the behavioral and work difference between the two K-9 Officers.

"Our first K9, Katscho, we built the program and got people to understand the importance of it. Although he did a fantastic job when he was working, he was also the community's dog," Henson said. "He had the temperament where kids could go up to him and hug him. They might get a little slobber, but that was it.

"Once the program was well established and the community understood what the need was, we wanted to make sure our second dog was going to be highly driven and motivated to get out here and really hit the ground running. Belgian Malinois are known to be more of a high strung, aggressive type of dog. That was one of the main reasons we decided to go with a Belgian Malinois instead of another German Shepherd."

Spyke and Katscho would not have been on the force without the help of the commu-

The Dwight Police Department thanks the Dwight community every day for allowing the resource to help them detect narcotics, track suspects and apprehend for arrests.

'We thank the community for allowing us to have this valuable resource," Henson said. "I call Spyke a community K-9 because this is the second time the community rallied and paid for the resource that we have."




