Dwight Resident Arrested for Possession, **Dissemination of** Child Pornography

The Illinois State Police (ISP) Division of Criminal Investigation (DCI) Zone 5 officials have announced the arrest of David A. Fromherz, a 51year old male from Dwight, for seven counts of Possession and Dissemination of Child Pornography.

Beginning in early January 2021, ISP DCI Zone 3 and Zone 5 Investigators continued an ongoing proactive investigation with the Illinois Attorney General's Office Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) Task Force. Through the course of the investigation, Zone agents were able to locate evidence that supported the possession of and internet activity related to the dissemination of child pornography.

The Livingston County State's Attorney filed a sevencount information charging Fromherz with three counts of Possession and Dissemination of Child Pornography (Class X Felony), one count of Possession and Dissemination of Child Pornography (Class 1 Felony), and three counts of Possession and Dissemination of Child Pornography (Class 2 Felony) after a search warrant was executed at Fromherz's residence in Dwight on September 29. Fromherz was taken into custody and transported to the Livingston County Jail where his bond was set at \$1,000,000, 10% to apply.

ISP DCI Zone 3 and 5 Agents conducted the investigation with the assistance of the Dwight Police Department and the Illinois Attorney General's Office Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) Task



'A Walk Through Dwight History' **Cemetery Walk October 17**

When David McWilliams arrived in Dwight and opened his first business in 1854, little did he know what an impact his family would have on the growth of Dwight. Over the years, they were successful store owners and landowners, as well as owners and operators of the Bank of Dwight.

Samuel T. K. Prime and his wife, Mary, arrived in Dwight in 1858 and purchased 320 acres in Dwight Township. Samuel knew very little about farming, but he didn't let that stop him. During his leisure time he wrote for the press, which was something he always wanted to do. In 1880, he established a Crop Bureau, the beginning of crop reporting as

you know it today. He lived a full and interesting life in Dwight and was a part of many big events that took place.

Ernest Kelch started a milk business in 1912, delivering milk to many customers with a team-drawn wagon. In 1918, his son Clifford joined the business delivering milk before school. In 1921, they were the first in the area to pasteurize their milk. They expanded their dairy in 1943 when they bought the Henry Burgwald Dairy. In 1932, Clifford built a lighted athletic field on the family farm. The Grand Opening was May 30, 1933, with four teams of the Dwight Softball League taking the field.

Unemployment declines to 6.8% in Illinois. The state's unemployment rate continued its recovery from the worst of the pandemic, falling in August to its current level of 6.8%. One year ago unemployment in Illinois was 11%. This was the fifth consecutive month that unemployment declined in all 102 counties of the state.

In the Chicago area unemployment was higher than the statewide average, coming in at 7.5%. Some of the lowest unemployment rates in Illinois were along I-74: Champaign-Urbana at 5.6% and Bloomington-Normal at 5.2%

How much do we owe? As of the time of this writing, the State of Illinois owes \$3,781,978,519 in unpaid bills to state vendors. One year ago, the backlog stood at \$7.2 billion. This figure represents the amount of bills submitted to the office of the Comptroller and still awaiting payment. It does not include debts that can only be estimated, such as our unfunded pension liability which is subject to a wide range of factors and has been estimated to be more than \$141 bil-







Fall Is For Feathered Friends, Fireplaces

Birdseed and firewood are two common topics that show up every fall. Both take some planning to be success-

"Feeding the birds means starting earlier than later," says Richard Hentschel, University of Illinois Extension horticulture educator serving DuPage, Kane, and Kendall Counties. "Birds need to know early on that there will be something to eat on a regular basis if you want them to hang around in your yard."

With the recent outbreak of songbird deaths, Illinois officials are not currently recommending removing feeders, but they stress cleaning and sanitizing feeders every two weeks and hummingbird feeders weekly.

Buying birdseed that has a little bit of everything for every bird can add up to a lot of wasted seed on the ground. Consider putting out seed that will attract only your favorite birds. This can be more cost-effective as the unwanted seed will feed four-legged critters, not to mention make a mess on the patio or in the lawn.

The type of birdseed chosen will also help determine the kind of feeder needed. Typically, feeders are designed for the size of seed being distributed – thistle

> Seasoned firewood means the wood, for logs more than six inches, has been cut, split, and dried for a long time. Clues that the wood is seasoned are a gray color on the ends of a log and checkmarks showing moisture loss.

should Firewood be around 20% to 25% moisture to burn well and limit smoke. Those who purchase wellseasoned wood need to keep it dry before burning it.

"Make the woodpile easy

Hentschel says. "Or you will find yourself leaving the cover off and allowing the firewood to reabsorb the water you paid to remove."

As a rule, the heavier the firewood, given the same moisture content, the more heat it will give off. This is something to consider if there are different tree species available to pur-

Once the home fireplace is being regularly used, only take in the amount of firewood expected to be used in a week. It takes more than a week to "thaw out" any outdoor insects that have hidden in cracks and crevices on the bark.

"This practice will keep the insects from wandering around your home and, while not likely to do any damage indoors, will keep the family peace," Hentschel says.

As an additional precaution, when stacking firewood next to the outside wall of a home, leave a few inches between for good air movement and an extra barrier for insects.


