Sweat Factory is open

In November, a sign on the door of the gym in Dwight read temporarily closed.

Members were shocked and wondered what was next for their fitness journey without a center in town to cut some calories and work up a sweat.

Stephan and Rodney Connor and Shayla and Harold Smith, all gym members who participated in Crossfit classes, immediately put their brains to work to figure out a way to help reopen the gym.

"This gym has changed my life for sure and I believe the same could be said for all four of us through the Crossfit programs that have been here," Rodney Connor said. "It's been really important to all of us. One day a lot of people came to

the gym and the doors were locked.

"That scared us because we need a place to work out at in town. We immediately called the landlord of the building (Jeff Schade) and asked, 'What do we need to do to get this place opened?' We all have our own jobs, so this is a part-time job for all of us. I don't think any of us would have been willing to take on the gym by ourselves. We split it and decided to share the work, the risk, and the income of owning a gym in a small town."

The ownership group renamed the gym located at 108 Watters Dr. to the Sweat Factory.

The Sweat Factory opened membership signup on Dec. 8 and opened the doors Dec. 10. Jan. 15 will be the grand opening as a ribbon cutting will be

held at 8:45 a.m. and an open house will be 9 a.m.-1 p.m.

"I'm pretty excited. It's kind of surreal, but we're getting a lot of great feedback," said Stephan Connor, who is a painter who applies his craft to signs, murals, and basically any canvas looking for a splash of color.

"I never thought I'd be involved in something like this until a month and two weeks ago. I was taking classes at the gym and Shayla was the instructor. We watched the gym deteriorate week after week. We kind of talked after class a few days. Then we talked to Rodney and then we met with the old gym owner (Jennifer Woodburn) to see if it was something we would even be interested in and then it went from there.

"We feel pretty strong with the support we have had with the village. When they found out we were taking the gym over, lots of people reached out. Everybody in town knows all of us. They've known us for a long, long time.

"I didn't expect anything like that. I went to the grocery store and people told me thank you for opening the gym. A lot of people are excited that it's

Timestamping Leone's Rose Bowl Adventure

In 2020, Gardner-South Wilmington band director Michael Leone was chosen as one of 250 band directors by the Michael D. Sewell Memorial Foundation to take part in a float in the Rose Parade.

After Covid-19 hit, the 2021 parade was canceled. Leone wasn't able to receive the full benefits of being one of the great band directors spread across the country.

This New Year's weekend was a different story as Leone was able to play his trumpet down Colorado Boulevard in Pasadena, Calif. to help honor music education and usher in the Rose Bowl Game between the Ohio State University and the University of Utah played on Jan. 1.

"We were supposed to be walking behind the float as they were saluting all the band directors. Then a note was sent out asking about instruments. I said I was a trumpet player. They sent, 'We talked to the Rose Parade and we're going to play.' Then they formed us into a group."

Although the parade and the Rose Bowl, which is a College Football Playoff Semifinal, were on Saturday, Leone's excursion was Wednesday-Sunday.

Here is a timestamp (in Central Time Zone) of the GSW band director's Rose Parade journey.

6 p.m. Wednesday, Dec. 29

"I arrived at LAX (Los Angeles International Airport) and by the time I got to my hotel, it was 4 p.m. on the west coast. I met up with all of the band directors and we played until 10 p.m."

"Obviously, I'm not a rock star, but it was the rock star experience. Even when we were at rehearsals, they were being filmed. It was raining on Wednesday when I got there. We rehearsed for about four hours inside. That's when I knew this was real."

6 a.m. Thursday, Dec. 30

"We had a rehearsal and a performance at Band Fest, in which all the Rose Parade bands get an opportunity to

perform beforehand. We practiced how we were getting on the field, running through the song. When we went outside, the stands were full of people that were there just to watch us rehearse.

"Everywhere we went it was police escort. There was a turn the same as there is for one of the Rose Parade TV zones, we were practicing, and there were people just cheering us on. It was insane. I'd never seen so many people go just to watch you practice. It was unbelievable."

Thursday Afternoon

"When we played at Band Fest, they started listing off names and all of the awards and accomplishments of the band directors. They would say a different award and people would raise their hands. They asked, 'How many people were

Teachers of the Year in their state?' People raised their hands.

"Then they said, 'We have eight semifinalists for a Grammy Award for Music Educator of the Year.' I was one of them. I didn't make the finals, but I was a semifinalist."

"After we did Band Fest, we got back on the bus and went to the Rose Bowl. They were showing us how we were going to get introduced during half-time of the game.

Last Event of the Day

"After a long day, Thursday night we also had a banquet and they started handing out awards. Through the Fogelberg Foundation (Dan Fogelberg, from Pekin), I got an award for being a leader of the band. I also got a baton with a red han-

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Don't Fall Victim to Tax Scams

It's that time of year, when we gather our W-2s, 1099s and all the other forms and documents we need to file our taxes. However, it's also busy season for tax scammers. How can you avoid being scammed?

Your chief defense, of course, is to recognize a scam. Here are some of the most common ones:

- **Tax-related identity theft** – Some thieves might try to steal your personal information and file a tax return in your name, hoping to claim your refund. Always guard your personal data, especially your Social Security number (SSN). You can also apply to the IRS for an Identity Protection Personal Identification Number (IP PIN). To succeed in their efforts, identity thieves would have to know your unique IP PIN in addition to your SSN and other information. And watch for signs that your identity has been compromised, such as the IRS rejecting your online return, saying that a tax return associated with your SSN has already been filed. If this happens, you can file IRS Form 14039 – Identity Theft Affidavit.
- **"Ghost" tax preparers** – These individuals aren't supernatural, but their actions can be pretty scary. A ghost preparer may finish your tax return but won't sign it or provide a Preparer Tax Identification Number (PTIN). This is a huge red flag, possibly indicating any number of bad actions, such as using fake information to generate a larger refund, and then charging you a fee based on that refund, or even worse, outright stealing the fee you've paid and then disappearing. Don't sign your return until your preparer has also signed it and included their PTIN. And check your own return to make sure everything seems correct. To find a reputable tax preparer, ask your friends and relatives for referrals.
- **"Phishing" emails claiming to be from IRS** – You might receive emails that claim to be from the IRS but that come from scammers. These "phishing" emails might contain messages saying, "Your account or tax return is locked or restricted," or, "You're eligible to receive a tax refund." Or the subject line of the email might contain a phrase such as "Automatic Income Tax Reminder" or "Electronic Tax Return Reminder." These emails may contain links to a website that appears to be that of the IRS, but if you follow these links, you will be asked to open files that contain malware, which could give the scammer remote access to your computer and your personal information. But the IRS does not send unsolicited emails to taxpayers, it won't discuss tax account information with you via email, and it won't use emails to solicit sensitive financial and personal information.
- **Threatening phone calls** – Tax scammers may call you, posing as IRS employees and demanding payment for back taxes, penalties or fees that you don't owe. In reality, the IRS won't call you if you owe taxes without first sending you a bill in the mail. Furthermore, the IRS will neither require that you pay your taxes a certain way, such as with a prepaid debit card, nor ask for your credit or debit card numbers over the phone.

It's unfortunate that tax scammers are hard at work, but by staying vigilant and getting professional help if you need it, you can help protect yourself from being scammed – this year and every year.

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Railroads - Gardner IL History

The Chicago & Alton Railroad, which passes through Gardner, was built in 1853-4, the people of Gardner and the vicinity contributing \$3,000 for right of way. The first ticket agent at Gardner was C.K. Snyder, and it is interesting to know that as he had no station house at the time, he carried all his papers in a tin trunk. The "Big Four" railroad trains also stop at Gardner, although its station is not in the center of the village as is that of the Chicago & Alton. Gardner's business houses are centered in a compact area so that it is not difficult to attend to very important affairs, for a few blocks hold the concerns mentioned above. There are some very comfortable homes at Gardner, and the people themselves are alive, wide awake and progressive, eager to take advantage of improvements, and utilize advantages offered.

Premise Alert Program Aims to Assist Those with Special Needs and First Responders

Do you have someone in your home who would be physically unable to get out of the house in case of a fire? Do you have an adult child with Autism or a developmental disability who has limited language skills or may be a runner if frightened? Do you know someone that demonstrates paranoia or depression and may get defensive or combative if approached by a policeman or sheriff's deputy?

Over a year ago, Livingston County implemented a notification system that passes pertinent information on to the responding law enforcement officer, firefighter, and ambulance personnel to make them aware and better-equipped to understand and appropriately respond to a call involving a citizen with a special need.

This voluntary and free program was implemented by the Livingston County Law Enforcement community and VCOM 911 and is named the Premise Alert Program. The program allows individuals,

legal guardians, or family members to register someone with special needs, such as Alzheimer's, Autism, hearing impairment, mental illness, etc., to be entered into the county-wide database system.

Brochures and registration forms are available on livingstoncounty-il.org, Pontiac.org, at the Chatsworth, Dwight, Fairbury, Streator, and Pontiac Police Departments, as well as the Livingston County Sheriff's Department.

Again, this is a voluntary program and all information is solely for the purpose of assisting police, fire, and emergency response agencies to more effectively respond to an emergency situation. By providing this information for the purpose stated above, it does not entitle the individual to any preferential treatment nor a timelier response to any emergency or potential emergency situation.

Applications for Marjorie J. Martin Scholarships Now Being Accepted

The Marjorie J. Martin Scholarship trustees announced January 7 that applications for the 17th annual Marjorie J. Martin Scholarships are now being accepted.

Applications are available at Odell Public Library, Odell Bank, Dwight Township High School, and Pontiac Township High School. To be eligible for the scholarships, students must live in the area currently served

by the Odell Fire Protection District, Odell Public Library District, or the Odell Grade School District.

Completed applications are due March 1, 2022.

The scholarship was established by Marjorie J. Martin, a lifelong resident of Odell and a teacher in the Odell public schools for 32 years who died March 31, 2004. She stipulated that scholarships be granted to

high school graduates seeking continued education at an accredited college or university in the fields of liberal arts, music, science, nursing, business or engineering.

In 2021, the trustees awarded \$72,000 to 15 students from Odell. Scholarships were awarded in recognition of academic and extracurricular excellence.

Sec. of State Jesse White’s Message

This January 17th, please join me in celebrating the life, influence and contributions of civil rights leader Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. This will mark the 37th year our country has honored Dr. King’s birthday as a federal holiday and I encourage everyone to take a moment to reflect upon how he impacted our society with his philosophy of embracing equality and rejecting bigotry and segregation.

Dr. King served as one of my earliest mentors while I was a student at Alabama State College in Montgomery, Alabama in the early 1950s. I attended church in northern Montgomery where Dr. King served as the pastor. I had the privilege of listening and observing him firsthand.

In Alabama, I experienced many challenges and frustrations due to segregation. African Americans were not allowed to drink at certain water fountains. We were prohibited

from sitting in certain seats on buses and banned from eating at many restaurants.

Following the lead of Dr. King, Rosa Parks and other civil rights leaders, I participated in the Montgomery Bus Boycott that ultimately led to the desegregation of the public transit system. This peaceful protest taught me the importance of perseverance and working together toward a common goal.

To this day, I remain impacted by Dr. King’s teachings. His values and dignified behavior continue to inspire and resonate with me. I fondly remember Dr. King attending my college basketball games and staying afterward to offer me words of encouragement and support. He made a difference in my life.

As I consider the legacy of Dr. King in my life, I also find myself reflecting on my tenure as your Secretary of State. This year will be my 24th and final

year as Illinois Secretary of State. I am filled with gratitude and appreciation for the opportunity to serve the people of Illinois for six terms in this capacity.

Sixty-three years ago, I established the Jesse White Tumbling Team as a way to give back to the community and to help young people in need of support and guidance. Because of my desire to help others, I became a teacher and a public servant. I cannot imagine that I would have become the first African American elected as Illinois Secretary of State in 1998 without Dr. King’s influence on my life and on society as a whole.

On this holiday, let us work to emulate Dr. King’s philosophy through our own lives. Let us commit ourselves to the following: never discriminate or dislike someone because of race, creed or color; learn to love your fellow man and woman; do something good for someone every day; and give back to those less fortunate when you become successful. If we do these things, we honor Dr. King through our actions.

Gas Prices For This Week

Gasoline prices edged upward last week, driven primarily by the price surge in crude oil, which is closing in on \$80 a barrel. Events on the far side of the globe are fueling the recent rise. Social unrest and violence in Kazakhstan, a member of the OPEC+ alliance, have forced that nation to cut production. Before the recent flare-up of violence, Kazakhstan pumped nearly 2 million barrels of crude a day. In contrast, the United States, as the top oil-producing country in the world, pumped an average of 18.6 million barrels a day. Since the global price for oil accounts for nearly half of what consumers pay at the pump, higher oil costs will usually result in higher gasoline costs. The national average for a gallon of gas rose one cent to \$3.30.

Dan Hendrickson, Kankakee County Clerk, released vital statistics for Kankakee County for 2021.

As of January 5, 2022, there were 1,268 births registered in the county for 2021. This is 36 more than were registered in 2020.

The most popular names for boys were Levi, Liam, Oliver and Benjamin. The most popular names for girls were Evelyn, Layla, Nevaeh and Olivia.

More children were born in the month of October (120) in Kankakee County than in any other month in 2021.

The County Clerk's Office issued 531 marriage licenses in Kankakee County in 2021, the same amount as in 2020.

Morris Hospital Issues Alert Regarding Potential Phone Scam

Morris Hospital & Healthcare Center is alerting the public of a potential phone scam that may appear as though the call is coming from the hospital or one of Morris Hospital's Healthcare Centers.

Based on reports received from patients, the caller claims to be from Morris Hospital or a specific provider's office associated with Morris Hospital and states that they are working with the patient's provider, often correctly stating the provider's name.

Most commonly, the caller states that the patient's provider has asked the caller to make arrangements to send medications or medical supplies directly to the patient's home. The caller may also state that they have been asked to order genetic testing for the patient.

According to Morris Hospital, these calls are not legitimate but instead are likely scams intended to obtain additional personal information from the patient, including home address and the patient's Medicare number. Anyone who receives a suspicious call should not provide any information and hang up.

Patients who are concerned that their provider might have been trying to reach them can call their provider's office using the phone number they normally call to set up appointments.

Morris Hospital Reports Short Supply of Monoclonal Antibody Therapy

Individuals hoping to receive outpatient monoclonal antibody infusion therapy to treat COVID-19 may be in for a disappointment.

The Illinois Department of Public Health has announced a pause in the distribution of the two popular therapeutics that were being used at Morris Hospital to prevent hospitalization in high risk individuals due to data showing they are not effective against the now-dominant Omicron variant. Another monoclonal antibody therapeutic, sotrovimab, has remained effective against the Omicron variant, but it is now both in high demand and in low supply.

While Morris Hospital has received a very limited supply of sotrovimab, future allotments still remain uncertain. Prior to the Omicron variant, Morris Hospital was administering as many as four to six monoclonal antibody infusions per day when supply was at its peak.

"It's disheartening considering the high rate of infection and hospitalizations," says Alyssa Knoderer, pharmacy director at Morris Hospital & Healthcare Centers. "The reality right now is that we have very, very few doses available due to the significant demand because there are so many people who are COVID-positive. There's just less overall to go around."

The monoclonal antibody infusion delivers a neutralizing antibody medicine containing man-made antibodies that are similar to the antibodies of patients who recovered from COVID-19. Since December 2020, it has been given to high risk patients at Morris Hospital in an effort to minimize hospitalizations. Patients eligible for treatment have mild-to-moderate COVID-19 infection and meet specific criteria that makes them at higher risk for severe illness.

In addition, those being considered for monoclonal antibody infusion must be able to be scheduled for infusion as soon as possible after testing positive for COVID-19 and within 10 days of symptom onset. Hospitalized patients and those requiring oxygen therapy are unable to receive the treatment.

While monoclonal antibody infusion has been an important tool to help prevent hospitalization in high risk individuals, Knoderer emphasizes that it is not an alternative to getting vaccinated. She believes this point is of even greater importance considering the infusion is in such short supply.

"Vaccination is always the best option in the fight against COVID-19," Knoderer says. "It's the safest and most effective method against severe illness and hospitalization."

Among other approved treatments, one encouraging development came in December when the FDA gave emergency-use authorization of two oral antiviral medications that aim to reduce hospitalizations. But Knoderer says many unknowns are still left to be answered about these medications both with regards to distribution and eligibility due to potential drug interactions and other risk factors.

Morris Hospital's COVID hospitalizations have been above 30 patients each day since December 3. The only other time COVID hospitalizations have been above 30 patients since the start of the pandemic was over a six-day period in November 2020. January 7 marked the 35th consecutive day that Morris Hospital had more than 30 hospitalized COVID patients.

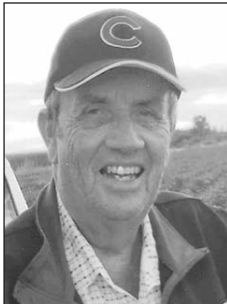

dle and a medallion for dedication to music education.”

6 a.m., Friday, Dec. 31
“We were rehearsing trying to get ready for the parade because we hadn't done a whole lot of street marching. We were trying to figure out where we were positioned in the parade and how we were going to make it around the curve. There are 12 people across, so it wasn't easy.
“Then we practiced how we were going to split during the parade because we were in front of the float, but when we got into the ABC TV zone, we opened up. We split the band literally in half as one half went to one side of the street and the other half went to the other side of the street. Then we practiced the float going through the middle. They had it down. They knew how fast the float could drive. They knew what part of the song all of this was happening. It was timed out perfectly.”

5:45 a.m., Saturday, Jan. 1
“When I woke up, I had an email from Southwest Airlines saying my flight had been canceled. I didn't have plans to stay another night and I couldn't find another flight out on Saturday. There was a snowstorm in Illinois and it delayed air travel.

“Then we went into the CBS' TV zone. They brought the trumpet players together and told us to pace ourselves out and that we weren't going to be able to play for 5 ½ miles. They told us to take a song off here or there.
“We went into Superman mode. I didn't take any song off, nor did the other guys. We may have taken a little section off here or there because it was 60-degree weather and the sun was beating on us. We all took the mentality, there are people here who this is the first time they've been to this parade. We wanted to make sure it was a good experience. We went superhuman mode, beast mode, and blew for almost six miles.
“I had my phone on me in my jacket pocket. I had it set to vibrate. All I kept feeling was the zzzz. The buzzing in my jacket was non-stop. In my mind, I was thinking, 'I'm either on TV or they can see us.’”

2 p.m., Saturday
“We took off our suit coats and ties and we went to the game. It was an unbelievable experience. You were just non-stop on the go. I didn't care who won the game. I watch college football, but I'm a University of Illinois guy.
“We were sitting behind the Ohio State band. I was giving the I-L-L-I-N-I type thing to them. They were razzing me back. The game was awesome. It was a complete shootout. You don't realize how big and fast those guys are until you really see them.”

Halftime of the Game
“I was texting somebody before we were about to be introduced, 'Hey I'm about to be on the field.' They said, 'Yeah, but it went to commercial.' I responded, 'Oh man.' We walked out and there were 100,000 people in the stadium. They said, 'This is a salute to American band directors.' They

went through all of the different awards that had been won by the people in the band. The crowd just went crazy.”

2:30 a.m., Sunday, Jan. 2
“Since the plane was leaving at 6 a.m. and the airport is probably an hour away, I decided to wake up at 2:30 a.m. to get ready before the Uber was going to arrive at 3 a.m. I got another email stating my plane was canceled. I started laughing and just couldn't believe it was canceled again.

"Our ownership and the age are what put it in motion. The Lannon family founded the institution in 1911 and now they're not really active in the bank management anymore. They started talking about it a couple of years ago.

"Graymont has always been on our radar as a bank to merge with. In our mind, they're still small enough but big enough to have more products. It's community oriented and a bank that would be a good fit for us. I called Ron (Minnaert) about a year ago and we started discussing the possibilities."

On January 4, the buyout was official as the State Bank of Graymont now owns the State Bank of Saunemin.

The Saunemin location will remain open indefinitely, while the Pontiac branch is up for debate as Graymont has a Pontiac branch as well and is debating

whether it's feasible for both banks in one location.

The State Bank of Graymont has been in operation for 108 years.

"We've always had it in the back of our mind. We may have had loose discussions about a buyout 15 years ago," said State Bank of Graymont President Ron Minnaert. "We just wanted a chance. When they were ready, we were going to be ready. Denny gave me the call and we started working together to reach the goal of us purchasing the State Bank of Saunemin.

"For Graymont, we've been looking for opportunities of acquisition for multiple years. We've done some small things. We bought a branch in Chenoa and we added a branch in Pontiac. Saunemin also added a branch in Pontiac.

"We looked at ways to expand and other opportunities. We never got anything to work for us until this. Saunemin is a good fit for us. We are looking forward to offering some of the services that Denny mentioned that they can't offer as a smaller institution. We're going to offer mobile deposits and mobile capture, so you can deposit a check by taking a photo of it on your phone."

Residential home loans are a product Graymont will bring back to Saunemin.

As regulations became stricter and more of a financial burden, Saunemin had to cut the product and was sending customers looking for home loans to Graymont.

"We had to stop making residential home loans back in 2015," Stephens said. "The regulations just got over-

whelming for a bank of our size. If you only had one or two applications a month, you just couldn't keep up with it. A lot of banks our size did drop residential home loans, it wasn't just us.

"Over the last years, I've been sending them directly to Ron. We have a lot of mutual customers."

The State Bank of Saunemin has been on North St. since 1911, but was two doors down of its current location of 59 North St. until the Great Depression.

There was a second bank in Saunemin until the FDIC closed its doors in the 1920s. Since then, the state bank has handled all of the town's banking needs.

"It hasn't sunk in yet. I've been in tears a couple of times because this bank has been my life," said Stephens, who has had a savings account at the institution since 1965 and began his banking career as a cashier and wrote loans as soon as he started. "I am excited with what is going to happen next. We haven't been able to offer some things to our customers because of the size of our bank. I think this move here, for the next generation of customers, will offer more tech-

nology and more products.

"The customers have of course asked us the big questions like, 'Are you guys staying open? Are you leaving us?' We have all been offered jobs. We are all staying here at the bank."

In a letter sent by Graymont to all Saunemin customers, Saunemin branch hours will remain the same, daily transaction cut-off time is 4 p.m., operating systems will change to Graymont's software in June, 2022, and all existing checks, direct deposits, and automatic payments will continue as scheduled.
