Tri-Point Schools 2023 Budget Hearing Set for August 24, 2022

Tri-Point Schools Board established Wednesday, August 24, at 6:45 p.m. for the FY 2023 Budget Hearing to be held in the Tri-Point Board Room. The 2022-23 tentative budget will be on public display in the district office.

Approved at the July 20 Board meeting were: the consent agenda as presented; the dual-credit courses for the 2022-23 school year; and the Early College Program at the HS for the next school year.

It was approved to not release the closed session minutes dated January 2022 through June 2022; as well as the destruction of audio recording of closed sessions more than 18 months old.

The Superintendent was approved to represent Tri-Point at any upcoming windfarm meetings and named Mr. Jeff Bryan

The purchase of i-Ready JH math curriculum at a cost of \$45/student was approved.

Kaylee Shouse was approved as HS Ag teacher, following the acceptance of Kylie Miller's resignation from that

Cory Cooper will be employed as HS Spanish/ Science teacher pending official ISBE licensure.

Three coaching positions were filled: Crystal Hummel as HS assistant volleyball coach; and Michael Kelly as head golf coach and assistant boys basketball coach.

Angela Winger-Bryan was reassigned to a half time (90 days) Title teacher for the 2022-23 school year.

Since then a few more were added.

Wanted: Firefighters and EMTs; **Nationwide Epidemic Being Felt Locally**

In recent years the love of volunteering for positions such as firefighters and emergency medical technicians (EMT) has

There isn't as much community involvement as life is busy for everyone since our society is full throttle with career, family, and entertainment plans and schedules every minute of every day.

However, the need for firefighters and EMTs is still there.

Fires haven't stopped scorching everything they touch and the need for ambulances and paramedics will always be needed as long as human beings are walking the planet.

The Paper spoke to a representative of three different departments – Dwight Fire Department, Gardner Fire Protection District, and Essex Fire Protection District to see how the nationwide epidemic of lack of volunteer numbers is affecting each community.

Dwight Fire Protection

Paul Johnson, the mayor and fire chief of Dwight, is not facing the epidemic the same as other departments.

Dwight has a staff of 48 firefighters and the emergency medical staff is well rounded although it's not seeing a lot of new applications.

"We're not doing too bad with the fire end of things. From the fire protection standpoint, we have 48 firefighters," Johnson said. "Only a quarter of our department is actually from Dwight. They volunteer from home. The rest of the guys are paid to be in the fire house.

"Our recruitment has been pretty good. We're very fortunate and almost an outlier of other departments across the nation. When I tested for the fire department in Downers Grove (where he still works) there was 1,000 people tested for two jobs in 1997. We just did a test recently and 18 people applied. It's unbelievable the way it has changed."

However, Johnson sees where the prob-

Even before Covid-19, Johnson knew the to-do list to become a firefighter or EMT could be too much for someone to



handle or add to their plate.

"I think it started prior to the pandemic. There are so many requirements to hold a firefighter certificate. There is a ton of requirements to get your EMT and paramedic licenses," Johnson said. "Then you have to do continuing education to keep those certificates and licenses.

"The economy is crap. People are trying to make a living. They have kids and a ton of responsibilities. How do you manage all of that, try to be a volunteer firefighter or paramedic, keep up with all of those hours? Where do you find the time to do it?"

This is also why Johnson feels Dwight is in a good spot.

The list of mandatory requirements doesn't extend the federal and state list.

Also, Dwight is a perfect training ground for career firefighters and EMTs as they'll get the proper training and experience that other departments are looking for but can't offer.

"When we bring people on, they don't have to have any requirements. Years ago when I became the fire chief, it used to be where you had to live in Dwight. Our place is kind of like a stepping stone," Johnson said. "They come to Dwight because they get a decent amount of calls. They get a lot of experience and we put a lot of money

'They have access to a pretty cool training facility, which is the old women's prison. That's something that not a lot of places have. We have guys from as far away as Naperville and Plainfield, who are part of our fire department and work shifts. It's because there are no volunteer or parttime opportunities in those suburban areas. They have full-time departments and unless you're already certified, you can't get a job there.

"They come to Dwight, we pay, we train, we get them licensed and certified, and then they can move on when the time comes. If we're talking baseball, we're like a minor league department for the major

Gardner Fire Protection District

Gardner doesn't have the good fortune

Tim Anderson, who has been Garnder's EMS coordinator since March and a firefighter and paramedic for the last four years, has a problem filling shifts every month.

'My age group is the oldest in the department. The only older members are the chief, Brian Jensen, and our captain, Brett Alford," Anderson said. "We are short staffed just like everyone else, but we are on the younger side. We don't have enough people on staff to fill the shifts we have for the month.

"We have been fighting this epidemic for awhile. We currently have nine people rostered, which is very, very low. Only six of them actively pick up shifts. Mathematically, it's two 12-hour shifts a day or we have guys that work 24-hour shifts, like myself, and we break it up into three colored shifts, black, red, and gold. That's six shifts, so the minimum we need is six. Then people call off because of their fulltime jobs. We would need more fill-ins for

"When I started, there were 28 people and now we're at nine."

After high school, Anderson originally wanted to be a chef as he went into culinary school.

A friend of his was going to an EMS school and asked Anderson to catch a class (continued on page 3)

Jesse White Extending Driver's

Jesse White announced that expiration dates for driver's licenses, ID cards, and learner permits are being extended until December 1, 2022. The previous extension was set to end on July 31, 2022. As a result, expired driver's licenses, ID cards, and learner's permits will remain valid until December 1, 2022, so customers do not need to rush into Driver Services facilities. This extension does not apply to commercial driver's licenses (CDL) and CDL learner's permits.

White's office expanded online renewals for expired driver's licenses and ID cards and continues to mail letters to eligible customers. The letter provides driver's license and ID card holders with a unique PIN needed to renew online instead of visiting a facility and waiting in line. Customers may call 217-785-1424 to confirm their eligibility for online renewal or to obtain their PIN. They may also visit apps.ilsos.

look up their eligibility status.

Customers who must visit a facility include first-time driver's license or ID card applicants, first-time READ ID applicants and drivers ages 75 and older who are required by state law to visit a facility when

renewaing their license. White continues to encourage people to conduct other business online at ilsos.gov. In addition to driver's license and ID card renewals for those who qualify, online services include obtaining a duplicate driver's license or ID card, ordering a driver record and purchasing license plate stickers.

White noted his office is also extending the expiration dates of Restricted Driving Permits (RDPs) to December 1, 2022 for those that expired on or after December 1, 2021 through December 1, 2022.

As a reminder, the U.S. Department of Homeland Security has extended the federal REAL ID deadline to May 3, 2023.

(continued from page1) with him. Anderson went and caught the bug to become a firefighter and EMT because he wanted to help save lives and homes.

understands Anderson being a volunteer or part-time worker doesn't pay well and life can be all about money at times. But at the same time, there is still community and the amazing feeling of helping people.

"As of right now, I'm the only active paramedic picking up shifts. We have EMT basics that fill in the other shifts. We have two ambulances with one of them, ALS and BLS," Anderson said. "When I'm here, our ALS goes out and we help other departments with ambulance calls. When I'm not here, the BLS ambulance goes out and they're strictly to stay in our town and provide care to our citizens. If there is a call that goes beyond their scope, they call in an ALS agency, which would be Dwight or Coal City.

"It's something we've been battling for months. I worked the entire month of May be-

fire department. It's insane. It's a very demanding job. We don't run calls every minute of every day, but when we do run calls, the citizens who pay their taxes expect the best of the best. That's what we try to provide. Unfortunately, when you do work 72 hours straight, your mental state is not the best. That's what we try to avoid, but with this epidemic it's hard to."

Essex Fire Protection District

Essex Fire Chief Austin Vining is feeling the epidemic in multiple ways.

The department he has been the chief of for the last 20 years and a member for 41 years has 18 members on his staff (12 active) and youth is scarce.

"No one wants to step up and volunteer for the community anymore. I don't know what it is. People would rather play their games and watch TV," Vining said. "I would like to have 18-20 active like it used to be. It's to the point now, where we have 12 volunaround. They might be working or out of town. They're on the staff, but if they're not around they can't help with that particular call.

"We do have Automatic Aid, so if we have four or five people out and then we have other towns coming to help also. We are linked to Salina Township (Bonfield), Herscher, and South Wilmington."

Riverside Medical Center in Kankakee is currently providing EMS and ambulance services to Essex's district because he doesn't have EMTs or paramedics to perform the duties or drive the ambulances.

If he could get some younger blood behind the wheel, Essex could handle EMS, ambulance calls by it-

"Most of the older guys are the ones who are active and picking up calls. It's very important to have younger members on the department because most of us are getting up there in age," Vining said. "We put up a big banner and had it up for months. We've had posters put up all over. My firefighters

tween my full-time job and the teers but they're not always have gone around and spoke to recruit. We have a Facebook page and have advertised. It's out there, we're just not having any bites.

> "If our staff becomes too small to handle calls, we would have to ask for a tax referendum to pay people to be up there. This would bring the taxes up for Essex residents. I don't think a lot of people want a tax hike. Of course the city board would have to vote on it, but that would be the ultimatum, we'd have to raise taxes to have a staff.'



Did you know?

Men and women may have more free time after 50 than they had in previous decades.

As children grow more independent and even leave the house, parents look to various activities, including travel, to fill their free time. Travel is often seen as a luxury, but heading off for parts unknown can produce some serious health benefits.

A joint study from the Global Coalition on Aging and the Transamerica Center for Retirement Studies found that women who vacation at least twice a year have a lower risk for heart attack than those who travel once every six years.

The study also found that men who do not take annual vacations are at a significantly higher risk of death (20 percent) and heart disease (30 percent) than those who take time to get away each year. Vacations don't even need to be long to produce significant, positive results. A 2018 study found that a four-day long weekend vacation positively affected wellbeing, recovery, strain, and perceived stress for as long as 45 days.

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


Prairie Creek Library Wraps Up Summer Reading



The summer reading program was brought to the community by the library in partnership with local businesses, especially Ace Hardware and Perfect Blend Music





Dwight Joint School Boards Meet; First Meeting for New Superintendent DeLong

The Dwight Public School Districts #232 and #230 met in a joint meeting on Thursday July 21. Josh DeLong attended his first meeting as newly hired Superintendent.

Both Boards entered to Executive Session to conduct personnel matters prior to reconvening in Regular Ses-

Supt. DeLong reported that the first few weeks of his tenure had been hectic as he met with many different stakeholders within the district, including faculty, staff, previous administrators, and others. He pointed out every new school season has its challenges, and the current summer is no exception, considering the Supt. transition and the increased number of classroom sections being added at the Grade School.

Summer projects have been proceeding, including a new water softener being installed at the Grade School. There are serious potholes in the Redbird parking lot, but no action has been taken on them because of the high cost of asphalt repair. Morning drop off protocol around the circle drive at the Grade School was discussed as this seems to be a perennial point of conversation.

At the High School, the upgrade to the crow's nest at the athletic field is nearing completion and lights are up at the tennis/basketball courts north of the football field. Cleaning of the courts will need to be done as the surface appears to be giving off a black residue. The heating upgrade at the High School is about 18 weeks out from commencing.

The combined Boards approved the Amended Calendar for the 2022/2023 school year and discussed how Inclement Weather Days versus ELearning Days would be handled. Supt. DeLong expressed his strong opinion that ELearning Days had proved to not be effective and every attempt should be made to avoid them.

The Grade School Board approved the Intergovern-mental Agreement with the Village of Dwight to provide a Police School Resource Officer.

Athletic participation for various teams was discussed. Something new this fall will be the beginning of a Junior High Cross Country team, which is open to all 5th - 8th grade boys and girls. Practices will begin August first. Athletes will be able to participate in Cross Country and Baseball or Softball simultaneously, if they desire to do both.

At a previous meeting, Transportation Director Angie Goley had asked the High School Board to consider creating an Assistant Transportation Director position. The transportation position duties had grown during Covid and have become increasingly time-consuming due to the current labor conditions. The Boards agreed and gave DeLong the direction to proceed. The Boards also discussed the need to offer increased pay incentives and sign-on bonuses for school bus



It's History

Seattle's Schmutz Stymies Smith's Semipro Squad

Captivated by the energy of the 1906 World Series between Chicago's two major-league franchises, Dwight's Col. Frank L. Smith aimed to bring the same spark back to town. His intent while organizing his namesake baseball team for 1907 was twofold—test his players' skills while shining a light on his burgeoning political aspirations. The F.L. Smiths challenged a mix of neighboring town teams, salaried semipro squads and traveling novelty acts. Smith dazzled the populace with home games against the Nebraska Indians and Cuban Stars of Havana, while the season culminated with a contest against the American League's pennantwinning Detroit Tigers. Dwight's nine finished the

campaign winning 22 games. One of the team's 16 losses, perhaps unexpectedly, came against a high school team from Seattle, Washington. Seattle's Charlie Mullen Roe Hilton, Harold Stewart, Jay Smith, Jimmy "Toots" Agnew, Wee Coyle, Harry Mitt Martin, Mert Hemenway, Ten Million (his actual name), Fred Hickenbottom, Ernie Maguire and Charlie Schmutz are not top of mind for even the most knowledgeable baseball fans. These teenagers traveled to Dwight's West Side Park on Wednesday, July 24, 1907, and defeated the local semipros, 6-5.

Traveling teen teams are prevalent today, but this Seattle High School squad arranged an unprecedented two-month, 31game schedule. With "Seattle H.S." stitched across their chests and "1909" upon their backs, they meandered through

How Smith learned of this tour is unclear, but perhaps he saw the letter Seattle's teenage manager penned to the sporting editor of the Joliet Evening Herald-News. Published in the July 14th issue, Harold Stewart requested games against "some fast amateur or semi-professional team in your city some day during the week of July 21st." Stewart requested a \$60 guarantee and 60 percent of the gross receipts.

"These young men were given a hero's send off when they left Seattle on June 14, 1907," said David Eskenazi, a Pacific Northwest sports historian. "[They] remain a celebrated part of Seattle's athletic

Glancing at the final score suggests a competitive game, but Dwight's Star and Herald noted that the home team "lacked the fast, snappy work that won so many games" ear-

10 states and the District of Co-lier that year. That afternoon, 16-year-old pitcher Charlie Schmutz puzzled the local squad. Described as "an elongated youth" with "a typical October 1909, Seattle business amateur delivery," Thomas S. leaders funded the tour as a Rice of The Washington Times noted that Schmutz's pitching could confound players of

semipro caliber.



"Schmutz was in fine form," The Seattle Star said, "and but for one bad inning would have had a shutout." He delivered a so-called "wicked spitball" with a "peculiar style" and a "shot-put motion" that stymied the locals for the first seven frames. A scoreless affair after two innings, Seattle then pounced on Dwight's hurler, Jimmie Brown. The Seattleites plated all six of their runs during the middle frames and extended their 6-0 lead into the bottom of the eighth.

"Timely hitting, bunched swats with errors to assist" was how The Seattle Daily Times summarized the action. With a runner on first and two outs in the home half of the eighth, the F.L. Smiths scored all five of their runs to close the gap. Despite the late rally, the youngsters shut down the locals in the ninth to secure the win.

"[The tour] was a bold and unprecedented idea, and a wild success," said Eskenazi. "The remarkable young athletes that comprised the team played a terrific brand of baseball, finishing the tour with a winning record."



(continued from page 9) Though largely forgotten today, these Seattle ballplayers built remarkable resumes with five players reaching professional baseball. Two of them-Schmutz and Mullen-earned spots on major-league teams.

Following high school, Schmutz played seven seasons of professional baseball primarily in assorted minor leagues. He enjoyed a brief stint with the National League's Brooklyn Robins (today's Dodgers) in 1914 and 1915. During his playing days, he shared roster spots with two players of local interest. With the Robins, he called Wilmington's George Cutshaw a teammate. As a member of the 1911 Tacoma Tigers, he shared pitching duties with Dwight's Eddie Hig-

"That game is not forgotten in Dwight," Dwight Historical Society's Kim Drechsel said.

"Our Baseball in Dwight collection includes a Schmutz Obak baseball card. He's depicted as a member of the Northwest League's Tacoma Tigers."

"Visitors can stop by the museum now through November," Dwight Historical Society President Mary Flott said. "The doors are open to the public every second and fourth Saturday from 10 a.m. until 1 p.m. Special appointment times are available, too."



If gas demand remains low as stocks increase, alongside a continuing reduction in crude prices, drivers will likely continue to see pump prices decline. Today's national average of \$4.35 is 63 cents less than a month ago and \$1.20 more than a year ago

Dwight Pool Staff Inservices Spine/Neck Water Rescue

As a part of the continuing education and physical conditioning requirements for employment as a guard at the Dwight Pool, guard staff on July 19 inserviced a water rescue scenario having a victim with a spinal injury.

"While in the water, a Long Spine Board is the device used in pre-emergency transportation or pre-hospital trauma care to offer rigid support during movement of a victim with suspected spinal or limb injuries," offered inservice-provider, lifeguard, and pool manager, Corilyn Hensel-McCullough.

"The LSBs have adjustable straps to help keep one's head, neck, and spine more stable thereby allowing us to more easily and safely mobilize a person from the water to the land. Inservices and scenarios like this help us successfully learn how to offer very specific rescue care, build our teampool-family bond, and prepare us for emergency situations that could present themselves at the Pool. We prefer to be prepared than stupified when it comes to water protection, the safety of our patrons, and the safety of our staff, so we practice."

During these structured ERtype of recreations, the staff also practices other safety procedures that are a part of any pool/water emergency situation. Staff must blow the whistle, get the attention and assistance of the other on-duty guard(s), yell, "Clear the water" safely enter the water with the rescue buoy, make sure other swimmers are cleared from the water, extend specific assistance needs to staff by name like, "Joe, call 9-1-1; Jane, get the AED; and, Jim, clear everyone back safely from the scene."

The Dwight Pool staff also workshopped the spine-kit bag, how to handle persons standing by at the scene, what to say to a victim during a water emergency, how to approach or inform the victim's family or friends during and after a water/pool emergency, how to assist one another once the victim is out of the water, and the importance of timely documentation in the victim log when it is all clear. The Village of Dwight Pool staff hopes to never need these rehearsed safety practices on a real victim; but just in case, they continue to ready themselves.

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New Dwight Residents Can Reduce Their **ComEd Billing**

ages a Municipal Aggregation program for its residents. Since residents voted to participate in municipal Aggregation in 2012, the Village is able to combine all residents in the municipality and negotiate lower rates for residents' home electric bills. Residents are able to opt-out of the program at any time.

Recently, the ComEd rate for those in Northern Illinois jumped from an annualized rate of 7.8¢ to 9.8¢ per kWh. However, residents of Dwight that participate in the Municipal Aggregation will continue to pay a rate of 6.4¢ per kWh. Dwight's rate is 35% lower

The Village of Dwight man- than ComEd. For the average resident currently participating in the Village program, the aggregation rate saves \$325 annually.

> New residents are not automatically signed up for the Village's Aggregation rate. ComEd places all new accounts on the ComEd residential rate. To move to the Village's Aggregation rate, a resident would need to call the Village's current supplier (Dynegy) at 844-351-7691. There is no cost to switch. Residents are encouraged to have their ComEd bill available when they call. The current contracted Dynegy rate until October 2023 is 6.4¢ per kWh.
