# Basset Hounds Waddling for 25th Year

The end of September is always a happening time in Dwight as the carnival food, rides, vendors, music, and events of Harvest Days come

You can't talk about Harvest Days without mentioning the parade.

Which means, you can't leave out the Basset waddle.

"It's really cool. My wife, Emmy, and I were deeply involved with Harvest Days. The first parade we did, it wasn't named Harvest Days and it was Dwight's 150-year anniversary," said Larry Little, the president of the Guardian Angel Basset Rescue. "I used to be a band director in years past, and I said, 'Why don't we have a big band parade?' I was able to get 12 out-of-town bands. We did a huge parade, and everyone asked if we would do it again.

"We said, 'Yes, we will do it if people participate.' That started Harvest Days. Once we started to bring in Bassets, we noticed that places around the country were doing Basset waddles. I was fascinated by it. They were raising money and they were a lot of fun.

"I went to the chair of the event and said, 'I think we can help put the Harvest Days Parade on the map. How would you like to have 200 Basset hounds walking through the parade with a king and queen?'

The Illinois Waddle will take place on Sunday, Sept. 25 as Harvest Days will be in downtown Dwight Sept. 22-25.

Little said he may have to get a golf cart or drive one of his vans because more and more Basset hounds are registering for the 25th wad-

The first year, 1997, Little had 140 Basset hounds. As of Aug. 25, there are already 200 dogs registered to take to the streets of Dwight. The GABR president predicts there will be 400 by the time Harvest Days arrives.

"I love it because the kids love it. We always tell people to not feed the dogs, no treats, but feel free to pet them," Little said. "For the most part, almost every Basset hound we've had is a friendly dog. They just love the kids and the kids like them. The Bassets are short and about the height of the kids."

The Illinois Waddle is not the only thing going on for the Guardian Angel Basset Rescue during the festive weekend.

On Saturday, Sept. 24, the GABR park located at 413 W. Waupansie St. will be open to the public for \$1 raffles, a silent option, cash bar, T-shirts, and a lot of food as Little put it.

At 2 p.m. on Saturday there will be the annual Great Basset Races as the fastest Basset will be crowned and receive a trophy.

Sunday's schedule includes breakfast with the Dwight Lions Club before the memorial service at 10:30 a.m. with Pastor Randy of New Life Assembly of God, where dogs and dog owners who passed away in the last year are read off in respect and celebration.

Awards will be presented Sunday, followed by the Star-Spangled Banner and the official

# Dwight Village Board Discusses Park Street Closures

a regularly scheduled meeting on Monday August 22. A Finance and Administrative meeting was held just prior. All Trustees and Mayor Paul Johnson were in attendance.

**Board** conducted a lengthy discussion regarding requests by Paul Ferrari of Aly Anne's Bar and Grill, 122 E. Main Street to close Park Street behind his establishment. A request for the use of Chippewa Street for parking during a Jeep run on August 21 and the closing of Park Street from 8 a.m. to 11 a.m. was approved pending final input by Chief of Police Mike Nolan.

The Board also approved the second request to close the street for a bean bag contest on Saturday August 27 from 8 a.m. to Sunday August 28 at 10 p.m. For this event, Park Street was approved to be closed in the immediate area directly behind the business only. In addition, no alcoholic beverages of any kind should be consumed in this area and should remain inside.

A third request to have music with extra tents and seating behind the bar on September 22 starting at 10 a.m. going to September 26 at 11 a.m. was approved with modifications. The Board set the time frame that the street be opened back up no later than 11 p.m. Sunday, September 25. The approval included that a designated area for alcoholic beverages be behind the immediate area of the bar only.

(These approvals prompted the need for an additional special meeting held Friday August 26. *See related story)* 

In Public Forum, resident Joseph Kokaly addressed the Board and outlined his recent difficulty in getting an updated ID Badge from the Village, which is required to renew his Illinois Concealed Carry permit. Kokaly had worked for the Dwight Police Department, but is now retired and needs an ID reflecting that status. The Board took a recommendation from the Zoning Board of Appeals committee meeting on August 16 and approved a variance request by Chief Redi-Mix at 405 S. Old Route 66. The business wished to construct a building which would be five feet from the property line rather than the required 30 feet.

Bid requests for Watters Drive Water Main Loop and West William Street reconstruction projects were approved.

A motion was approved to move forward on an Illinois Transportation Enhancement (ITEP) grant application. The project would encompass a bike/walking path from Route 47 east along Route 17 to Heritage Woods and the Shubert subdivision. A Jeep Run event at the bar on Sunday August 21 resulted in Park Street behind the bar being closed by the business. Members of the Board were unaware the street was going to be completely closed off and were questioning how this came to be.

Paul Ferrari, owner of the business, was on hand to answer questions and explain his opinion on what had transpired.

He told the Board he was of the belief he had the approval to close the street for two hours, as long as he followed guidelines set by Chief of Police Nolan, who was unable to be in attendance.

Members of the Board reiterated their stand that requests need to come to the Board in writing and in a timely manner.

Ultimately, the problem was attributed to miscommunication between Ferrari and the Village.

Two subsequent events at the bar were also discussed.

A Bean Bag tournament was approved to allow for outside alcohol to be sold and behind the business for the days of August 27

A request had also been submitted by Aly Anne's to have a tent and beer garden outside on the weekend around Harvest Days, starting at 10 a.m. on September 22 going to 11 a.m on Monday September 26.

The Board was in support of the street closing but had concerns about the closure end time ending Monday at 11 a.m. They felt the street should be cleared Sunday night.

Ferrari explained how it took a couple hours to dismantle the tent and it was extremely difficult to get it completed on Sunday night.

A compromise was agreed upon to require the street be reopened by 9 a.m. Monday

The meeting ended with emphasis from the Board that all future requests come in a timely

#### **Cullom Man Convicted of Christmas 2019 Murder**

Clifford Brewer, 55, of Cullom was found guilty on six counts of first-degree murder in the Christmas 2019 deaths of his wife, son and neighbor by a Livingston County Jury on Tuesday August 16.

Brewer was arrested December 25, 2019 and charged with the murder of his wife, Shirley Brewer, 48; his son, Christian Brewer, 27; and his neighbor Norman Walker, 51. Each died of a single gunshot to the head.

Police reports show Brewer called 911 at 2:05 a.m. Christmas Day. He maintained he awoke to find his son dead in his upstairs bedroom, with his wife and Walker dead in an adjacent room. A gun was found next to Shirley Brewer. He initially had told police his wife had killed herself after killing her son and neighbor.

Prosecutors said that when officers arrived, they noticed Brewer's hands were wet and he appeared to be washing men's clothing.

Brewer worked as a corrections officer at the Pontiac Correctional Center at the time of

the incident. Judge Jennifer Bauknecht presided over the trial.

Following the verdict announcement, she immediately revoked Brewer's bond, and he was remanded into the custody of the Livingston's County Sheriff's Office.

Sentencing is scheduled for October 5.

#### Report gives more warnings about Illinois' Unemployment trust fund debt

The University of Illinois' Institute of Government and Public Affairs has released a report examining the debt in the state's unemployment insurance trust fund.

It highlighted a number of concerning problems in the way the state managed the fund both before and after the pandemic

Illinois' unemployment insurance trust fund ran up a deficit of more than \$4 billion, and did not pay it back before the deadline to avoid accumulating interest. Paying back the debt could now require either higher taxes on employer paychecks, lower benefits to unemployed workers, or both.

The report found that before the pandemic hit, Illinois distributed unemployment benefits without saving enough money to continue paying benefits in the event of a severe crisis.

When that crisis hit in March 2020 and hundreds of thousands of Illinoisans lost their jobs due to the pandemic shutdowns, the state had to borrow billions from Washington, DC in order

Illinois unemployment was higher during the pandemic than other states, and we recently learned that more than half of the unemployment funds paid out by the state may have gone to fraudulent actors rather than unemployed Illinoisans who needed the help.

The state budget which passed on a party-line vote back in the spring could have appropriated enough funds to pay down the deficit but instead left a \$1.8 billion hole which will have to be made up somehow.

We should not raise taxes on jobs, nor should we cut unemployment benefits for those who need them. This report shows that Illinois has to do better.

Another state trooper injured in crash - please be careful! A couple of weeks ago I told you about the 14th crash this year involving an Illinois State Police vehicle which was stopped to assist a motorist in distress. I am sorry to tell you that

since then we have had a 15th and now a 16th crash involving a trooper who was stopped on the roadside. In the latest incident, a state trooper was injured and hospitalized when a squad car was hit on Route 45 in Kankakee County last weekend.

The driver whom the trooper was assisting was also injured in the crash. The alleged drunk driver who struck the trooper's vehicle has been charged. A state law called "Scott's

Law" requires drivers to move over and slow down when a first responder vehicle is on the side of the road with its emergency lights activated. These i clude such vehicles as police cars, fire trucks, ambulances and tow trucks. The law is named for a firefighter who was killed while responding to an accident in 2000.

Violating Scott's Law can lead to significant fines and restrictions on driving privileges. A violation which causes an injury or death is a Class 4 felony which can carry a sentence of up to one to three years in prison. Please be careful on the roadways and keep our first responders safe.





#### **Dwight Village Board Hears** from GLCEDC

Adam Dontz of the Greater to rail lines that reach in all Development Council (GLCEDC), gave a presentation to the Dwight Village Finance and Administrative Committee Meeting on Monday August 22. This particular committee consists of the entire Board of Trustees along with the Village President. All were in attendance.

Dontz outlined the contributions and efforts the Council has provided over the past year to the entire county and specifically Dwight.

Main in discussion was MegaSite 55, the 362 acre tract of land just northeast of Dwight, adjacent to the Norfolk Southern and Union Pacific mainlines. The GLCEDC holds an option on the land, with the potential of adding an additional 1,000 acres if the development should take off and need to expand. The parcel is unique with the site being in the Midwest and having access

Livingston County Economic four directions, with the ability to access domestic as well as international locations.

Dontz pointed out to the Board that nearly every comparable development similar in size and scope has been provided some incentive to developers by the local governments involved and urged the Dwight Board to consider the same for this locale. He suggested a TIF (Tax Increment Financing) District be created, which would provide his group with a starting point of negotiation for potential investors. He shared with the Board a recap of inquiries on the site that funnel through the State and related how often the first point of elimination is the lack of any

#### **PUBLIC NOTICE** NOTICE TO ELDERLY (OVER 65) AND HANDICAPPED VOTERS **REGARDING THE** GENERAL ELECTION, NOVEMBER 8, 2022

Notice is hereby given to elderly over 65 and handicapped persons that the County of Livingston has complied with federal and state election laws to promote the fundamental right to vote by improving access to polling places and election day voting as follows: All polling places are wheelchair accessible.

If your polling place is difficult for an elderly or handicapped person to manage, there are some alternatives:

- On request by phone or letter, the county clerk will supply you with a proper affidavit for a voter unable to enter the polling place on Election Day. This must be completed and returned to the County Clerk's Office no later than 4:30 p.m. on November 7, 2022. On election day two judges from your polling place, of opposite parties, will bring the ballot sheet outside the entrance, providing that you are within a distance of not more than 50 (fifty) feet from the door to the polling place.
- If an elderly or disabled voter has difficulty in reading the ballot sheet, he or she may ask for assistance at the polling place, or may bring a friend or relative to assist. After filling out the proper affidavit, the friend or relative, or two judges of opposite parties, can assist you.
- A request can be made by phone, mail, or email to the County Clerk's Office for a Vote By Mail ballot. When the request is received by phone or mail an application for a Vote By Mail ballot will be mailed to the voter. You can download an application on line by going to: livingstoncountyil.gov. This application must be filled out and mailed or hand delivered to the County Clerk, who will then mail the Vote By Mail ballot to the voter. After marking the Vote By Mail ballot it must be mailed or hand delivered back to the County Clerk's Office, so it can be counted on Election Day. Application for a VBM ballot may also be made by email from the Livingston County Official web site by going to: County Services; County Clerk; Elections; and Emailable Vote By Mail Ballot Application Request.
- Illinois election law allows for Early and Grace Period voting to be conducted in the County Clerk's Office. The clerk's office will be open from 9:00 AM to 12:00 Noon for Early and Grace Period Registration Voting on Saturdays October 15, October 22, October 29, and November 5. Voting will also take place during the regular office hours Monday thru Friday from 8:00 AM to 4:30 PM with extended hours on Wednesdays, October 19 and October 26 from 8:00 AM until 6:00 PM.
- The County Clerk's office will offer two methods of voting, the Unisyn OVO Tabulator unit and FVT Touchscreen electronic voting system.






Every summer, Don would repair all the typewriters for the GSW High School in his shop at home.







As Chairman of the Illinois Senate Agriculture Committee, farm issues are front and center for me. I worked closely with soybean farmers this year on legislation to encourage more biodiesel use. I celebrated National Farmers Market Week August 7-13, where Illinois has the third most farmers markets in the country.

I am a lifetime member of Future Farmers of America, and I was proud to work this year with

the Illinois Secretary of State to issue special license plates to

help support FFA programming. I joined Illinois Department of Agriculture Director Jerry Costello this spring to promote the state's Farm Family Resource Initiative, providing farmers and their families with needed mental health support.

In May, I joined President Joe Biden at a local Kankakee farm to discuss the real and painful impact of inflation and the pandemic on farm costs and food supply. Ongoing supply chain shortages and the war in Ukraine – the region where 25% of the world's fertilizer is distributed from – continue to drive up farmers' high input costs.

In our conversation last year, Sen. Bennett made an important point that will carry over to the new General Assembly that will take over next January. As new

legislators go to Springfield and the districts they represent change, fewer legislations are representing large portions of "ag country" anymore. That means I will need to team with other farmers and farm-minded legislators from both sides of the aisle to make agriculture the top priority it must be for our policymak-

# **Gardner Discusses Railroad Warning Gates Malfunctions**

The Gardner Village Board met in regular session August 22, opening with the approval of the minutes of the July 25 meeting, payment of the bills, and approval of the treasurer's report

Commissioner Tim Hill was absent.

During public comment, resident Don Phillips reminded the commissioners present that all three and the Mayor have stated repeatedly at meetings that they support keeping train horns in the village. Phillips then provided the Mayor and commissioners with photos he took on July 22 showing an Amtrak train stopped while a flagger exited the locomotive to stop traffic due to the gates being in the up position.

The second photo showed the same train passing over the crossing with one of the gates

remaining in the up position.

Phillips advised the board it was at least the third train that day to pass with the gates not working; with the first train passing at road speed. Phillips further commented that based on his observations and discussions with Union Pacific employees, the gates were malfunctioning on two separate days the week of August 15.

Sharon Pickles addressed the board asking for information regarding the plaque from the old water tower. Mayor Mike Serena reported the plaque is at the Village Hall and will be placed in the archives.

Pickles also inquired about several houses in the village, including one with the windows boarded up and a child allegedly living in the home. Serena reported the village is pursuing legal action against several properties.
