Dwight Common School #232 Adopts Tax Rate

The Dwight Common School District #232 Board of Education met on Wednesday December 14 in the Dwight Township High School Board Room.

Present were Nick Stipanovich, Marc Ellis, Mark Christenson, Tara Hansen, Lori Bowman and Jaime Mallaney. Absent was Mike Cornale.

The regular meeting was preceded with a Public Hearing on the 2022 tax levy proposed at rate of 3.02. There was no Public Comment in the hearing session.

Upon commencement of the regular meeting, Samantha Beier was recognized as December Redbird of the Month and presented with a plaque by Principal Julie Schultz.

Public Comments in this session were offered by a parent looking for clarity on the dress code stemming from a recent dress policy enforcement and asked to be placed on the next Board Meeting agenda. Board President Nick Stipanovich thanked her for comments, but pointed out her concern was an administrative function and could not be an agenda item.

Kathy Stewart gave an up-

date on recent happenings within the Dwight Educational Association.

Principal Julie Schultz reported enrollment continues to climb and currently stands at 559 for Pre-K through 8th grade. She added that substitute teacher coverage continues to be a concern with the administration needing to provide coverage 14 times this semester.

Assistant Principal Jenkins gave recognition to students recently participating in the Illinois Music Education District 3 activity. Non-Audition participants were Reagon Connor, Clara Flott, Makenna Hoeppner, and Gracie Shireman. Audition participants were Joey Groves, William Richards, and Lauren Snyder.

Superintendent Josh De-Long reported he has been in contact with The Pontiac Daily Leader regarding legal publishing now that The Paper will no longer be publishing. He also offered his concerns about the increasing level of student behavior on buses and the lack of responsibility taken by parents.

The Board entered briefly into Executive Session to discuss legal matters. No action resulted from this session.

Dwight Village Board Approves Tax Levy

The Dwight Village Board convened December 12 in their final scheduled meeting of the year. All Trustees were present.

The Administration and Finance Committee met prior to the regular meeting and in that early session Village President Paul Johnson informed the Board that a potential wind farm south and east of the Village was in preliminary discussion stages. Jared Anderson, representing the energy firm, had requested the Board pass a resolution in favor of the project, but there appeared to be too many unknowns to proceed to that point, especially with no map of the footprint being available. Concerns by members of the Board included towers being built too close to Village limits as well as potential encroachment on the MegaSite hoping to be developed.

The Admin Committee also discussed openings on the Planning Commission. It was proposed Earl McCoy would continue his tenure and Josh DeLong would potentially be added.

Following the Admin Meeting was a Services, Health and Safety Committee Meeting. The cost of a new police squad car was presented at \$56,863 which was approved later in the regular meeting. They also reviewed the potential of approaching outlying townships, which are currently receiving EMS coverage from the Village, with sharing in the overhead of the system. The consensus of the Board was that township residents should be paying the same amount to maintain EMS coverage as Village residents and not just per call fees.

Chief of Police Mike Nolan addressed the group with a report that the Safe-T Act appears to be in the process of being revised, but there is concern the eventual outcome could lead to additional court appearances by

Minutes of the November 28th meeting were approved along with the payment of bills

to the amount of \$263,293.45. Mayor Johnson thanked Austin Haacke, who will be leaving his position as Finance Director, for his years of fine service to the Village. He also applauded the Dwight Economic Alliance on the success of the recent Christmas Parade and Ace Hardware for sponsoring the recent Backward Parade.

Village Administrator Kevin McNamara told the Board petitions for open Village Trustee seats are due to be turned in by December 19. There are three 4-year terms and one 2-year term open. Residents who have taken out petitions are incumbents Randy Irvin, Marla Kinkade, Chuck Butterbrodt, and Pete Meister. In addition, petitions were requested by Tim McKellar, Brian Berta, and Josh Jahn.

The Tax Levy Ordinance for the amount of \$975,000.00 was approved for fiscal year ending March 31, 2023. Total expenses for the year are reported at \$13,848,816 with total receipts, investments, and cash on hand being \$12,873,816.

Meeting dates for 2023 were set for the second and fourth Mondays of each month, with only one meeting in December. Planning Commission and Zoning Board of Appeals Meetings were set for the third Tuesday of each month.

Passing Assets Through a Trust: What to Know

As the year winds down, your thoughts might drift to the future. And, as part of that future, you may be thinking of where your financial assets will end up. You've worked hard to accumulate them, and you'll certainly need some of them to support your retirement, but what about the rest? What's the best way to pass them on to your loved ones?

There's no single path for everyone to follow. But you might consider establishing a trust, which offers some key benefits. For example, your estate can avoid the time-consuming, and highly public, process of probate. Plus, you can be highly specific about how your assets will be distributed.

To establish a trust, you will need to work with a qualified estate-planning attorney. And while you'll discuss many is-

sues, here are three key questions that will certainly need to be addressed: Who will serve as trustee of the trust? As the grantor, or creator, of your trust, you will pick the trustee - the individual or corporate entity that will manage the trust's assets and carry out the purpose of the trust. You could choose a trusted loved one, but this individual might not have the knowledge or experience to manage the responsibilities of a trustee. As an alternative, you could choose a corporate fiduciary, such as a bank or trust company. These entities are typically regulated by outside agencies and provide significant public matter expertise. Of course, they charge for their services

and often have account minimums. When are distributions made? As the grantor, you can choose when assets will be distributed to the beneficiaries you've named. You could decide to keep the assets in the trust until a beneficiary reaches the age of majority; note that the age of majority is not the same in all states. Or you could choose to "phase in" the distributions at particular ages e.g., 30, 35, 40 - or after a certain number of years. You could even hold assets in the trust for the lifetimes of the beneficiaries. These types of choices will depend on several factors, such as your feelings for how responsible a beneficiary might be in managing money.

For what purposes can the trust assets be used? In addition to choosing when your trust should make distributions, you can decide how these assets should be used. You could designate some broad categories, such as health, education, maintenance and support. A beneficiary's request for distributions in these areas is usually granted. But you could also structure the trust to provide mandatory income, perhaps once a year, or include a provision that provides incentives, such as distributing certain amounts of money once the beneficiary has achieved a milestone, such as finishing a degree or purchasing a first home.

One final note: Although you clearly have great control over what your trust can accomplish, its effectiveness will also depend, to a great extent, on its asset level. With this in mind, you'll want to pay close attention to your investment decisions throughout your life and your withdrawal strategy during retirement. The better your choices in these areas, the more options you'll have with your trust - and the greater the potential benefits for your beneficiaries.

SAFE-T Act lawsuit to be heard

Dozens of state's attorneys from around the state have filed lawsuits to stop the implementation of the controversial SAFE-T criminal justice law which was passed and signed last year. The lawsuits were recently consolidated into one case that will be heard in Kankakee County. Now that consolidated lawsuit will get its day in court on Tuesday, December 20.

Originally the case was set to be heard on December 7, but last-minute amendments to the law passed in the fall veto session caused a delay. Both sides were given time to amend their filings in order to reflect the changes to the law. It is expected that there could be a ruling in the case as early as December 28. The law is set to go into effect January 1.

Legislation passes to divest Illinois investments from Russia. Ever since Russia invaded Ukraine in February, legislators in Illinois and throughout the country have been seeking ways to divest state holdings from Russian entities, hoping to ensure that taxpayer money is not going to support the ongoing

I co-sponsored a bill back in the spring to prohibit Illinois from investing any public funds in any investment instrument which is based in or tied to Russia. Unfortunately our bill did not get called for a vote.

But finally, during the fall veto session, the House and Senate unanimously passed House Bill 1293, a bill to target

state investments in Russia and to investigate other possible third-party Russian involvement in the economy here in Illinois, including real estate.

The bill is similar to legislation which has passed in the past affecting nations like Iran and Sudan. It also affects Russia's ally Belarus, which has been an active supporter of Russia's war on Ukraine.

The bill now goes to Governor Pritzker for his signature.

Fall harvest wrapping up, winter wheat emerging. According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture, the harvest of field corn in Illinois is 94% completed and the harvest of soybeans has hit 98%. In those areas of the state suitable for winter wheat, mainly to the south, 90% of Illinois winter wheat crop has emerged.

The war in Ukraine is having an upward effect on wheat prices throughout the globe, including here in Illinois. Since Russia and Ukraine are signi-ficant wheat producing nations, the disruption to the global supply has driven up prices from other sources. At the end of last week, wheat scheduled to be delivered next spring was trading for \$7.75 a bushel on the Chicago exchange.

Gas Prices For This Week Since last Monday, the national average for a gallon of regular gasoline has fallen by 12 cents to \$3.14. Ac-

cording to new data from the EIA, gas demand decreased slightly last week. This coincides with the arrival of the winter driving season when fewer people hit the roads due to less daylight and more inclement weather. Meanwhile, total domestic gasoline stocks rose significantly. Increasing supply and lower gasoline demand are pushing pump prices lower. As demand remains low and stocks grow, drivers will likely continue to see pump prices decrease through next week. Crude prices have increased due to a weaker dollar and higher market optimism after new data showed that inflation

Through print, we're able to create a file in your brain of memorable keepsake information that we don't forget.

And when we do, the information, the entertainment, the recollection has already been shared with enough people to keep it moving. Newspapers started word of mouth, by the way.

This means there isn't a final for anything that has been in The Paper because it will be passed

Personally, I'll never forget meeting Danny Tock at Southern Illinois University. Over a decade later, I asked him in Dwight to be a guest on my podcast, Edge of Your Seat Podcast. We had a chat.

I've seen the bill.

I know I'll never forget eating at El Cancun with The Paper family and their family. Or our trips to Unpossible Mead, the Christmas meals, them letting me crash their family Christmas last December, or the numerous conversations that supplied learning lessons, family-like advice, and appreciation.

I won't forget my first, and maybe only, Harvest Days. Victory Lanes will see me again. But even if the web didn't exist – think about that for a second as our lives are intertwined in everything we do - The Paper isn't final or sent off because of the memories it created.

I drew a smiley face and circled it because all I can do when I think about The Paper, Danny Tock, Mary Boma, Mark Boma, Aaron Boma, Caleb Boma, Tom Tock, Louise Tock, and the rest of their great family is smile and say "Thank you."

Holiday Food Safety Tips from Grundy County Health Department

As the end of the year approaches, there may be multiple meals and parties in your future to celebrate the holidays. Carrying food from one location to another and sharing dishes with a crowd means more opportunity for bacteria to grow and cause food poisoning. Whether you're an experienced cook, a first-time party host, or simply adding a dish to the potluck lineup, the holidays can make even the most confident chefs feel nervous. Follow these steps to keep your holiday season food poisoning-

Steps to follow during holiday grocery shopping:

- Keep raw meat, poultry, and seafood away from other foods in your grocery cart.
- · Buy cold foods last. • Ask the cashier to place your raw meat, poultry and seafood in a separate bag.

- Steps to follow during food fully cooked and safe to eat. preparation and cooking:
- Use separate cutting boards for raw meat and ready-to-eat items like vegetables or bread.
- Use separate cutting boards, plates and utensils for raw meats and cooked meats to avoid cross-contamination.
- Wash items such as cutting boards that have touched raw meat with warm water and soap, or place them in a dishwasher.
- Prepare uncooked recipes before recipes requiring raw meat to reduce cross-contamination. Store them out of the way while preparing meat dishes to ensure they don't become contaminated after preparation.
- Use a meat thermometer to check the internal temperature of dishes to ensure they are ditional information.

Fresh beef, pork, veal, and lamb should be cooked to 145° F with a three minute rest time; fish should be cooked to 145° F; ground beef, veal and lamb should be cooked to 155° F;

155° F; and all poultry should be cooked to 165° F. Fool proof tips when cook-

egg dishes should be cooked to

- ing for groups: • Keep hot food hot and cold food cold, using chafing dishes or crock pots and ice trays. Hot items should remain above 135° F and cold items should remain below 41° F.
- Use several small plates when serving food.
- · Discard perishable foods left out for two hours or more.
